Feast of George Herbert, 2023

Beloved of God,

The Sunday morning before Lent, God sent me on a detour.

I was driving to St. Peter's just before 8 am, singing a Taize song to calm down and focus before worship. And suddenly, the thought *Drive to church through Arbor Hill* popped into my head.

I don't know how the Lord talks to you, but I hear God's voice in many ways. Sometimes I get a little nudge or thought like that, and I try to follow where it leads. So I drove through Arbor Hill, down Clinton and over to Pearl, and nothing remarkable happened. But another thought popped into my head: *Hand out ashes on the street on Ash Wednesday*. I sighed and said, (I think out loud), "OK, Lord."

Some of you know that I was a street priest for a good part of my ministry, so doing stuff on the street is within my comfort zone. But, I've never done street ashes. It seemed pretty clear that this was God's idea.

On Ash Wednesday after the noon service, I walked around downtown for 90 minutes with ashes for all comers, occasionally borrowing John Davis' gloves when my hands got too painful from the cold. We walked by St. Mary's. We walked by the bus stop at State and Pearl. We walked over to the South End. We walked up Madison and through the Concourse. And all along the way, God sent us people. State workers. People waiting for the bus. A man who needed prayer for cancer. Younger and older, women and men of varying races and ethnicities. Many people declined when we asked, "Would you like ashes?" A few silently came forward. And some rushed eagerly forward before I could open my mouth to make the offer.

So, what on earth was God doing with this adventure? Certainly, to act as a witness of his presence to the dozens we met, including the nine who received ashes. But also, to show John and I who our neighbors are. This is the work before us now as a congregation: to ask ourselves and God the question, "Who is our neighbor?"

Since I have come to St. Peter's to be your priest, we've spent time telling stories of our church — from our history and from our own experiences. We've reflected on who we are, and a rich picture has emerged: St. Peter's is a church with a glorious history of proclaiming Jesus as the Christ inside her walls in beautiful worship and outside her walls in works of mercy.

This brings us to the second part of our shared work: to hear more stories, but this time from our neighbors. Our city is changing. The pandemic changed the rhythm of the downtown work week. Yet more people — especially working professionals — are moving back into the city as new housing construction continues. Part of our work is to find creative ways to meet and bless these new neighbors. And, part of our work is to hear new stories from neighbors from our past.

To do that, this Eastertide, we'll hear a series of speakers during our worship services who will reflect on the question "Who is our Neighbor?" These speakers will come from both our mission partners (like Loaves and Fishes, the Capital City Rescue Mission and the Damien Center) and from churches with historical connections to St. Peter's (like St. Paul's and the Cathedral of All Saints).

In addition, on Sunday, April 23 (after the 10:30 service) and Tuesday, April 25 (at 7 pm on Zoom) we'll have two hour-long brainstorming meetings where we'll list our relationships and strengths as we seek God's fresh vision for St. Peter's. You'll hear more about these gatherings in the weeks ahead.

Since coming here, I have sensed a growing energy and hope for the future of St. Peter's as the Holy Spirit does his work among us. I am excited to hear many new voices around us, and I hope you'll listen with me. Because — I believe if we listen — we'll hear the voice of our Risen Lord and we'll be able to lead where he follows.



Beaver Cross Spring Break Camp:




Monday April 10th - Friday April 14th 2023

From the Archives

Design of St Peter's Church



The design of St. Peter's Church follows the plan for Episcopal churches in general and includes a Vestibule, a Narthex, the Nave, the Chancel and the Sanctuary.

As we enter the church and pass the front doors we enter into the Vestibule. It contains the burial place of Lord Howe, the Britisher who died at Fort Ticonderoga, and Colonel Munro who also died following his participation in the French and Indian War.

Leaving the Vestibule we come to the Narthex, a walled off area preceding the Nave, which is the church itself. In the early days of the Church, the Narthex was the place where non Christians could stay since the Nave was closed to them.

From the Narthex we go into the Nave, which consists of church benches. Following the Nave is the Chancel. The Chancel contains the Lecturn, the Pulpit, the Choir Stalls and the kneeling rail for Holy Communion. Going up three steps above the Chancel is the Sanctuary, the place where the priest prepares and blesses the Holy Communion. It is the holiest portion of the church.

