### All Saints Local Saint

*"But I am among you as the one the who serves."* (Luke 22:27.)

All Saints' Sunday is beloved by Episcopalians. There are countless reasons. The hymns are glorious, the mood upbeat and triumphant, and the theme of the day is often embedded in the stained glass windows. Yet the even greater truth about All Saints' is that it is embedded in our lives and the lives of those closest to us. Indeed, we of Saint Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church ought to be even more conscious of sainthood in the lives of "regular" Christians than our High Church brothers and sisters up the street.

The "protestant" view of sainthood strives to make the case found in scripture and well expressed in the hymn, *"I sing a Song of the Saints of God."* As the last line of that popular Anglican hymn goes, "They lived not only in ages past, there are hundreds of thousands still, the world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will. You can meet them in school, or in lanes, or at sea, in church, or in trains, or in shops, or at tea, for the saints of God are just folk like me, and I mean to be one too." (Hymnal 1982, #293.)

Knowing that very spirit of sainthood is celebrated among us, let us give it some flesh and blood. "You can meet him in church, the Pumpelly Room, or the tower, at coffee hour, the sacristy, the gym, or saving flowers, for one saint of God is Pat Shortall, and we mean to honor him too."

If there is one saint of God at St. Peter's that I would want to see in the stained glass windows, it is Pat Shortall. Like the multiple places one can meet him, it is impossible to do justice to the multitude of duties that Pat undertakes for us. There is an old joke among clergy that the ordination of a deacon lists the various expected ministerial duties, but then ends "...and you are to carry out other duties assigned to you from time to time." I would say that phrase captures the life of a sexton!

Pat helps the elderly and shut-ins with needed tasks and errands, attends every church function to set up and close down – often without help. Pat knows Altar Guild like the back of his hand and saves us in a pinch. Pat alone knows the key for every door *and* can fix the lock. Pat is a part-time florist, plumber, electrician, painter, bulletin distributor, acolyte, fireman, and frugal parish shopper. Pat does amazing high-wire acts changing lightbulbs. Pat stays up late for deliveries or building access. Pat waxes, polishes, cleans, mops, and orders supplies. Pat has endured endless brutal winters of snow removal, rising at the frigid crack of dawn. Pat is parish historian of the fabled stories.

Pat gives rides to the homeless shelter or bus station with some of the clergy's hardest cases of need. Pat brings food and covers up the sleeping homeless man whom he stumbles on in our vestibule. Pat knows our names and loves our children. Pat often risks his life for us – and I kid you not. He is our security guard with some questionable characters and ventures far up into our tower. Indeed, one day we almost lost Pat through a hole in an upper floor of the tower as he rang the bells for a wedding. There are messes that Pat has cleaned that are unmentionable. All of these things, and the list has only just begun, speak to what we expect of Pat but often don't realize. When Judgment Day comes for this rector, I fear God will say to me, "Why were you not more like Pat?"

I would put Pat Shortall in the stained glass windows in a heartbeat. Indeed, he is the heartbeat of Saint Peter's at her very best -- a church that serves, that does not run from need, that undertakes her God-given mission with the gentle and wise spirit of Pat Shortall. We are blessed by him. He is one of our saints of God -- and we would do well to watch him closely to learn how to be even better Christians. Give our local saint Pat a thankful hug!

## From the Associate Rector:

### The church, on a Mission...

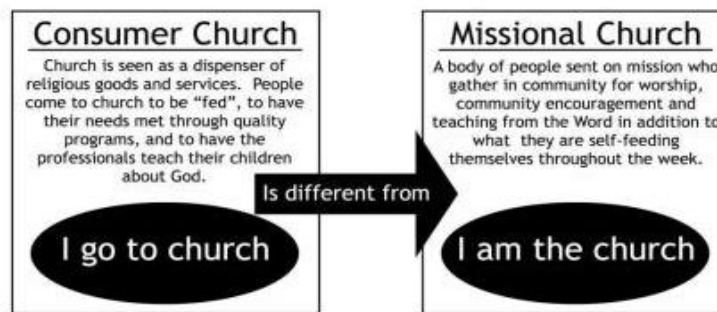
I'm remembering a childhood game. Locking fingers together, we'd recite: "This is the church, here is its steeple". Then turning our hands upside down, "Open the doors and see all the people!" as we waved our fingers about.

