From the Rector

Made New

And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." Revelation 21:5

There is nothing "newer" than a birth. We have been blessed at St. Peter's this year with many infants reminding us of the gift of life, the gift of newness in the flesh. As we approach Pentecost, we are invited to celebrate the gift of new life and birth. It is the birth of the Church and the newness of God's work among us. I am reminded here of one of the Collects appointed at Good Friday:

O God of unchangeable power and eternal light:

Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery;
by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation;
let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up,
and things which had grown old are being made new,
and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made,
your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

The Church is indeed a sacred mystery. She bears witness to the great mystery of God's completed and ongoing work in Christ. It is a work of telling and a work of seeing. The Collect prays it gloriously in the words, "let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus." The very nature of the Kingdom Jesus proclaimed and brought is to be active and breaking into our world afresh. The Resurrection is not only a moment in history, but proclaims the ongoing work of God's providence. This resurrected life is being renewed among us every day by our living Lord. The Church bears witness.

The gift of the Church, that sacred mystery, is to point to those works of God as Jesus Christ risen is proclaimed. The Church through her members says "See, here what was old is being made new." "See, here is something that was cast down being raised up." "See, here is the effectual working of God's providence." "See right there how Jesus is with us always as He promised." See....."

At the very heart of this work of seeing and telling is the Holy Spirit. The Church is born of the Holy Spirit and born afresh by the same Holy Spirit. The work of conversion is of the Holy Spirit. The seeing of "the mystery" is born of the life of the Holy Spirit among us. We invite others into this life, to receive this gift of new birth in the Holy Spirit through Baptism. We exist to share the life of "See, here....."

Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit. It doesn't get any better than a fresh anointing of the Spirit. May this Pentecost be abundant for us in this way. May Saint Peter's Church ever be about telling, seeing, and inviting.

Alleluia, Christ is Risen! The Lord is risen, indeed. Alleluia! Come Holy Ghost our souls inspire.

From the Associate Rector

Spring has Sprung!

Spring has Sprung! I can't remember a recent year where this statement has felt so profound. We waited a long time for Spring this year, for certain. And, because of this, it feels wonderful now that the warm weather has arrived!

I imagine that the first Easter felt similarly to the disciples. What I mean by this is even though our calendar said "spring" we sure didn't experience the fullness of spring. Likewise, they probably did not experience the fullness of Easter on that one day, like we do today, but rather they experienced the joy of Easter build over several weeks. As the days and weeks after Easter unfolded, the truth of the Resurrection became more and more clear to the Disciples. Like the snow melting slowly, and buds starting to appear above ground which we experienced during our slow Spring this year, each resurrection appearance of Jesus Christ must have brought more and more hope, joy, and life to the Disciples. Imagine what the culmination of that felt like on Ascension Day when Jesus Christ "was taken up into heaven and sat down at the right hand of God."

Jesus rising from the dead is astounding! Many people saw him after he rose from the dead. But, the ascension of Jesus was witnessed first hand by those disciples – they saw him "lifted, and a cloud took him out of their sight." Easter had Sprung...fully! It was time in the disciple's lives to begin living Easter.

The Ascension of Jesus marks the culmination of the Easter season and was the season of disciples going out to share the Easter joy and faith the Lord has brought them! Before he ascended, Jesus told his disciples, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Mark tells us he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation!" That is the mission of the disciples – the mission of you and me! We are to proclaim the good news to the whole creation!

How can we do this? How can we do this today? Should we become a missionary, like Paul, and travel to new places sharing the Word of God? Some may, but most will not. Most of us are called to proclaim the good news right here where we are. One the easiest, and perhaps best, ways to proclaim the good news is by living Easter. Can people around you see Easter joy within you – dictating your life and the choices or priorities you make?

I read an article recently that posed the question, "Why are AA meetings and yoga classes so full on Sunday mornings while churches remain empty?" The author proposed the answer is because people go to AA or yoga class expecting to change drastically from the experience. Do we, as Christians, hold the same expectation from Church? Do we expect our faith to change our lives drastically? It can – if we let it. But it will only change us, and change our lives, if we live Christianity.

This is a hard calling, and especially today. Christianity is often at odds with the world around us, it stretches our call to love and charity, it asks us to put ourselves behind others. Christianity calls us to repentance, to sacrifice, to forgiveness. Yet, without these, we can never experience the fullness of Easter joy.

Just like the disciples that lived 2,000 years ago, we are called to bring our Easter joy out into the world: whatever part of the world we might be in. When we do this, Easter has Sprung fully in our lives and with it, the fullness of the fruits of our faith: peace, hope, love and joy. They will begin to bud in our lives – breaking through any hardness of heart and blossoming just like the early Spring flowers. How beautiful indeed!

Spring has sprung...has Easter sprung fully in your life?



Composer of the Month Club

Marcel Dupré, 1886-1971



Marcel Dupré, French organist and composer was a hugely influential force in the 20th century organ world. He performed over 2000 concerts in Europe, Australia, Canada, and the USA – including performances of the complete organ works of Bach, played from memory. He was the teacher of many prominent organists in Europe and the USA, including two of my own teachers. His teaching editions of the works of Bach and others provided many of us an introduction to the technique of organ playing. His compositions, some of the most famous of which arose from his extraordinary improvisations, are widely performed concert favorites. Dupré served for decades as organist of the Church of St. Sulpice in Paris, and briefly as the Director of the Paris Conservatory. His 65 opus numbers represent compositions for orchestra, chamber groups, voices and piano, as well as for organ.

