

ADVENT DREAMS

Sigmund Freud once observed that "dreams are the guardians of sleep." What he meant was that dreams are the working out by the unconscious mind of things that might jar us awake. In a way, dreams disguise thoughts and feelings that might otherwise cause us to break from sleep. It is an interesting theory. It got me thinking.

Advent's famous call is "keep awake!" It is the word of the Lord to us on the First Sunday of Advent. "Therefore, keep awake-- for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake." (Mark 13: 35-37.) Yet does this kind of awake mean we are not to be dreaming? Quite the contrary. We are entering God's call to dream more.

Put another way, do we believe God wants a dreamless people? A dreamless people is pretty much the plan we see in action each day. A dreamless world reduces life to cyber-mondays and black-fridays, aptly named. We stay awake for the wrong kinds of things. It is dreamless way of being.

I felt myself going into a dreamless sleep in the way Jesus warns against on my way home from Thanksgiving. The turkey was barely digested before the jingles began. "I'm dreaming of of a white Christmas." "He's checking his list and checking it twice. Gonna find out who's naughty and nice." These "Season's Greetings" were piped in on the overhead speakers everywhere. I couldn't even pump gas without "Frosty the snowman" attacking from above. It sure makes me want to go sleep just to make it stop. But like Pavlov's dogs, I am primed to go "How many shopping days left? I probably should have skipped talking to my loved ones at Thanksgiving and buried myself on the internet for those early deals."

Dreamlessness is a bad thing. We stay awake in the Jesus sense to dream big. Dream with God. Dream of the Savior of the dreamless. So, Advent is indeed a wake-up call. It says "wake-up" before Frosty by any other name comes to get you. Our God cannot be trivialized by such silliness, but we can. If we are not alert, we will cease to dream as God would have us dream. When you hear the silly "holiday-theme" music piped in overhead, say to yourself "Stay awake, my soul, they are coming after your dreams."

One last thought. No doubt Freud is right about the power of dreams to guard sleep in the ordinary cycle of life, but there is more to life than its ordinary cycle. Christian dreaming is the guardian of Life. May we all be found awake and dreaming Kingdom thoughts when He comes.

Happy Holidays...

When did it become normative to say Happy Holidays? What are we referring to, exactly? I recently read that there are over 30 holidays celebrated this time of year across many religions. Perhaps this catch phrase it meant to encapsulate them all. However, even within Christianity, this time of year one celebration seems to bleed into another nearly with no distinction other than lots of candy at Halloween, turkey at Thanksgiving and gift wrap at Christmas. But each of these holidays blend together into one long Holiday with excess, big meals, glittery gatherings and large celebrations in the secular sense while nearly missing the religious connection to what is being celebrated.


This doesn't seem right, nor traditional. If we look at the word 'Holiday', it stems from combining the two words 'holy' and 'day'. The concept of one taking a holiday was to allow a person time off from work to attend the religious ceremony that highlighted the faith aspect of the Holy Day. This has been nearly lost in contemporary society.

One of my FaceBook friends posted a rant about people that take issue with Christmas lights and decorations being in place even before Thanksgiving. She didn't see a problem. I personally love Christmas lights and decorations and know that people put them up when they can. Time and weather permitting, people tend to decorate earlier and earlier each year. But, doesn't this trend add to the generalizing that the phrase "Happy Holidays" conveys? What, exactly are we decorating for and celebrating?

I'm a bit more traditional (if you hadn't guessed). I like to take one Holiday at a time. I like to focus fully on each holy day's significance, both historically and what it means in my own life. I'm one of those people who even likes to wait until after church services on 4 Advent to decorate my home for Christmas. This way, I feel I experience a full Advent before moving on. But this year presents a problem because the fourth Sunday of Advent IS Christmas Eve! Hmmm...what to do? There surely won't be time to decorate my home on Christmas Eve between 4 Advent and Christmas Eve services. And yet, this is what used to hold tradition. My mother told me that when she was a young child, she would go to bed on Christmas Eve to a plain house, and wake up on Christmas Day to all the decorations, lights, Christmas Tree and presents – everything having arrived and put in place during the night hours while she slept! Wow, I thought! This is a lot of work for the parents (or even Santa Claus) – but what a statement it made! Christmas happened FULLY on Christmas Day! I like that tradition even if I haven't held to it myself.

