What is Alpha?

I hope that your summer was restorative and fun. Your clergy understand that the church can be quite warm in the summer. Please know that your faithfulness through the summer is appreciated.

As Episcopalians, we are aware that the church year begins on Advent 1. Of course, we actually live it out along the lines of the school year. In August, your clergy are usually focused on how to juggle fixed items of the St. Peter's calendar with our educational or devotional offerings for the parish. This is not always easy. The fixed calendar items have a way of driving the train -- parish picnic, Pre-Thanksgiving Thanksgiving Dinner, Hanging of the Greens, and so on. It is hard to get space for what we want to offer at a time people are available to come, but we do our best. One such offering this year is Alpha.

Alpha is an eleven-week course in basic Christianity. It comes out of the Church of England and has been embraced by the past three Archbishops of Canterbury. Alpha is now global in reach. It has been used across many denominations. If one were to think of what CS Lewis meant by "Mere Christianity," Alpha would be just that. CS Lewis in fact began his seminal work as a radio program.

Originally, Alpha was designed as a parish course for new members of Holy Trinity, Brampton in England. It was a tool for integration of new members often unfamiliar with the basics of the Faith. It was so successful in this way that it grew into a program on basic Christianity. Alpha describes their program in this way: "Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith, typically run over eleven weeks. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. Alpha is run all around the globe, and everyone is welcome."

Holy Trinity, Brampton was a struggling parish when the Alpha program began. It has since grown to well over a thousand members. In no small part, the growth can be attributed to the charismatic nature of the clergy involved at Holy Trinity, Nicky Gumbel in particular. But Alpha has created talks in DVD form and the program is typically run in that manner. Alpha begins with a light meal, followed by the DVD talks and small group discussion. The DVD session averages about 30 minutes. The discussions are facilitated by laity or clergy.

Saint Peter's will run the Alpha course formally in the spring. The weather will be more predictable and the calendar a little less crowded. However, we need to get some parish members trained in how to use the program effectively. I am looking for volunteers to experience the program in a somewhat accelerated form. You do not need to commit to being a discussion leader later. The talks are worthwhile in themselves. The first session will be on Wednesday, October 3rd at 6pm.

I ask your prayers for Alpha. As your clergy minister to the broader community, it is clear that a course in "basic Christianity" in some form is essential these days. A refresher course is, of course, good for us all! If you are interested in Alpha, please let me know. I will be happy to answer any questions and would look forward to being with you in experiencing Alpha.

Every September, I can't help but remember with fondness the start of a new school year. And so, we begin our full round of events, special gatherings, meetings, worship services and Bible studies in the Fall; many of which have taken a hiatus over the summer months.

With the start of each new school year, there is great anticipation for the growth of one's intellect, character and even social or athletic standing within his/her community. How can we approach our "new year" at church with the same level of anticipation and excitement? What at church are you excited to experience this year? Are you looking forward to growing in prayer, in service, in worship or in fellowship? Is there a new ministry that you've always wondered about? Perhaps you are feeling called to more frequent worship or to filling your pew by inviting a friend to church? Maybe you'd like to learn about one of the Guilds? Or, perhaps you are feeling called to plan Outreach events with us? Maybe stewardship is on your thoughts and you'd like to re-commit a pledge to our Church? Perhaps you'd like to join one of the Bible study groups? These questions could go on and on!

Everyone might look forward to growth in a unique way this year at St. Peter's, but I do hope that everyone will look forward to growth itself. One of the dangers of community life in church is to fall into patterns that are comforting and yet don't grow us. I am not suggesting that there aren't times in our lives that we just need to come to church to seek refreshment and nourishment for our souls. Those seasons do occur. But when those seasons end, spiritual growth should be anticipated afterwards.

If you have felt "stagnant" in your spiritual life, I pray you take this invitation to view September as a new "school" year, full of excitement and anticipation to see what God will do in our lives both individually and corporately. Every week that we gather we hear wonderful accounts of people's lives changed long ago when God acted in incredible and miraculous ways. Even though the canon of Holy Scripture is closed, this doesn't mean that God's miracles have ended, nor that God doesn't act in our world today. He is ever present and wants to continue to be with us day in and day out. And as old as we might get, God can continue to teach us, as long as we remain open to Him.

In short, I'd love for each us to live into our Diocesan Motto this year: "Disciples making Disciples". The first disciples were students of Jesus who looked to him as their rabbi – their teacher. May we do the same. So, it's back-to-school for us all. May September provide a new start of anticipation and excitement for St. Peter's Church!



MUSIC CORNER

Just in case you think conflict in churches is a new thing, check out this news article from the past.