- If holiness is a corporate gift from God that transcends denominations, how might the beauty of holiness transform ecumenical life?


From the Archives


Saint of the Month Club

[John Eliot] Missionary among the Algonquin, 1690

John Eliot, known as "The Apostle to the Indians," was born in 1604 at Widford in Hertfordshire, England. Educated at Cambridge, Eliot's nonconformist beliefs brought him into conflict with the tenets of the established church, and he departed for New England in 1631. Eliot arrived in Boston later that year and became the pastor of a church in Roxbury.

During his tenure as pastor in Roxbury he became concerned with the welfare of the native populations and he learned Algonquin language. After two years of study he began preaching to them in their own language. Like Roger Williams before him, Eliot had learned the native language and preached to the local tribes, but unlike Williams, Eliot devoted his entire life's work to preaching the Gospel to the native people.

In 1649, by act of Parliament, a Corporation for the Promoting and Propagating of the Gospel among the Indians of New England was set up, and with the financial backing of the English government, Eliot built a native settlement at Natick. The native people were provided with food, clothing, homes, and education, and in 1660the first Indian church in New England was founded.



During this time, Eliot began his monumental translation of the English Bible into the Algonquin language. Starting with the Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer, he was able to complete translations of the Book of Genesis and the Gospel of Matthew with the financial support of the Corporation for the Propagating of the Gospel. In 1661, his Algonquin New Testament was published, a copy of which was sent to King Charles II, and finally, in 1663, his complete

translation of the Bible was published. Eliot would revise his translation several times after most copies had been destroyed in the Indian Wars of 1670, along with many of the Indian settlements he established.

Eliot wrote a number of other books before his death, including a grammar of the Algonquin language. His work was vital to the studies of many linguists after him who were interested in Native American languages.

We would like to thank everyone who had a hand in making our annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake dinner a successful, well attended dinner event and a great way to start off our Lenten season moving forward. Thanks to Jeff Russom, Janice Chenot, Laura Rulison and Pam Gerfin, as well as so many others who volunteered cooking and cleaning before and after the dinner. Again, there was a great turnout for this event and we were able to set the parish hall for the women's shelter with extra food from the dinner for them to enjoy. It was a great evening for everyone coming together preparing for Lent.

The Ash Wednesday services were well-attended and we want to remind everyone that Evensong services will be held each Friday evening at 5:45 during lent. We also want to thank the choir and Neil Keen for their participation at all these Friday services.

We need to thank everyone involved with the homeless overflow shelter which will end March 28th for the winter season. This year again was a humbling and successful year hosting women in need at our shelter in the parish hall who truly were in need for shelter this cold and snowy season. This now completes our 9th year working with the Albany City Mission helping with these women in need and we want to thank the congregation for their support with food and monetary donations for this important ministry.

In advance we would like to thank our clergy Father Hartt and Mother Sue for their prayerful preparation and pastoral care during this Lenten season leading us to Palm Sunday, Holy week and Easter Sunday Service. In advance we would like to thank the altar guild flower, ushers, Ian and Pat for all the work and preparations performed each week to ensure that each Sunday as well as the extra work for these services run smoothly. In addition, the church office takes on an incredible amount of extra work load compiling information for the Easter memorials as well as all the extra printing of leaflets and programs. Janice and Angie have been working tirelessly in the office and we would like to thank you both for the dedication and support you bring to St. Peter's.

Neil Keen and the choir have been working for many weeks now preparing for Good Friday service. This year the choir will be performing Haydn's "Seven Words of Christ on the Cross" on Good Friday at 1:00 with orchestra. Thank you to the choir for their time and dedication at rehearsals preparing them for the all music that will be sung at this musical event as well as the music at the two Easter Sunday services. Finally, we look forward to the Easter egg hunt on Saturday March 31st, the day before Easter at the rectory. The vestry and clergy are looking forward to this year's Holy Week and Easter Sunday services and looking forward to a great turn out as we had during the Christmas time season.

Finance - G. Scala - Treasurer's Report

In George S.'s absence, his submitted report was reviewed for the February report. Offerings for February were \$17,371. Year-to-date offerings are \$32,954. This compares to a budgeted number of \$46,217. YTD Offerings through the same period in 2017 were \$37,503.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed fairly significant losses for February consistent with market performance. Merrill Lynch showed a negative return of -3.03%. YTD return of Merrill Lynch is +.71%. The Key accounts showed a negative return of -2.82% for the month and is at +.89% YTD. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area YTD of \$1,338. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. It should be noted that the market seems very volatile so we need to be prepared for losses/negative returns. Expenses YTD through February were \$461 over budget.

Pledges for 2018 are at 42 pledging units for a total amount of \$119,720.

Property -

The chandelier in the Tower Room has separated and it is currently being fixed in a manner that we are hoping will preserve it without altering its appearance.

Rectors Report - Father Hartt