This causes me to wonder how we, as a society got from that practice to our present situation? The only answer I can come up with is either we are too impatient to wait for an actual Holiday to arrive to celebrate it and/or our celebrations have become so grand they require more time to fit in "all the fixings". Perhaps, too, is this idea of blending all of the holy days into one long Holiday. Reality is our current customs are probably a blending of all three.

I'm not going to recommend that you and your family change your own traditions, including when and how much to decorate or how and when to prepare for the upcoming Christmas celebration. But, I would like to encourage you to reflect on what each step of that preparation signifies, from a faith perspective, and how much emphasis your family should or shouldn't place on it. This might truly help you develop a more robust Holiday celebration this year than even




before...that is my intent anyways!

The upcoming Annual Convention of the Diocese of Albany, scheduled for June 8th – June 10th, is our 150th Diocesan Convention. We are planning many special events at Convention to celebrate this milestone in the life of our Diocese. This year's theme is *Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever* (Hebrews 8:13). This theme reflects our Diocesan milestone, but also God's faithfulness throughout our history as a Diocese and even more His faithfulness throughout the history of the world and beyond.

We are honored to have with us for this special year's Convention the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, the Most Rev. Michael Curry. We will again have with us many other Bishops from various parts of the Anglican Communion throughout the world. There will also be a special Convention choir.

In order to more fully celebrate the 150th Convention of the Diocese and recognize all the parishes that make up the Diocese of Albany, we would like to have each parish represented by a banner in a grand procession at the Eucharist on Saturday afternoon. In the next few days, each parish will receive a letter from the Banner Committee, with details on this magnificent part of the weekend and how your parish can participate. If you don't currently have a banner, or your banner is not in good condition, don't worry – the Banner Committee has found an affordable way for parishes to get a banner and all that's needed to carry it and display it for less than \$100. This letter will be sent via email for those parishes that have email, and via regular mail for those who don't.

We'll still have the usual highlights of Convention including a multitude of workshops, Spirit-filled worship, beautiful music (traditional and contemporary), excellent preaching and teaching, and a time for prayer and healing ministry. The Diocesan Youth Rally will be available for middle school- and high school-aged kids and Vacation Bible School will be conducted for the elementary school-aged kids, as usual, and day care will be provided for children who are not old enough to attend school yet. And as always, there will be many opportunities for Christian fellowship with family and friends from around the Diocese and the wider Anglican Communion, as well as enjoyable entertainment and recreation, all in a beautiful Adirondack setting at Camp of the Woods in Speculator, NY.

You don't need to be a deputy to participate in this celebration of our life together. If you have never been to the Diocesan Convention, this would be a great year to come and celebrate! If you have been before, please join us again and help make this a grand celebration!

Composer of the Month Club



<u>Sir David Valentine Willcocks</u> (30 December 1919 – 17 September 2015) was a British choral conductor, organist, composer and music administrator. He was particularly well known for his association with the Choir of King's College, Cambridge, which he directed from 1957 to 1974. Prior to working at King's Willcocks served as organist at Salisbury and Worcester cathedrals.

Several of the descants and carol arrangements he wrote for the annual service of Nine Lessons and Carols were published in the series of books Carols for Choirs which he edited along with Reginald Jacques and John Rutter. These carol books are a principal source of Christmas music for choirs the world over. They also sparked a wider interest in ancient carols and in the composition of contemporary Christmas carols on old traditional texts.

