From the Rector

Knowing the Unknowable

"You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you." (John 14:17)

The two Gospel options for Pentecost are interesting. One Gospel account takes place after the resurrection and the other before it. In John 14, before our Lord's resurrection, we have the promise of the coming Holy Spirit, as the verse above indicates. The Holy Spirit is to come and will be with you and in you, Jesus says. In the post-resurrection Gospel for Pentecost, Jesus appears to the disciples behind closed doors and breathes on them -- "receive the Holy Spirit." Powers of forgiving sins are thereby conveyed to the Apostles. Such authority also relates to "binding and loosing" or permitting and forbidding in the Church. (Matthew 18:18.)

It is clear from the Four Gospels as a whole, especially when combined with Acts, that the work of the Holy Spirit is for each believer and for the community as a whole. The Holy Spirit makes things happen, guides, creates a new holy people, and empowers forward the new Christian Church. Indeed, without the Holy Spirit the Church simply is not. But there is this one thing that makes the Holy Spirit a mystery *par excellence*. It is the knowing of the unknowable.

We often fail as Christians to appreciate the gift of knowing God. I do not mean that we have penetrated the Mystery. I mean that God has offered the gift of revelation. We can only know of God those things which God chooses to disclose, reveal. Jesus is first and last that revelation. Wisely therefore does the Church offer the per-resurrection Gospel option.

Philip said to Jesus, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me?" (John 14: 8-10a)

It is in precisely this context that the promise is made of the Spirit to come. In other words, the revelation will continue. We will not be left orphans. (John 14:18.) The Father's self-disclosure in Christ continues through the work of the Holy Spirit. We can see here with clarity why the doctrine of the Trinity is fundamental to our Faith. Three in One and One in Three. There will be endless interplay among the Persons of the Holy Trinity in revelation.

God's self-disclosure cannot be limited. We will have revelation in whatever manner God so chooses. But the Holy Spirit, the Third Person of the Holy Trinity is revealing God in a special way; The Holy Spirit continues to remind us of the Father's work in Christ and to advance it. "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you." (John 14:26.)

Every act of mercy from above ought to be rejoiced in by the Church. The mercy of knowing God as God gives the precious gift cannot be overstated. We are not entitled. We are loved. Whether by the fire of the Holy Spirit or the "still small voice" thereof, the Triune God is saying in effect, "Come closer. Know this of the unknowable." Let us never lose the wonder.

From the Associate Rector

On Celebrating Pentecost – Are we charismatic enough?

I come from the generation of people that remember well the charismatic movement that swept across our churches, really holding prominence in the 1970's. The church my family belonged to was quite swept up in the movement. Hands began to wave to song, dance broke out, people spoke in tongues all around us. Some were drawn to this, for others it repelled. For our family, it became a great discomfort and we left that congregation. I was a child who clearly didn't understand what was taking place. Many of the adults didn't either. Misunderstanding is often found when engaging the charismatic leg of the Christian church.

Obviously, there remains a difference in thought about just how charismatic a church ought to be. However, I maintain that every church needs to be charismatic in the truest sense. What I mean is that acting charismatic, in the way I described above, is not the centerpiece of being charismatic.

Charismatic is defined as: "having, exhibiting, or based on charisma or charism" (Merriam-Webster). And so charismatic, for Christians, is really "having, exhibiting or based on the Holy Spirit." So, yes, we should be charismatic. Are we charismatic enough? We need to ask ourselves this deep question.

There are a variety of ways that the Holy Spirit can be with us and lead us. St. Paul writes about this: Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. (1 Cor 12:4-6)

These verses plant us in an important foundation of the charisms: Unity is inherent within them. All charisms come from God and are for the common good. None are to be individualized. None should cause any division as their purpose is to build up the body.

Obviously, people will be gifted differently through the Holy Spirit. But we must acknowledge that the Holy Spirit will gift us, and then ask us to use our gifts within the body, the church. And so yes, we should be charismatic. Are we charismatic enough?

Being charismatic means that God acts first. It is he who gifts the charisms – who "activates all of them in everyone." We might ask how open we are to receive the gifts and using them in our church and in our world.

St. Paul continues to the Corinthians that the Spirit will give some wisdom, others knowledge, others faith, others gift of healing, others the working of miracles, others prophecy, others discernment of spirits and to others various kinds of tongues and the interpretation of them. (From 1 Cor 12:8-10) There are other spiritual gifts mentioned by St. Paul in other parts of Holy Scripture.

