From the Rector

The Bible & The World

It is not possible to understand the world without understanding the Bible. A provocative statement?

There are many things that shape human events. Wars and natural disasters, science and technology, economics and inventions, philosophies and theories, media and culture, diseases and cures, secular leaders and religious ones all have their impact. But under-girding this interplay of events is the Bible. Entire civilizations have been built on the Bible's principles. Entire nations have been built on the Bible's rejection. Consider our Nation's founding. Consider then the late Soviet Union. There is at the heart of almost every political and social struggle we face either the embrace or rejection of the Bible's authority and counsel.

The Civil Rights movement was permeated from top to bottom with the biblical word of the Prophets. A white Christian power structure was finally shamed into confronting its privilege and abuses. The struggle continues and does so in Biblical terms. While we are increasingly inclined in a secular culture to speak generically of justice, we know deep down those principles did not emerge out of nowhere. They had and have their origin in Scripture.

The history of Christianity has been spotty to be sure, but only the most extreme secularists would look at this world as better off without the Bible's impact and moral guidance. Indeed, one tragedy today is the lack of knowledge of the Bible's content. As a result, people believe the Bible says things that it doesn't and doesn't say things that it does. Increasingly, we live only on biblical vapors. Of course, religion gets trotted out at election time. We rightly complain about this misuse of faith, but most of us are nervous if our leaders won't embrace core principles of Biblical morality. Indeed, our Nation still overwhelmingly wants leaders of Faith. Why? I think we know why.

The case is sometimes made that all Biblical morality is just a sort of distillation of moral common sense. Nothing could be further from the truth. Any look at the cruelty of the pagan ancient world or modern atheistic political movements will debunk that claim. No, the truth is that the Bible has shaped our very way of thinking about right and wrong, life and death, hope and possibility for all humanity.

So where am I heading? My hope in this brief reflection is to encourage your participation in the Discovery Bible studies (DBS) that Mother Sue and I will be introducing this month.

What is unique about DBS is the way it goes about deepening our relationship to Scripture. Bible studies usually have the defect of promoting knowledge without a clear "lived out" response. Bible studies also tend to be teacher dominated and information driven rather than fostering an environment of the active engagement of all participants. DBS is about one shared question. The question of DBS asks is this: "Given what I read, what will I commit to do this coming week in obedience God's word?" This mode of Bible study is about action. It is about being a disciple responding obediently to the claim of the Word of God on our lives. DBS is also about mutual accountability.

The DBS group becomes an accountability vehicle. Week by week, group members check in with one another on their personally chosen "I will" statement. Suppose we read a Bible passage of Jesus teaching us that if we are to be forgiven we must ourselves forgive. A person in the group may commit to reconcile with a particular person. The group checks in at the next meeting, "How did your 'I will' go this week? Or perhaps we read about Jesus teaching his disciples to care for the poor. A person in the group might say, "I've been putting off helping at the soup kitchen. This week I will go and help in the kitchen." DBS also provides an opportunity for thanksgivings, prayer concerns, and simple acts of service by group members. A DBS group is typically about 8-12 people.

Often clergy hear the complaint that sermons aren't concrete enough or "real world" applicable. DBS deals with that issue head on. It is a Bible study leading to action. A truly biblical Bible study will call us into discipleship. Central to being a disciple is actually practicing what we are taught. Luke tells us that one day Jesus was particularly exasperated with his followers. Jesus said to them, "Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do what I tell you." (Luke 6: 46.)

The expression "practicing Christianity" exists for a reason. Disciples do the teaching. Disciples are also accountable to their Lord and one another. Part of the gift of Christian community is mutual encouragement in our practice of the Faith. We are vulnerable alone to sloth and discouragement. The group is life-giving as we live out together the call to do the teaching.

I started off the news article with the world and the Bible. But now what of the individual and the Bible? DBS is one powerful way to respond to that question.

God created us and our lives – created all of creation – with Sabbath built-in. *"Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them. And on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation."* (Genesis 2:1-2)

It's Time to Fall Back...