This childhood game reminds us what we *know* but don't always *remember*: the church is not the building or its ornaments, but rather the church IS the people. The church is the people who worship; the church is the people who sing; the church is the people who serve; the church is the people who give; the church is the people who pray.

Different people form our church from various backgrounds. This is part of what makes us great. However, collectively, we are one church; one church made up of many members. Paul writes much about this in his letters and even likens the church to one physical body with many parts; one person is the arm, one the leg and so on. The important thing is for the many parts to work together and form the whole – the Church. And because we form the Church, we, therefore, have one Mission together.

If you were to introduce St. Peter's Church to others, how would you describe it? Would you describe the building? Would you describe its ornaments? Would you describe its people? Would you describe its mission? I hope you answered yes, yes, yes, yes!

I found this graphic in my Facebook newsfeed recently. It compares "Consumer church" with "Missional church:



I think we can say that St. Peter's (of the past) is a Consumer Church. This model served us and many churches throughout America for many decades, even centuries. But this model of church may not serve us best for our future. There's many reasons for this, the biggest being there just aren't enough consumers today...when we open the doors, we don't see "all" of the people any longer. There are some members who have died, some have moved away, and others who find their schedules filled increasingly with other things on Sunday mornings. Further, it is difficult to add to or replace these members with new members as more and more people in our society drift further away from their Christian roots.

The Missional Church model, however, may serve us very well for our future because it is not solely dependant on "opening the doors and seeing all of the people". This is because the Missional Church exists as comfortably outside the doors as within them. The Missional Church doesn't rely on Sunday morning alone but rather a life of discipleship for Christian growth and formation. The Missional Church doesn't look inward at what is happening within our space but rather looks outward at being the church out in the world. The Missional Church doesn't rely on its current or known members alone but rather all people seeking Jesus Christ coming together to worship, to learn about and to serve God.

The question you might ask yourself is, 'Does this excite or frighten me?' I know we all love St. Peter's for all that it has been in the past. Could we love St. Peter's in light of this new model as well? Could we not only love it but be a part of it? You might even ask yourself, 'Will I go to church' or 'Will I BE the church'? Being the church is vital in the Missional Church model.

Being the church is the call of every Christian. Our Diocesan motto, Disciples making Disciples, implies being part of the Missional Church....growing, learning, serving and leading others in the faith. This is the call of not only the clergy but the lay members as well. Our baptismal covenant echos these thoughts with our promise to "proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ". In fact, that is a great definition of being church and being part of the Missional Church: proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ Jesus. This happens in the sanctuary, in the market, in your home, in your neighborhood, in your workplace and in our wider community.

The Church is surely on a Mission to show and tell the world about our savior Jesus Christ...are you? We hope and pray that you are on Mission with us.

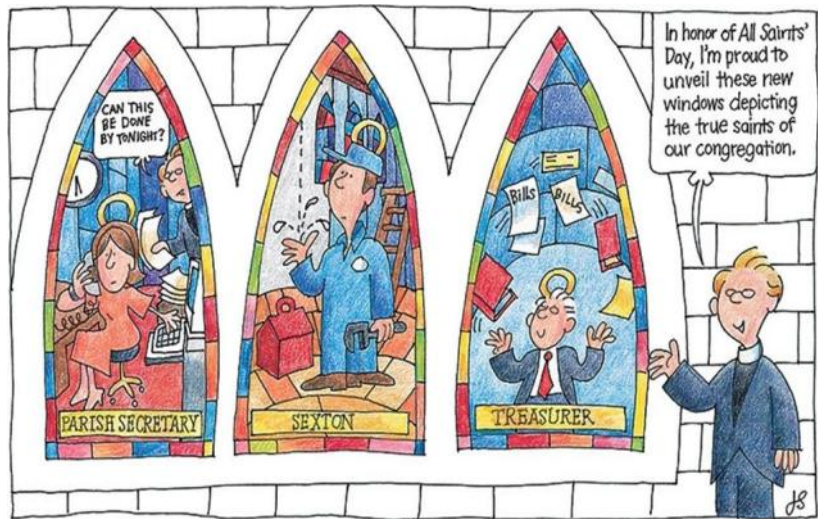

## Overflow Homeless Shelter

*Could you consider giving up one evening this winter to offer the gift of hospitality and show another the love and mercy of God?*

The St. Peter's overflow homeless shelter will open for its 7<sup>th</sup> season on December 1<sup>st</sup> to augment the ministry of the Capital City Rescue Mission to Albany's homeless by housing up to 20 men when their shelter has exceeded capacity.