Saint of the Month Club

Nicholas Bishop of Myra, c. 342

Prayer: Almighty God, who in thy love didst give to thy servant Nicholas of Myra a perpetual name for deeds of kindness both on land and sea: Grant, we pray thee, that thy Church may never cease to work for the happiness of children, the safety of sailors, the relief of the poor, and the help of those tossed by tempests of doubt or grief; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*



Very little is known about the life of Nicholas, except that he suffered torture and imprisonment during the persecution under the Emperor Diocletian. It is possible that he was one of the bishops attending the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea in 325. He was honored as a saint in Constantinople in the sixth century by the Emperor Justinian. His veneration became immensely popular in the West after the supposed removal of his body to Bari, Italy, in the late eleventh century. In England almost 400 churches were dedicated to him. Nicholas is famed as the traditional patron of seafarers and sailors, and, more especially, of children. As a bearer of gifts to children, his name was brought to America by the Dutch colonists in New York, from whom he is popularly known as Santa Claus.

From the Archives



Bishop Doane's Contributions to the Arts

Bishop Doane was not only an effective bishop with notable speaking and leadership skills. He also had an artistic flair that showed itself in areas that may be surprising.

Contributions to Art:

His contributions to art included support for a March 20, 1897, plan to include in the Albany Historical Society a new art gallery which would display in bi-annual exhibits many excellent and rare paintings held in the City of Albany. Other supporters of the art gallery included Mayor John Boyd Thacher, the Rev. Dr. W.W. Battershall, Jesse W. Potts and Robert C. Pruyn. In Doane's time the property was acquired and work on construction begun.

Contributions to Architecture:

His contribution in the area of architecture was amazing. The Cathedral of All Saints had an imposing plan. It was the first Episcopal cathedral in America to be built on the English model including a church, a hospital, a convent and a school. The cathedral was to be well made as are European cathedrals which are sometimes centuries in the making. Erastus Corning Sr. (creator of the New York Central Railroad in 1854) purchased the land for the cathedral in installments, beginning in 1872. The architect Robert Gibson, a graduate of the Royal Academy of Arts of London was chosen as cathedral architect. His grand design was in the style of Gothic Revival. An engraving of his original design hangs in our church archives.

The interior of the cathedral was to house ponderous pillars and narrow windows. There would be a side chapel to be called St. Michael's Chapel. There would be three rose windows, and a great east window, all highly decorated. When finished the cathedral would seat about 2500 worshippers.

By June of 1884 all the foundations were laid, and by the fall of 1888 the provisional building was ready for occupancy. The church was dedicated on November 20, 1888. It was the completion of almost twenty years of effort on the part of the bishop, chapter and diocese. And although in use for all services, the cathedral today still remains unfinished, with selected spires to be built.

Contributions to Music:

In the area of music Bishop Doane wrote the words for "Ancient of Days" with music composed by J. Albert Jeffery. It is a rousing five verse processional hymn. Even today our congregation sings this hymn.

Contributions to Poetry:

Bishop Doane wrote poetry. One example of his poetry was a little book dated 1901 entitled "Rhymes for Time to Time."

Another sample of his poetry is his famous poem to his dog Cluny.

"I am quite sure he thinks that I am God – since He is God on whom each one depends for life, and all things that His bounty sends – Not quick to mind, but quicker far than I To Him whom God I know and own; his eye, Deep brown and liquid, watches for my nod: He is more patient underneath the rod Than I, when God His wise corrections sends. He looks love at me, deep as words e'er spake; And from me never crumb or sup will take But he wags thanks with his most vocal tail; And when some crashing noise wakes all his fear He is content and quiet if I'm near, Secure that my protection will prevail; So faithful, mindful, thankful, trustful, he Tells me what I unto my God should be"

Approval of the Minutes of Vestry Meeting, September 12, 2017.

We also need to thank to Jordan Chenot and CJ Gordon for all their assistance cooking on the grill. Lastly, many thanks to those who brought a dish to pass and making the picnic run smoothly and successfully. The picnic is always a great time for all to enjoy great food and enjoy each other's company.

First communion, confirmation and Bible study classes are in full swing. I would like to thank both Mother Sue and Father Hartt for all the work they put into these programs already in place as well as some new activities that have been added to the calendar.