The Sanctuary of St. Peter's Church consists of the Pruyn Altar and the decorative Reredos. The Reredos are behind the Altar and consist of two large angels kneeling at a cross. The Altar is beautifully decorated with Easter lilies at the Easter services.

Approval of the Vestry Meeting Minutes, January 10th, 2023

The vestry minutes from the January 10th meeting were approved on a motion by M. Lundberg, seconded by

J. Russom, then unanimously approved by the vestry.

Priest in Charge Report - Mtr. Christina

Rector stuff:

Preparing a Lenten Lunch Bible Study to be offered on Sundays.

Will be leading a "What are you Doing for Lent?" workshop on Sunday, Feb. 26.

Led a "How to Serve on a Prayer Team" teaching for the Daughters of the King chapter on Feb. 11 in preparation for offering monthly healing prayers again in the coming months.

Will offer The Great Litany on Fridays in Lent as a short devotional service, followed by coffee.

Did one home visit in the last month.

Coordinated with Dr. John Davis for his officiating and preaching at the Noonday Prayer service for Presentation of the Lord on Feb. 2.

Have trained one LEV and doing a second LEV training this week. Creating a visits log and getting a master schedule ready so that we can increase pastoral visitations.

Wrote and presented my Annual Report.

Updated the church marriage policies for members and non-members.

Working on a "Lent at St. Peter's" flyer to have available in the Vestibule.

Preparing for Holy Week services with Mary and others.

Practicing the Great Litany for Lent 1.

Have begun holding brief weekly staff meetings with the office manager and sextons on Wednesday mornings.

Traveled to my seminary in Ambridge, PA, to work on a theological writing project as part of my continuing education time.

Met with my spiritual director in January.

Interim stuff:

Big Picture Update: Epiphany tide concludes our theme of reflecting on God's surprises and revealing our identities in Christ. The Annual meeting report continued parish reflection on these themes of "Who Are We?"

Lent will be focused on "small picture" identity questions – who am I, as an individual, in the big story of God's love revealed in the cross? I'll try to encourage personal spiritual practices and preach to facilitate these questions.

Meanwhile, I'm attempting to put together a series of speakers for Eastertide from our mission partners (City Rescue Mission, Damien Center, St. Francis) as well as churches we have longtime historic links to (St. Paul's, the Cathedral) to help us reflect on the question "Who is my neighbor?" I'd like these speakers (ideally) to attend the 10:30 service, offer a 5-minute reflection at announcements, and be present at coffee hour to chat and answer questions of parishioners.

Administrative Update: The Task Force work is underway! Thanks so much for all your initial efforts. We've already seen good fruit come out of your discussions, and I expect more in future months.

Met with my interim ministry mentor, Bill Thomas, in late January on Zoom. Have another call scheduled with him later this week.

The Annual meeting went very well. Thanks to all the committees who were able to forward their reports. Again, thank you George for all your great reporting on our financials – you are irreplaceable. Also we want to thank Susan Smith for also running on the ballot for a vestry seat. Thank you for all your continuing love and ministries you bring to St. Peter's. Finally, thanks to Pam Gerfin and Tim Murphy for their services as tellers at the annual meeting.

The work task forces that were put together by Mother Christina have appeared to have met once or twice since our last meeting. I think we are all looking forward on finding out how everyone has progressed in their meetings. Thank you all in advance for all your work and dedication to this new project.

The Lenten season is slowly approaching. We will host our annual Shrove Pancake Dinner on February 21st. The following day, Ash Wednesday, there will be a 12:00 noon service and 5:30 evening service with our choir.

Finance - G. Scala

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for January. A summary of the month is as follows:

OFFERINGS: \$9,426 ENDOWMENT INCOME/(LOSS): \$180,024 EXPENSES: (\$51,078) NET GAIN/(LOSS): \$128,946

*for January there were \$37,526 in withdrawals to fund our excess of operating expenses versus offerings.

It should be noted, that the Endowment accounts encountered significant losses in 2022 so while the return for January is positive, we have a long way to go to recoup 2022 performance losses.

Offerings for the month of January 2023 were \$820 higher than for January 2022. Merrill Lynch (unrestricted) was up 5.64% for January. Key (restricted) was up 5.66% for January.

For 2023 we have received 31 pledges for a total of \$98,680.