Some of these gifts may make us more uncomfortable than others - true - and yet "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." So, truly, we should embrace them all as they find a place among us and bless us.

The overall thought I can leave with you when considering the charisms is the question: Are we led by the Holy Spirit? Too often our own thoughts, desires, comforts or plans can lead us. But to be the church in the world is to be led by God's Holy Spirit – to be led by the Holy Spirit, to be gifted by the Holy Spirit, and to exercise those gifts in the power of the Holy Spirit. In fact, everything we are, and everything we do, should come from God's very Spirit and give glory to him. Truly, that is to be a charismatic church and people.

From a favorite hymn we sing on the Day of Pentecost: "Hail thee festival day! Blest day that art hallowed forever, day when the Holy Ghost shone in the world with God's grace." (1982 Hymnal, Hymn 225) May we be charismatically led people shining in the world with God's grace.


Composer of the Month Club

John Rutter, b.1945

John Rutter (b. 1945), English choral conductor and composer grew up living over the Globe pub on London's Marylebone Road. He studied music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he was a member of the choir. While still an undergraduate he had his first compositions published, and served as director of music at Clare College from 1975 to 1979 and led the choir to international prominence. His Christmas carols and arrangements brought him international popularity, and his more extended compositions, including a *Requiem* and *Gloria*, have also earned acclaim.



A master craftsman, Rutter composes music with instant appeal, and widely, though not universally, admired. Some see it as "neither quite classical nor pop, and tends towards mawkish sentimentality." Nevertheless, our choir enjoys singing a number of Christmas pieces in our repertoire.



Saint of the Month Club

Enmegahbowh, Priest & Missionary, 1902

John Johnson Enmegahbowh, an Odawa (Ottawa) Indian from Canada, was raised in the Midewiwin traditional healing way of his grandfather and the Christian religion of his mother. He came into the United States as a Methodist missionary in 1832. At one point Enmegahbowh attempted to abandon missionary work and return to Canada, but the boat was turned back by storms on Lake Superior, providing him a vision: "Here Mr. Jonah came before me and said, 'Ah, my friend Enmegahbowh, I know you. You are a fugitive. You have sinned and disobeyed God. Instead of going to the city of Nineveh, where God sent you to spread his word to the people, you started to go, and then turned aside. You are now on your way to the city of Tarsish...."

Enmegahbowh invited James Lloyd Breck to Gull Lake, where together they founded St. Columba's Mission in 1852. The mission was later moved to White Earth, where Enmegahbowh served until his death in 1902. Unwelcome for a time among some Ojibway groups because he warned the community at Fort Ripley about the 1862 uprising,

Enmegahbowh was consistent as a man of peace, inspiring the Waubanaquot (Chief White Cloud) mission, which obtained a lasting peace between the Ojibway and the Dakota peoples.

Enmegahbowh ("The One who Stands Before his People") is the first recognized Native American priest in the Episcopal Church. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Kemper in 1859 and priest by Bishop Whipple in the cathedral at Faribault in 1867. Enmegahbowh helped train many others to serve as deacons throughout northern Minnesota. The powerful tradition of Ojibway hymn singing is a living testimony to their ministry. His understanding of Native tradition enabled him to enculturate Christianity in the language and traditions of the Ojibway. He tirelessly traveled throughout Minnesota and beyond, actively participating in the development of mission strategy and policy for the Episcopal Church.

<u>Prayer:</u> Almighty God, thou didst lead thy pilgrim people of old with fire and cloud: Grant that the ministers of thy Church, following the example of blessed Enmegahbowh, may stand before thy holy people, leading them with fiery zeal and gentle humility. This we ask through Jesus, the Christ, who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God now and for ever. Amen.

Creating the Church Chancel - Part II

(Continuation of Part I printed in the April Newsletter)

While the mosaic floor of the Chancel itself contained only the wavy lines symbolic of the waters of baptism, the pavement of the Sanctuary above was an elaborate mosaic containing symbols of the four Evangelists and the Sacred Monogram. It was given by Sarah Meads and Charlotte Meads in memory of Orlando Meads, vestryman for the Parish for twenty-seven years and a warden for eight years, who died February 11, 1884.