The reason we love setting our clocks back in the Fall is because it gives us an hour that wasn't planned on and probably wasn't scheduled. Many of us choose to rest with that one extra hour. What a difference it makes! Can you imagine how different life would be with just such an hour every day? Perhaps that's over-reaching. Well – at least one extra hour each week?

It's Time to Fall Back...

You don't need to just imagine what it would be like to have an extra hour of rest because you can create it and experience it. How do you do such a thing in your over-scheduled life? By scheduling it in like any other "must-do" appointment.

It's Time to Fall Back...

What do you place on your family calendar? Ball games, swimming practice, ballet lessons, and so on? Why not find one hour each week on your calendar for Sabbath. Pencil it in – no, use pen! Better yet, use a Sharpie permanent marker and block off that time.

It's Time to Fall Back...

It's Time to Fall Back to God's Sabbath as He created. God's Sabbath gives us rest. God's Sabbath give us a time to re-focus. Even more so, God's Sabbath gives us the opportunity to value Him over everything else; to trust him with one of our most precious resources – time. Lastly, God's Sabbath will give us refreshment and new perspective towards the rest of our lives.

Use that Sabbath hour for rest, for prayer, for meditating on God's Holy word, or anything else that honors God and draws you closer to him. The only 'rule' is that you stop 'doing' and start 'being'.

Discovery Bible Study Workshop

We know the words of Lord Jesus, what we call the Great Commission, "Go and make disciples..." Let's be honest, many of us don't have a clue on how to do this. On **Saturday, October 22nd** to you can learn how! 



Saint of the Month Club

St. Luke the Evangelist

Prayer:


Almighty God, who didst thy servant Luke the physician to set forth in the Gospel the love and healing power of thy Son: Graciously continue in thy Church the like love and power to heal, to the praise and glory of thy Name; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with the, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

Luke was a Gentile, a physician, and one of Paul's fellow missionaries in the early spread of Christianity through the Roman world. He has been identified as the writer of both the Gospel which bears his name, and its sequel, the Acts of the Apostles. He had apparently not known Jesus, but was clearly much inspired by hearing about him from those who had known him.

Luke wrote in Greek, so that Gentiles might learn about the Lord, whose life and deeds so impressed him. In the first chapter of his Gospel, he makes clear that he is offering authentic knowledge about Jesus' birth, ministry, death, and resurrection. The Gospel is not a full biography—none of the Gospels are—but a history of salvation.

Only Luke provides the very familiar stories of the annunciation to Mary, of her visit to Elizabeth, of the child in the manger, the angelic host appearing to shepherds, and the meeting with the aged Simeon. Luke includes in his work six miracles and eighteen parables not recorded in the other Gospels. In Acts he tells about the coming of the Holy Spirit, the struggles of the apostles and their triumphs over persecution, of their preaching of the Good News, and the conversion and baptism of other disciples, who would extend the Church in future years.

Luke was with Paul apparently until the latter's martyrdom in Rome. What happened to Luke after Paul's death is unknown. Early tradition has it that he wrote his Gospel in Greece, and that he died at the age of eighty-four in Boeotia. Gregory of Nazianzus says that Luke was martyred, but this testimony is doubted by most scholars. In the fourth century, the Emperor Constantius ordered the supposed relics of Luke to be removed from Boeotia to Constantinople, where they could be venerated by pilgrims.



From the Archives

Neil Keen – Church Organist and Choirmaster

This article should be entitled Neil Keen, Church Organist and Choirmaster, now with a 36 year tenure and counting. Neil came to St. Peter's Church following the musical careers of Donald Ingram (1969-1978) and Andrew Clarke (1978-1980).

Neil's career has been noteworthy. His choir has not only sung for weekly services, and many special occasions such as weddings and funerals, but for all the church holidays, including Christmas (Lessons and Carols) and Christmas Eve, Epiphany, weekly Lenten Services, Easter, Ascension, and Pentecost. Prior to Christmas, the choir has performed Handel's Messiah with chamber orchestra, and prior to Easter has sung Bach's Passion according to Saint Matthew or St. John or the equivalent with chamber orchestra. Over the years the choir has performed requiems by Mozart, Faure and Durufle; and oratorios and cantatas by Bach, Handel, Haydn, Mendelssohn, Cherubini, Schutz and Carissimi. Every spring the choir performs an unusual piece, for example *Rejoice in the Lamb* by Benjamin Britten or the *Chichester Psalms* by Leonard Bernstein. Such performances are especially enjoyed by the congregation.