We are currently receiving donations of food items and are also scheduling volunteers to offer hospitality during the evening hours; the hours for this are from 8pm until 11pm on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Guild House (next to the church).

Food items needed include: coffee, tea, sugar, popcorn and snacks, cereal (hot and cold), peanut butter, bread, fresh fruit, milk and juice along with fresh baked items. These can be dropped off to the church office any weekday, or brought to church on Sundays and given to Pat. Thank you in advance for your continued support.

### From the Archives

#### **Outreach - The Capital City Rescue Mission St. Peter's Overflow Homeless Shelter**



Throughout St. Peter's history there have been projects to help those in need. We especially reached out to poor orphan children. Today one of our most extensive programs is our Overflow Homeless Shelter which gives homeless men a place to sleep during the winter months out of the cold. Initiated on November 2, 2009, the shelter is an extension of the Capital City Rescue Mission's Homeless Shelter.

The Capital City Rescue Mission currently located at 259 South Pearl Street was founded in 1949. It is "dedicated to proclaiming the life changing gospel of Jesus Christ to the homeless and needy of the Capital Region." From simple beginnings the Rescue Mission now has an eight building campus, including a medical clinic and facilities for long term addiction recovery. The Mission sleeps 240 people every night, serves 700 meals every day and gives away 8,000 articles of clothing every week. The Mission also provides 40 transitional program apartments for those who have found work and still need supportive housing. All of the Mission's work is privately funded.

Started in 2009, St. Peter's Church Overflow Homeless Shelter is in its seventh season of providing a place for men to sleep to help relieve the high demand at the Capital City Rescue Mission. St. Peter's now takes 20 men who are brought to the church along with two members of the Mission staff. Two volunteers from St. Peter's Church are also on hand until lights out.

Both parishioners and the church provide snacks. The Church provides the Parish Hall, sleeping arrangements, and storage containers for the men's personal belongings. Locks and a buzzer system ensure that the Church is safe. From December 1<sup>st</sup> until March 30<sup>th</sup> the overflow shelter is operated every night starting at 8 pm and going until 7 am the next day. During 2014 a total of 1,086 nights of lodging were provided at St. Peter's Church and over the past six years there have been a total of 5,725 uses of our Overflow Homeless Shelter. Perry Jones Director of the Capital City Rescue Mission has expressed his thanks to St. Peter's Church for their help.

Other churches involved in this homeless shelter overflow project have included St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Cathedral of All Saints, Trinity Episcopal Church, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, St. Thomas Roman Catholic Church, First Lutheran Church in Albany, St. Stephens Episcopal Church, Siena College, and Defreestville Reformed Church.

### Composer Profile

Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924)

If you are keeping track you may have noticed that the Choir sings quite a bit of music composed by Stanford. Our Stanford repertoire includes two settings of the Jubilate Deo, one of the Te Deum, several unaccompanied Latin motets, a few powerful accompanied anthems, and a hymn-tune anthem.

Born in Ireland and educated at Cambridge University, Stanford was highly influential in a renaissance of British music in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. As Professor of Music at Cambridge, he was a teacher of Gustav Holst and Ralph Vaughan Williams, among others. He also held important posts as organist, and as a conductor of choirs and orchestras.

His compositions include symphonies, chamber works, and operas, but it is his church music which remains most often heard. While occasionally veering toward a certain Victorian pomposity, his works expertly balance craft and expression, and deserve their lasting place in the repertoire of cathedrals and parishes across all denominations.

### Saint of the Month Club

Consecration of Samuel Seabury

*First American Bishop, 1784*



Samuel Seabury, the first Bishop of the Episcopal Church, was born in Groton, Connecticut, November 30, 1729. After ordination in England in 1753, he was assigned, as a missionary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, to Christ Church, New Brunswick, New Jersey. In 1757, he became rector of Grace Church, Jamaica, Long Island, and in 1766 rector of St. Peter's, Westchester County. During the American Revolution, he remained loyal to the British crown, and served as a chaplain in the British army.