In 1886 (incidentally the year of the city of Albany's centennial), the Tibbits Memorial Pulpit was installed by Ellin & Co. of New York, from the designs of Robert Gibson. It was a gift of Mary Tibbits in memory of Benjamin Tibbits, Elizabeth B. Tibbits, John Rutgers Bleecker and Eliza Attwood Bleeker. In that same year a new organ was installed by Hilborn Roosevelt of New York City. It was an instrument of "unusual delicacy and power." Also in 1886 a Memorial Choir Room was built. The stone doorway to the room was inscribed as follows: "This Choir Room was built in sacred Memory of Harmon Pumpelly, entered into rest September 28th A. D. 1882."

The bronze Macdonald Memorial Lectern, opposite the pulpit, was the work of the Gorham Company of New York. Installed in 1892, it was in the form of an angel whose uplifted hands supported a frame on which could be placed sacred readings. At the base, in the form of a globe, the inscription reads "To the Glory of God's Word and in loving memory of John Macdonald entered in Rest March 27, A.D. 1892." "For so He giveth His Beloved sleep."

At Christmas of 1897 the Tiffany Sanctuary Candelabra were placed in the Chancel. They were dedicated to Luther Henry Tucker by his wife and children. Tucker was a member of the Vestry for forty years serving as vestryman, clerk and warden. He died on February 23rd, 1897. These candelabra were massive brass structures in Italian Gothic style with each candelabra holding seven candles. The Archives has pictures of these candelabra. But, like the Doremus windows, they have disappeared.

Much later there were several additions to the Chancel. The Epiphany Star above the Chancel was, given on January 8, 1981 in memory of Alice C. Atkiss. The Bishop's Chair was taken apart so that while the top remained in place, the lower chair became Rector's Chair at the front of the Nave. Choir chairs came from the Cathedral of All Saints. The Chancel Stair Removeable Rail was the gift of Constance Stewart and Elizabeth Campbell in 1963. The needlepoint altar kneeling cushions were the design of parishioner Mrs. Curtis L. Hemenway, and were dedicated in May of 1967.

Despite these later changes, it was under Reverend Battershall and his congregation that the Chancel received it's major renovations. And Battershall never failed to show his appreciation. In one of his later sermons he said: "... the completion and embellishment of the edifice, in large measure has been due to the desire and purpose of the congregation of St. Peter's to build into the walls of this church, memorials of sanctified love and memory."

Opening Prayer Led by Father Paul Hartt

Approval of the Minutes of Vestry Meeting, March 13, 2018.

The March 13, 2018, minutes were approved on a motion by C. Gordon and seconded by G. Scala. The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

Warden Report -D. Spath and J. Chenot

We started March off already in the Lenten season and ending with Holy week in the last week of the month. The last Sunday of the month, March 24th we celebrated Palm Sunday at both the 8:30 and 10:30 services, both well attended. It was also great to see the choir continue its traditional Ride On procession at the end of the 10:30 service. The Sunday school also was busy during the Palm Sunday service decorating Easter eggs for the Easter egg hunt for the following Saturday at the Rectory. We would like to thank our Sunday school director Laura Rulison and all the Sunday school staff for all the hard work and guidance working with the children each Sunday as well as those who help in the nursery.

Each Friday evening during Lent, the choir performed an evensong service and, also, participated in the Maundy Thursday service the night before Good Friday. Neil and the choir were also well rehearsed to perform the Haydn's "Seven words of Christ on the Cross" on Good Friday with full orchestra that immediately followed the noon time service. We would like to thank all those who participated at those services.

The first Sunday of this month, April 1st, was Easter Sunday. We had two wonderful services with a large turnout for the 10:30 service. The choir performed joyous Easter music at both the 8:30 and 10:30 services. Thank you to Neil and the choir for their entire dedication performing beautiful music at all these services. Also, I would like to thank our choir Mom, Diana Martin who coordinated the brunch in between the Easter Services for the choir as well ensuring the Choir to look their best at all the services.

During this busy Holy Season, we want to thank our devoted and loving clergy, Father Hartt and Mother Sue for all their preparation for all the services during the Lenten season; the Sunday services, services during the week and Holy week that all lead us to Easter Sunday. This time is an extremely busy time for both of them working on sermons as well as tending to those that are shut-ins and those in the hospitals looking to pastoral care. Many thanks to the both of you for all you do for all of us at St. Peter's.

The vestry would also like to thank the altar guild, the flower guild and ushers for all their time and talents that is volunteered during the Lenten and Easter season. Also, thanks to Pat and Ian for keeping the Church and physical plant clean and in order for all the parishioners and newcomers. We also want to recognize and thank both Janice and Angie for working tirelessly in the church office during this Lenten season. The amount of work that is processed in the office during this time is an incredible task – printed items for the extra services as well as all the record keeping for Easter Lilies memorials. We are sincerely thankful for both of them for all their tireless work during this busy season.