June 17, 1901, Binghamton NY -

"There is an interesting state of affairs at the First Methodist Church at Chenango Forks. The minister had his horse shod at the shop of a blacksmith who was not a member of the church. A rival blacksmith, who was a church member and an intimate friend of the organist's mother, complained, and the organist refused to play. The choir took the part of the organist, and there was no music at the service yesterday. Then the minister put a padlock on the organ, and when some of the choir attempted to make it unpleasant for him, the minister barred them from the church." - from The Music Trades, June 29th 1901

Saint of the Month Club



Constance, Nun, and her Companions, Commonly called "The Martyrs of Memphis," 1878

In August, 1878, Yellow Fever invaded the city of Memphis for the third time in ten years. By the month's end the disease had become epidemic and a quarantine was ordered. While 30,000 citizens had fled in terror, 20,000 more remained to face the

pestilence. As cases multiplied, death tolls averaged 200 daily. When the worst was over ninety percent of the population had contracted the Fever; more than 5,000 people had died. In that time of panic and flight, many brave men and women, both lay and cleric, remained at their posts of duty or came as volunteers to assist despite the terrible risk. Notable among these heros were Constance, Superior of the work of the Sisters of St. Mary in Memphis, and her Companions. The Sisters had come to Memphis in 1873, at Bishop Quintard's request, to found a Girls School adjacent to St. Mary's Cathedral. When the 1878 epidemic began, George C. Harris, the Cathedral Dean, and Sister Constance immediately organized relief work among the stricken. Helping were six of Constance's fellow Sisters of St. Mary; Sister Clare from St. Margaret's House, Boston; the Reverend Charles C. Parsons, Rector of Grace and St. Lazarus Church, Memphis; and the Reverend Louis S. Schuyler, assistant at Holy Innocents, Hoboken. The Cathedral group also included three physicians, two of whom were ordained Episcopal priests, the Sisters' two matrons, and several volunteer nurses from New York. They have ever since been known as "The Martyrs of Memphis," as have those of other Communions who ministered in Christ's name during this time of desolation.

The Cathedral buildings were located in the most infected region of Memphis. Here, amid sweltering heat and scenes of indescribable horror, these men and women of God gave relief to the sick, comfort to the dying, and homes to the many orphaned children. Only two of the workers escaped the Fever. Among those who died were Constance, Thecla, Ruth and Frances, the Reverend Charles Parsons and the Reverend Louis Schuyler. The six martyred Sisters and priests are buried at Elmwood Cemetery. The monument marking the joint grave of Fathers Parsons and Schuyler bears the inscription: "Greater Love Hath No Man." The beautiful High Altar in St. Mary's Cathedral, Memphis, is a memorial to the four Sisters.

We give thee thanks and praise, O God of compassion, for the heroic witness of Constance and her companions, who, in a time of plague and pestilence, were steadfast in their care for the sick and dying, and loved not their own lives, even unto death: Inspire in us a like love and commitment to those in need, following the example of our Savior Jesus Christ; who with thee and the Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, one God, now and forever. *Amen.*

From the Archives

Creating the Church Altar

The Pruyn Altar of St. Peter's Church when it is set up for Communion Service consists of the center cross, candlesticks with candles, holy scriptures, the chalice and paten set for communion, the fair linen, and a frontal. Often there are flowers added to grace the Altar. Nearby on the Credence Table are the cruets for water and wine and the ciborium for the host.

The following gifts were made to the Church for the altar:

<u>Two three-branch candlestick holders</u> - The gift of Edmund and Ella Cowie. The dedication reads:

To the Glory of God and in Thanksgiving for our Parents Edmund and Ella Cowie by their Children 1991

Two single candlesticks - These were dedicated as follows:

The first - In Loving Memory of John Palmer Harcourt The second - In Loving Memory of Samuel and Lois Harcourt

The central cross - This was dedicated:

In Loving Memory of Thomas Yates Wilson

On the Altar:

The dust cover - This covers and protects the the fair linen until the time of Holy Communion when it is removed.

<u>The frontal</u> - The frontal is placed over the altar. A portion of the frontal hangs below the altar and contains a design. These frontal designs are very beautiful. A variety of frontals are available for various seasons of the church year.

The fair linen - The fair linen is placed over the frontal.

<u>The chalice</u> - The chalice (cup) has several coverings. It is first covered by a purificator. Above this is the wafer which is taken and broken by the priest during the communion service. Above this is the veil, an 18 to 24 inch square which is placed over the chalice. It must be large enough to touch the altar on all sides. Finally the burse covers all. It is a hinged case made of two 9 inch squares of silk with Plexiglas inserts and may contain purificators. Both burse and veil have the same designs as the frontal.

<u>The corporal</u> - The corporal is a cloth which is placed below the chalice and the paten. Stray bits of host or drops of wine are gathered here.

The purificator - The purificator is used to wipe the chalice.

<u>The lavabo</u> - The lavabo bowl is used to rinse the hands of the celebrant. The lavabo finger towel is used to dry the hands of the celebrant after rinsing.

The Credence Table:

This table is in the east wall of the Sanctuary. On the Credence Table are the credence cloth, the ciborium, which is a container for the host, and the cruets containing water and wine. The lavabo bowl and lavabo finger towel are located here.

Below the Altar in bas-relief are three Greek symbols:

XP *Chi Rho* - A Christogram in which the Greek symbols for Chi and Rho are placed so that the vertical stroke of the Rho intersects with the center of the Chi.

HIS - An abbreviation of the name Jesus - Symbolizing the Holy Name of Jesus.

AO Alpha Omega - Symbolizing Christ as the beginning and the end of all things.



Welcome Home Initiative a program for combat veterans

Monday - Wednesday, November 12th - 14th

The Welcome Home Initiative© is a healing program for military combat veterans and spouses. These veterans may be suffering in varying degrees from Post-Traumatic Stress or Moral Injury and are in need of Soul Repair. The format of the program helps veterans and spouses understand the hidden impact of combat and provides a safe place for their emotional healing. This essential spiritual and emotional healing is a complement to healing received from medical, psychiatric, and social services.