We give thee thanks, O Lord our God, for thy goodness in bestowing upon this Church the gift of the episcopate, which we celebrate in this remembrance of the consecration of Samuel Seabury; and we pray that, joined together in unity with our bishops, and nourished by thy holy Sacraments, we may proclaim the Gospel of redemption with apostolic zeal; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

After the Revolution, a secret meeting of Connecticut clergymen in Woodbury, on March 25, 1783, named Seabury or the Rev. Jeremiah Leaming, whichever would be able or willing, to seek episcopal consecration in England. Leaming declined; Seabury accepted, and sailed for England.

After a year of negotiation, Seabury found it impossible to obtain episcopal orders from the Church of England because, as an American citizen, he could not swear allegiance to the crown. He then turned to the Non-juring bishops of the Episcopal Church in Scotland. On November 14, 1784, in Aberdeen, he was consecrated by the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor of Aberdeen and the Bishop of Ross and Caithness, in the presence of a number of the clergy and laity.

On his return home, Seabury was recognized as Bishop of Connecticut in Convocation on August 3, 1785, at Middletown. With Bishop William White, he was active in the organization of the Episcopal Church at the General Convention of 1789. With the support of William Smith of Maryland, William Smith of Rhode Island, William White of Pennsylvania, and Samuel Parker of Boston, Seabury kept his promise, made in a concordat with the Scottish bishops, to persuade the American Church to adopt the Scottish form for the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

In 1790 Seabury became responsible for episcopal oversight of the churches in Rhode Island; and at the General Convention of 1792 he participated in the first consecration of a bishop on American soil, that of John Claggett of Maryland. Seabury died on February 25, 1796, and is buried beneath St. James' Church, New London.

**Minutes of the Vestry**

**September 8, 2015**

**1. Approval of the minutes of Vestry Meeting, September 8, 2015.** - The minutes were approved as amended on a motion made by J. Ratzel and seconded by M. Lundberg.

**2. Sr. Warden's Report- J. Chenot**

Jim started his report welcoming everyone back from the vestry's summer break. The Sunday school will be starting up this Sunday which includes school registration. The children in our Sunday school will also be busy making prayer pretzels. The vestry would like to thank Laura Saffares for her continuing support heading up this very important ministry at St. Peter's. This Sunday I look at it as a new beginning in our church life after the summer months which becomes quite busy leading us to the beginning of the Advent season that is not too far off.

Fall programs and classes will begin shortly including First Communion, Confirmation Classes, Bible studies, just to name a few. There are a few new exiting programs that will be added this year that Father Hartt, Mother Sue and the outreach committee has been working on during the summer and will be announced in the bulletin as well as in their report that will follow. We hope that many will be able to attend these events which bring the congregation together in fellowship. The first event will be our annual parish picnic on September 20th which is a great time for all to get reacquainted with each other after the summer months.

Our current financial picture at St Peter's has been stable, though in August as many know, everyone took a slight loss including St. Peter's. I would again like to take the opportunity to thank George Scala for his continued hard work with our investments and the committee. We are carefully watching our investments as well as our expenses conferring with our investment advisor as needed. The finance committee is excited to bring back the Consecration Sunday Stewardship program this year which was very successful last year. We hope that everyone will be able to attend all the services leading up to Consecration Sunday and be able to attend that important day of stewardship as well as participate in the celebration luncheon that follows that day.

We continue to look for individuals that would be interested in volunteering on committees such as the Flower, Altar, and Usher guilds. We have been very fortunate to have many dedicated members that have volunteered a considerable amount of time on these committees. We look forward to seeing new members as well as those who thought they might be interested in the past year to inquire about these important ministries in our church life.

I would like to thank Megan in our office who worked on a new look to our website as well as making it user friendly. Also we would like to thank Janice for volunteering her time in the office during the summer months, keeping all our records in order which makes our job easier on the vestry in times when we need to review them.

I hope everyone had an enjoyable safe summer and look forward starting this fall with many new as well as old programs that have been put in place.

**3. Finance-G. Scala**

George S. reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the months of June, July and August. Total offerings YTD through August were \$155,526 versus budgeted offerings of \$239,816. George discussed that with the decline in attendance over the summer months many parishioners may be behind on their commitments and hopefully will catch up in the coming months. The investment/endowment accounts had a very down month in August consistent with the market and YTD Merrill Lynch is down -1.69% and Key is down -1.77%. This is causing a significant budget variance of (\$293,870). Hopefully the market will rebound in the near future. Expenses year to date are \$17,751 under budget.