This past Sunday, the second Sunday of Easter we had a Baptism for Nathan James Gordon. The Gordon and Chenot family would like to thank all those in the congregation, the choir and clergy who made this a special day for all of us and thank those who were able to celebrate with all of us and our families at the luncheon that followed the service.

Finally, we would to thank Ashley Spath and Christie Gordon for all their efforts on the work done to our new Facebook page as well as looking ahead on many other ways to connect everyone on social media. There was a lot of positive feedback from many regarding the informational insert that was put together and distributed in the Easter Sunday leaflets. Thank you both for all your insight on this and other projects you are both working on.

Finance - G. Scala - Treasurer's Report

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for March. Offerings for March were \$18,216. Year-to-date offerings are \$51,170. This compares to a budgeted number of \$69,325. YTD Offerings through the same period in 2017 were \$53,339.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed losses for March. Merrill Lynch showed a negative return of -0.89%. YTD return of Merrill Lynch is -.18%. The Key accounts showed a negative return of -1.36% for the month and is at -.47% YTD. This leaves us with a positive negative variance in this area YTD of (\$58,512). Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through March were \$710 under budget.

Pledges for 2018 remain at 42 pledging units for a total amount of \$119,720.

Property -

The window in the guild house door was fixed by Jim Johnson. There is a cracked window in the vestry room that requires repair.

Outreach - Mother Sue

The annual Spring Tea is this Sunday, April 15th following the 10:30 service. Please see Judy Burns if you can provide baked goods or a raffle basket. Proceeds from the event will benefit the Homeless Action Committee (HAC) Van, who provides support to the homeless in the City of Albany.

Sunday May 6, 2018 is the Albany CROP walk. A bulk of the proceeds benefits local food panties, with the rest providing support nationally. St. Peter's recruiters are Maria Holden and Tim Murphy (thank-you)! Please see them for the walker paperwork and recruit walkers. We invite you to consider walking or sponsoring another walker.

Old Business

Church Restoration – A Capital Fund Campaign was presented by F. Hershey which included a detailed outline proposing how we should go about announcing the restoration project and fundraising for the project along with a generalized timeline. M. Holden also presented a letter to the vestry that will be sent to the congregation to announce the project. This letter is to be sent out as soon as any proposed revisions are made.

Convention delegates were announced to be Tim Murphy, Caitlin Cehowski, and Alice Sanigular with Carly Crewell as an alternate. These delegates were approved on a motion by D. Spath and seconded by N. Creagan then unanimously approved by the vestry.

New Business

The Parochial report was presented and looked over by all vestry members. It was approved on a motion by J. Chenot and seconded by C. Gordon then unanimously approved by the vestry. It was then signed by Father Hartt, Mother Sue, G. Scala as Treasurer, and C. Gordon as Clerk.

The crop walk is on May 6th and Mother Sue reminded that we still need a delegate to pick up the information for our church to be involved. M. Holden and T. Murphy volunteered to both be liaisons to organize this event.

Associate Rector's Report - Mother Sue

Adult Education: The Lenten Study that began Ash Wednesday, February 14th 2018: Lent with Evelyn Underhill ended with our last group discussion on Tuesday April 3, 2018. The people really connected with the readings and our group has decided our next study will be Evelyn Underhill's Abba which is a deep meditation on The Lord's Prayer. We will plan this for the Fall – please join us!

We had a very strong Holy Week with great commitment on the part of many who attended and served, especially the altar guild, altar servers and office staff who all deserve our thanks! I also greatly appreciate the commitment of the choir members and their dedication to preparing and being at so many of the services. The Good Friday liturgy, in particular, moved me deeply and I am so thankful to serve with Fr. Hartt, a priest who I admire greatly and ministers to me even while we serve together.

Easter services were amazing. It was wonderful to worship with a full house and reconnect with so many people and visitors. The baptism of Nathan Gordon on Easter 2 was also a great celebration for our whole parish. There is a great "pulse" in our common life lately. I'm prayerful it continues!

The Daughters of the King will begin a study together: *Continuing the Journey: Spiritual Formation Guide*. We invite women of the parish to inquire if they are interested in learning more about joining the Daughters and their commitment to Prayer, Service and Evangelism. A new discernment class will take place next year.