We will be sending out the third quarter statements to our parishioners by the end of this week. The clergy, vestry and finance committee has begun getting the word out pertaining to the stewardship campaign. This year we have put important pieces of information in the weekly leaflets pertaining to stewardship and will be putting supplement information in the back of the church's informational area. Consecration Sunday will be celebrated on Sunday, October 29th. The finance committee will also start working on next year's budget so the vestry can begin reviewing it at the next vestry meeting. It is so important that we continue to get the message out to the congregation the importance of stewardship, increasing the endowment annually as well as gifting in their wills and estate planning.

As November approaches, there are a few events that will be taking place to take note of. One to mention is our pre-Thanksgiving dinner which will be held on November 11th. Each year we have an incredible turnout for this event and I hope those who have not come in the past will please mark this date on your calendar. This event it is a great time to get the congregation together for great food and fellowship. On Saturday, November 18th, the choir will be baking pies for Thanksgiving as a fundraising event; fliers will be out for those who would like to preorder them. Also in November, we begin preparing steps needed to continue our efforts hosting the overflow homeless shelter again this year beginning the first week in December. This year will be our ninth year and we will continue as we did last year accommodating women looking for shelter for a second year. The Albany City Mission is still in the process of rehabbing an additional building in Albany dedicated to women, which is sorely needed in downtown Albany, and they have had a large calling for this important ministry helping these women in the local community every day. For those women in the congregation or others that may want to volunteer helping with City Mission coordinators welcoming these women and helping them get settled each night with light snacks and beverages, we will have two orientations beforehand at the church. The first one will be on Tuesday, November 7th at 7:00 and the second one on Saturday, November 18th at 10:00. The congregation has been very generous in the past supporting this ministry with food and monetary donations and we hope that this generosity will continue again this year for those who are in need of a safe and warm place at night during the upcoming winter nights.

Lastly, Jim wanted to thank the Clergy, vestry, choir and Neil for all their work and support during the very busy upcoming schedule of events that lead us from musical performances to special services and dinners that will be coming up in the near future as well as getting ready for the Advent season. Also, we keep those in mind who are on committees that dedicate so much of their time and talents behind the scenes each week as well as those in the office; your hard work does not go unnoticed. I want to thank each and every one of you for all your help and support.

Finance - G. Scala - Treasurer's Report - October Meeting

George S. reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the month of September. Offerings for September were \$13,249. Total offerings YTD are \$162,871. This compares to a budgeted number of \$205,238. YTD through the same period in 2016 was \$164,458.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed for September. Merrill Lynch showed a positive return of +1.58%. YTD the Merrill Lynch account shows a positive return of 10.28%. The Key accounts showed a return of 1.26% for the month. YTD the Key accounts show a positive return of +11.14%. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area YTD of \$365,945. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through September are \$35,992 over budget. YTD we show a gain of \$147,639, primarily as a result of performance of the investment accounts.

Pledges remain at 54 pledging units for a total amount of \$143,646.

A motion was made to approve \$7,800 in roof repairs and railings at the church. The motion was made by M Lundberg and seconded by T. Murphy The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

Women's Bible study began on October 19th and will meet on Tuesday evenings at 5:00 in the Vestry Room (on non-Vestry Tuesdays). We are reading and reflecting on Lazarus Awakening: Finding your Place in the Heart of God, by Joanna Weaver. The study lasts 10 weeks long and we welcome the women of the parish to join us.

The Blessing of the Animals was held on Sunday, October 8th at 3:00 with 4 dogs and 8 humans present! It was a great time of prayer and celebration of our pets and their places in our lives.

Daughters of the King are invited to the annual assembly of Daughters of the Diocese on Saturday, November 4th from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. at Christ the King Spiritual Life Center. The title is The Kingdom of Heaven - Building a Nest in God's Tree.

Next Sunday, October 15th, is the Annual Neighborhood Prayer Walk, sponsored by the DOK during which we will offer prayers in various stops in downtown Albany. We invite all members of St. Peter's to join us as we pray for our downtown neighborhood.