Neil has taken the choir on numerous trips to Europe, especially to England. These trips involved performances in some of the most outstanding Cathedrals, such as at Worcester, Exeter, Canterbury and Oxford. In some cases this is the first experience young choir members have had to travel out of the country. There have also been trips to Toronto and to Washington D.C.


In addition to all of this, Neil performs a recital of organ music every Friday from 12:30 to 1:00. He gives attendees a chance to listen to music in a variety of styles and composers from Bach to Dupre. Especially nice was his performances of music by Durufle and Cezar Franck These are lovely concerts for which there is no charge.

But the highlight of Neil's tenure has been his training of young people as singers or organ scholars of note. Neil is working with younger members of the current choir to give them the musical skills they will be able to continue to use when they are older. Some young choristers of promise include Nancy Lundberg and Caroline Creagan. Other choir members trained by Neil have gone on to musical careers. One choir singer has become an operatic singer. Her name is Tory McKenna. She is making a name for herself in opera in California.

An organ scholar who has gone on to be the Organist and Choirmaster at St. James's Episcopal Church in West Hartford Connecticut is Vaughn Mauren. He recently returned to St. Peter's Church to give a concert to raise funds for the choir's next trip to Europe. His program included one of Bach's Preludes and Fugues, a Sonata by Mendelssohn, a work by Herbert Howells, and excerpts from two symphonies, one by Charles-Marie Widor and one by Louis Vierne . His playing and interpretation were masterful. He will be accompanying the choir on their next trip to Europe – this time to the Chichester Cathedral in England.

The congregation had a chance to show their appreciation to Neil when he was feted to a dinner for 25 years of service at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in 2005. But I hope we will say thank you after services for the work he does for the church week-by-week.

1. Approval of Minutes of Vestry Meeting , May 10, 2016

The **May 10, 2016** minutes were approved on a motion made by M. Kamyra and seconded by K. Cehowski. The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

2. Senior Warden Report – J. Chenot

As we moved into May finishing the Easter season, we finished celebrating Pentecost on the third Sunday of the month with five young children baptized with many family and friends attending, at the 10:30 service. It was encouraging see these new young families with new members baptized for the future life of the church and our congregation.

We had a slight change in our schedule for the beginning of this June moving the awards Sunday to the first Sunday, June 5th. Many thanks to the entire choir and Neil Keen for all their musical talents they bring each week as well the dedication of the Sunday school staff and Laura Saffares for all they do for our younger congregation. Also, congratulations to those who was acknowledged for their successes and milestones with awards and gifts.

The Diocesan Convention was held this past weekend at Speculator. Special thanks to our delegates, Judy Burns, Carly Crewell and Jack Ratzel for representing St. Peter's at this year's convention as well as our clergy, Mtr. Sue and Father Hartt.

Our choir is still on track to sing a week in Chishester Cathedral, England in the summer of 2017. Our choir director, Neil Keen is looking to recruit new individuals early in September for those who may be interested joining the choir and take this opportunity to come along for this great experience singing abroad in 2017.

This coming Sunday we will be honoring the Choir and Sunday school again following the 10:30 service where there will be an ice cream social at coffee hour hosted by the Sunday school. Following the service there will also be a choir picnic hosted at the Chenot's residence. The vestry and clergy would like to thank both of these important ministries for all their continued service and dedication to the spiritual life at St. Peter's.

We also have had our new pew cushions delivered and put in place. The feedback from the congregation has been quite positive and I would like to thank the vestry for moving forward with this project as well as the support they have given me and the church during the first six months of this year. It has been great to have such a wonderful vestry and clergy to work with - Thank you all.

3. Finance – G. Scala

George S. reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the month of May. Total offerings for the month were \$17,451 and YTD we are at \$92,527. This is (\$39,328) below budget projections but compares favorable versus 2015 May YTD numbers.