Registration for Diocesan Convention (June 8-10) Is now open. One need not be a delegate to attend Convention – it is open to everyone for all or part of the weekend. This year's special guest, our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, is an enthusiastic preacher and I encourage you to attend Saturday's Eucharist to hear him preach.

Sunday Attendance - Fr. Hartt - 134.6

Rectors Report - Father Hartt

Father Hartt began by saying that he was encouraged by attendance during Holy Week. Total Easter attendance was 336. Good Friday and the following Seven Last Words by Haydn overlapped tightly. Perhaps the start time of our musical offering needs to be about 15 minutes later. It appears the attendance the Service attendance was 83 and for the music about 100. Palm Sunday attendance was 182. Maundy Thursday was 47. These are solid numbers for us, although Maundy Thursday was a little weak. 5 Lent was also strong at 135. Fr. Hartt mentioned this because there is a building momentum prior to Holy Week. Easter II was exceptionally strong with the Baptism of Nathan Gordon. We had 176 in attendance. The reception was a joy in fellowship. Fr. Hartt thanked the Chenot/Gordon family for the festive celebration that followed. Our fellowship around meals always points out the strength of relationships in the parish. We are a family.

Father Hartt reported that his church history class has concluded. The course ran for 14 sessions. Father Hartt also thanked Mtr. Waldron for her course on Evelyn Underhill. Christian Education in the parish has been formative for those who attend. Often is has helped to integrate new members. Fr. Hartt did say that he would like to see greater levels of parish participation and is looking at Sundays for occasional offerings.

Father Hartt said that he is again hearing stories from visitors/parishioners that parking remains a major issue. A member of the parish told Fr. Hartt of a family wishing to come to Christmas Eve service who gave up upon circling the block many times.

Father Hartt said that Average Sunday Attendance is now 134.6. He is concerned that this more positive number will soon be compromised by the summer exodus. Fr. Hartt said that such "rhythms" of a parish are hard to change. Saint Peter's does not a have a membership problem. Easter and Christmas Eve reveal this every year. The issue for us is frequency of attendance. We are not alone.

But Fr. Hartt then said how delighted he is by the influx of new energy and ideas from Christie Gordon, Ashley Spath and Vicky Paulter. The lunching of the new Facebook page has been a huge success. Christie has also been working on a parish brochure. These three young women are very savvy and adept at social media and newcomer engagement. Vicky recently invited a family from work. They came and were delighted. It is this sort of courage that we need. Vicky also posted a fine video on the Facebook page that involved our kids. It was a powerful presentation on sin and atonement. Other faces of the parish have been ably posted by Ashley and Christy, including Palm Sunday Choir footage. The Easter Egg Hunt pictures were fun. Father Hartt is encouraged by the power and commitment of our new generation of church leaders.

Diocesan Convention Delegates were discussed. We thank Tim Murphy, Caitlin Cehowski, Alice Singular and Carly Crewell for their willingness to represent the parish. This Convention will be significant because the Diocese will be visited this year by our new Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Michael Curry. A booklet is being assembled with a brief history of each parish along with a photograph. Fr. Hartt submitted our entry before Holy Week.

The beginning of next week will be a clergy conference at the SLC. Father Hartt and Mtr. Sue will be out of the office until Wednesday afternoon.

Father Hartt thanked Judy and Christy Burns for their work on the Spring Tea fundraiser. Donations wile logo to support the Homeless Action Committee vans that bring the homeless to shelters during code blue events. Father Hartt shared that the need in downtown continues to be severe. Our overflow shelter for women has made a meaningful contribution to helping with this crisis.

Father Hartt spoke of the Parochial Report. He thanked both George Scala and Mtr. Sue for their work on preparing the report which will be approved this evening. This report details financial and other figures of various kinds for the Diocese and Episcopal Church headquarters.

Plans for the painting of the interior of the church are moving along and completion of the work is scheduled by the end of the summer. This work is the product of much hard work. Fr. Hartt thanked Jim Chenot, Maria Holden, and Fred Hersey. The painting project was greatly aided by architect Jack Waite's Historic Structures Report which allowed us to understand the true historic paint colors. These colors were confirmed by samples taken by an expert known to Maria Holden. The parish will be kept informed.

In sum, Father Hartt says that he has been much encouraged of late with the influx of ideas and important projects. May God bless it forward.

A motion to adjourn was made by K. Cehowski and seconded by F. Hershey, then was passed unanimously by the vestry.