George also reported on the stewardship. Consecration Sunday is set for October 18<sup>th</sup> and the committee will be meeting soon to discuss specifics.

**4. Property- T. Murphy was absent.**

J. Chenot reported that the rectory needs scraping and painting. He received a quote of \$7600 from Ed Tobio who has done work at the church in the past. Jim looked back at the last time the rectory was painted. It was when Fr. Eggenchiller was rector and the cost at that time was \$10,000. A motion was made by M. Lundberg and seconded by P. Gerfin to authorize the funds for the scraping and painting of the rectory.

**5. Outreach- J. Burns**

Concerns were expressed about the St. Francis Soup kitchen. They need new leadership and more volunteers. The Outreach Committee provided three scholarships to Beaver Cross at a cost of \$1520. St. Peter's raised \$955. for the CROP Walk. Thank you to Maria Holden for organizing this. The entire Albany CROP Walk raised \$101,394. 50.

On December 9/26/2015, Mary and Vinnie Troiano will host a dance at the parish hall. Michele Lundberg has volunteered to coordinate the refreshments for the dance. On Saturday October 3, 2015, St. Peter's will show a broadcast of the Daniel Plan. The church is going to cover the event so there is no cost to attend. There is the possibility of a follow-up event of a cooking workshop based on the Daniel Plan. The church is considering becoming a pick up site for Field Greens subscriptions if there are enough people interested.

St. Peter's Pre-Thanksgiving Dinner will be held on November 14, 2015. Since there are so many events planned for the Fall, we decided to move the Soup Sampler to the winter in January or February.

Jim Chenot reported that Adirondack Beverage sent a donation of \$500 for the Overflow Shelter.

**6. Old Business-** There was no old business.

**7. New Business-**

A. Music Contract- The vestry approved \$175. to provide music for the dance.

B. New Construction- J Ratzel announced that there are 23 new complexes planned to be built in Albany and many of them will be in walking distance of St. Peter's. Jack said that it is a great opportunity to increase membership for the church. He said he is willing to visit the new complexes and bring brochures about St. Peter's. Mtr. Sue also said she would be interested in doing some neighborhood evangelism on Sunday afternoons. It was suggested that the clergy could offer house blessings.

**8. Associate Rector's Report- Mtr. Sue-. Associate Rector Report**

THANK YOU to Fr. Hartt and the Vestry for your support and prayers during my surgery, hospital stay and recovery this summer. I am so thankful and blessed for the healing God has brought me and am feeling wonderful and am in excellent health.

The summer months were busy ministry-wise with pastoral care and also some funerals. I am excited for September's arrival and the ministries and events we have planned for this coming fall:

There are (2) Adult Bible studies beginning in September:

1. Women's Bible Study: The women will meet on Monday evenings (beginning September 14<sup>th</sup>) to study and discuss *John: the Beloved Disciple (A Beth Moore Bible study)*.
2. Sunday Bible Study: following the 10:30 service we will hold Bible study in Mother Sue's office, including a video presentation by N.T. Wright (one of today's leading Anglican theologians) on *Paul's Letter to the Galatians followed by discussion, beginning September 27<sup>th</sup>*

I will also be assisting Fr. Hartt in our new Sunday Service at 4:00pm beginning September 20<sup>th</sup>. There are hundreds of new apartments being renovated/leased downtown and so I am planning to do some neighborhood evangelism on Sunday afternoons to invite our neighbors to this new service. Jack Ratzel has been researching this neighborhood growth and will be reaching out to the developers and residents. He is also working on updating the St. Peter's brochure as a evangelistic handout. Thanks, Jack!

Youth: First Holy Communion Classes begin 9/27 with children receiving their first Holy Communion on All Saints Sunday (November 1<sup>st</sup>). Confirmation instruction for youth age 13+ is planned to begin in January 2016 with a Spring Confirmation service).

Daughters of the King: The Daughters continue to hold intercession for St. Peter's Church. We are planning a Fall Neighborhood Prayer Walk and also an upcoming discernment class.

Commission on Ministry: I am assisting the Diocese at a retreat this coming weekend at the Spiritual Life Center (9/11-13 Friday-Sunday)

## 9. Sunday Attendance-Fr. Hartt

The average Sunday attendance is 115.5.