The investment/endowment accounts had positive months. Merrill Lynch was up 1.09% for the month and Key was up .95% for the month. YTD Merrill Lynch is at 1.12% and Key is at 1.45%. This brings us to a positive budget variance in this area of \$4,876. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses year to date are \$9,043 over budget primarily due to Capital Expenditures.

George also reported on the updated stewardship numbers. To date 2016 pledges are at 64 units at \$160,502.

George reviewed the Treasurers report for the month of April, 2016.

Motion to approve the budget was made by T. Murphy and seconded by D. Spath. The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

Daughters of the King: We continue to be honored to hold the daily prayers and intercessions of the parish with Confidential Prayer Requests submitted to us weekly. The DOK do not meet during the summer months but do continue our prayers daily.

ASA: The ASA data that was lost in March has been restored by Don Young. Thank you Don! This month's Vestry report includes the restored report data and format.

The average Sunday attendance is currently 129.6

10. Rector's Report - Fr. Hartt

We gather following yet another terrorist attack, this time in Orlando, Florida. The cowardly attack killed 50 and wounded 52 individuals at a nightclub. The attack was also a hate crime, as it was clearly leveled at the gay and lesbian patrons. Father Hartt commends to us the statement of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York:

Statement of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York in Response to the attack in Orlando on Sunday follows: "After Sunday's attack in Orlando as Christians we must speak out in support of LGBTI people, who have become the latest group to be so brutally targeted by the forces of evil. We must pray, weep with those affected, support the bereaved, and love without qualification. The obligation to object to these acts of persecution, and to support those LGBTI people who are wickedly and cruelly killed and wounded, bereaved and traumatized, whether in Orlando or elsewhere, is an absolute call on our Christian discipleship. It arises from the unshakable certainty of the gracious love of God for every human being. Now, in this time of heartbreak and grief, is a time for solidarity. May God our Father give grace and comfort to all who mourn, and divine compassion to us all."

Father Hartt thanked our Diocesan Convention Delegates: Carly Crewell, Jack Ratzel, and Judy Burns for their service to the parish and our Diocese. The 148th Diocesan Convention was held June 10th-12th in Speculator, NY. The Rev. Brewster Hastings of St. Anne's, Abington, PA, brought a ministry team to the Diocese to present a new method of Bible study that show great promise for reaching the hearts of both a new generation and those long in the church.

Bishop Ball's 90th birthday was celebrated at Convention. A wonderful video was assembled of his life from birth to present. The holy depth of his episcopate was well captured. Bishop Ball gave a brief address and blew out all of his candles.

Fr. Hartt was elected to the Disciplinary Board.

St. Peter's had five baptisms on Pentecost. The parish welcomes: Kyle Patrick Heller, Connor James Ingraham, Owen Keith Ingraham, Sophie Drew Clark, Alayah Melanie Monroe-Tamer to the parish.

Malcolm Moran was Confirmed at St. George's, Clifton Park, on May 16th. It is usual for there to be a regional Confirmation at the Cathedral, but this year Bishop Love's schedule did not permit it. We went to St. George's at the kind invitation of the parish. The liturgy was glorious. Malcolm was a wonderful adult student. Father Hartt spoke of the list of Confirmation age students now in the parish.

David C. Panzironi and Annette M. Hollis were married May 28. We rejoice with them.

Father Hartt proposed an overnight Vestry retreat for September 23-24. The retreat would overlap with a training Saturday morning in the Bible study method promoted at Convention.

The Albany Visitors Bureau continues to offer excellent promotions of our City. An upcoming promotion is called The Albany Top 40. It includes places of worship and an opportunity for a video promotion of your church. Fr. Hartt distributed materials and encouraged our involvement.

Father Hartt offered a 25 point plan for evangelism and parish growth.

Father Hartt included in the vestry packet materials which gave a better sense of our historic stewardship patterns.

The recent development in downtown Albany is encouraging. There is a sense of being at the "tipping point" for the improvement of our community around St. Peter's. With continued business and residential construction, the future looks bright. Parking continues to be unresolved and seemingly resolvable.

The new pew cushions are being enjoyed and appreciated. Fr. Hartt thanked the vestry for seeing this project through.

Fr. Hartt will be taking part of his vacation from the 18th - 20th of June.