This month and during November, the DOK are requesting parishioners bring in personal care items (shampoo, conditioner, hand/body lotion, toothpaste, lip balm/gloss, hand wipes, sanitizer, personal feminine products, etc.) for the Blessing Bags for the women of our Overflow Homeless Shelter.

We've had three deaths since the last Vestry meeting and the clergy thanks Pat, Ian, Neil, Angie, the altar guild, Gordon Lattey and Geoffrey Hoderath for their support for our services. Please pray for the Luther, Miller and Mahar families.

The annual Capital City Rescue Mission banquet was Tuesday October 10th, with the clergy attending. We continue to be moved by the amazing work and witness for our Lord the Mission is making in the City of Albany. Please continue to pray for and support this ministry. Their current appeal is to renovate a 40,000 square foot factory to provide 16 apartments for women and their children, along with instructional space, a children's room, exercise room, a teaching kitchen and rooftop patio.

The annual Diocesan Bible Symposium will be held on Saturday, October 14 at The Cathedral of All Saints, 62 S. Swan Street, Albany NY 12210. The speaker this year is The Rev. Dr. Michael Cover, an Episcopal priest and Assistant Professor of Ancient Christianity and Judaism at Marquette University, and a frequent contributor to The Living Church. The title of Fr. Cover's presentation is Not as Orphans: Praying and Preaching with the Saints of Scripture. I am registered to attend and hope additional members of St. Peter's will join us.

Rectors Report - Father Hartt

Father Hartt spoke to the Vestry about the Stewardship program for this year, "Journey to Generosity." It is a program of The Episcopal Church Stewardship Office. The in-gathering of pledges will occur by mail and at both Services on our Stewardship Sunday, October 29th. Father Hartt thanked George Scala and Jimmy Chenot for their work on the campaign. Our stewardship drive will continue into November and will include a portion on legacy gifts.

Father Hartt spoke about his church history course. Participants are finding the book to be quite good. Many report learning important events in the life of the Church for the first time. There are some parish members who cannot attend the class, but are keen to read the book due to the good reviews. Father Hartt said that Mark Noll's Turning Points: Decisive Moments in Church History ought to be in every parish library. Given the rich history of Anglicanism and Saint Peter's, it is an especially important work for us.

The topic of Vestry elections was discussed.

Father Hartt thanked all who made the Parish Picnic a success. It was well attended. Most of all, our honoring of Pat Shortall was very moving. We give thanks for Pat and his work among us. Pat Shortall officially retired at the end of July. However, Pat will remain at Saint Peter's with the part-time hours permitted by the Church Pension Plan.

The Pre-Thanksgiving Dinner was discussed. We have only one more Vestry meeting prior to the event. Fr. Hartt asked about the volunteers needed for the event. The clergy will be at the Diocesan Clergy Conference November 7-10, but back for the dinner.

The Messiah is scheduled for December 3rd, Lessons and Carols will be 12/17. The pageant will be on 12/10. There will be a single Service of Holy Communion at 8:30AM on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, which falls on Christmas Eve this year. It is important to get the word out that this early Service is not an "early" Christmas Eve Service. Christmas Eve Services will fall at the usual times 4:30PM and 10:PM, with Caroling at 9:30PM.

Father Hartt spoke about Sunday attendance figures for the Diocese and surrounding Dioceses. Our own parish figures were discussed.

Mother Waldron and Fr. Hartt attended the Capital District Rescue Mission fundraiser last evening. The City Mission is placing a good bit of focus on women and children, including the construction of new program housing. Our overflow sheltering of women has proved helpful to the Mission in many ways. Father Hartt spoke of the hospitality shown by our members to the women, especially the "blessing bags." These bags provide personal items for the women.

Father Hartt spoke of our need to encourage more regular attendance.

Parking is a serious issue for the parish and the problem is getting worse with the development downtown. There are no easy answers. Part of the problem are the parking rates of the hotel are high enough to encourage guests to park on the street.