## 10. Rector's Report- Fr. Hartt

Father Hartt reported that since our June Vestry meeting, there have been four deaths and 2 funerals in the parish. We commended to Almighty God, Georgia Rosen, and Helen Taylor. Our beloved Geraldine Haase also went home to the Lord. Her service is being planned. We will soon commend Dr. Martin Davis to Almighty God. Dr. Davis, as his wife Peg, were exemplary in their commitment to our parish. Dr. Davis' funeral will be held Saturday, September 19<sup>th</sup> at 10:30AM.

We rejoice that Eva Kim Fishbein was Baptized this summer.

Our new website has had quite a successful launch. As of today, the parish website registers 4209 visitors.

We were blessed with many visitor's this summer at church. The summer can be a fruitful time for grounding new members, but we will need to present more to welcome them.

Our new 4:00PM Service of Holy Communion begins September 20<sup>th</sup>. Father Hartt is encouraged by news of the considerable amount of new residential building planned for downtown. Vestryman Jack Ratzel has been diligent in keeping track of these developments and working with clergy to plan ways to reach out to these new neighbors. Thank you, Jack.

The Parish Picnic is planned for September 20<sup>th</sup>. Jim Chenot has already made plans for the grills to be staffed -- with the Chenot family well represented in service. It is always with some sadness that we attend the grills without our beloved Harry D'Agostino. Our prayers for healing continue for Harry's long-time assistant, Bob Schupp.

The "Blessing of the Backpacks" will also be held September 20<sup>th</sup>. Children are encouraged to wear their backpacks to church for a blessing to start the school year.

The clergy are excited about the start of Children's Chapel, which will begin September 27<sup>th</sup>. Children's Chapel will take place the last Sunday of the month. The children will have their own instructed Eucharist in the Pumpelly Room and form their own procession there from the church. Children's Chapel is aimed at children of the age now attending the children's homily. The last Sunday of month will also have a youth focus, with older children doing readings and serving in various ways.

St. Peter's will be holding a dance on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>, 7:00PM. We are excited that our own Vince and Mary Troiano will be hosting the event in the gym. Dance instruction will be included. We hope this event will be one of many.

Grace and Holy Innocence Soup Kitchen is in trouble. Laura Saffares has been most dedicated to this outreach and an encourager of our young people in this work through "Angels in Training." Unfortunately, since the death of the long-time organizer of the soup kitchen Marge Welch, both staffing and cooking have been problematic. We need to look into the matter further.

A Bible Study – N.T. Wright On Galatians – will be offered after church on Sundays. It will run from Noon to 1pm. In order to attract more participation, it is the plan of the clergy to offer more educational offerings to the parish on Sunday morning.

Father Hartt was pleased to report that Cathy Schunk will be taking on the Altar Guild Director's position this fall. Cathy is most dedicated and able. The clergy thank her for undertaking this important ministry.

Consecration Sunday will be October 18<sup>th</sup>. Considerable work has gone into the planning over the summer. We are delighted that Christie Chenot has agreed to chair the committee. The program was a great success last year. The witness of our own members to the spiritual significance of disciplined giving is especially powerful.

Father Hartt reported that there are some needed repairs in the rectory. Plans are already being made to address them.

Archives has been growing in scope and organization under Connie Powell. Due to her care and ability, we have never been in better shape.

Father Hartt expressed concern that the Cathedral was the target of a less than balanced article by the Times Union. The article focused on tensions following this year's General Convention, but did so in an unbalanced and needlessly provocative fashion in the view of Fr. Hartt.

Father Hartt reported that our ASA fell to 115.5 by the end of the Summer. He noted that it would be all but impossible to recover at this point to achieve last year's ASA. The slide begins even before Choir and Sunday School awards in June. In fact, it seems to begin by the Sunday after Easter and build momentum.

Father Hartt has spoken many times about our need to have stronger attendance patterns that continue beyond the cycle of the school year. We each need to be present to provide the vitality needed to draw new members. Indeed, we are commanded to "Keep the Sabbath."

Easter falls March 27<sup>th</sup>.

Father Hartt again spoke of his excitement about the plans for Children's Chapel and the 4:00PM Sunday Eucharist.

**11. Adjournment-** The meeting was adjourned on a motion made by J. Ratzel and seconded by P. Gerfin.

**12. Compline-** Mtr. Sue led Compline.
