### From the Rector

#### Catching Glory (Part II)

In the last newsletter, I wrote about my marvel at the catcher's role in baseball. In particular, the demands on the catcher to take the pitch without flinching. Those balls come very fast -- often over 100 miles per hour. During spring training, the pitchers can be a little wild. The catchers then contend with speed and an unpredictable course of flight.

Easter Sunday brought to mind catching of another kind. The catching of glory by those first disciples as they met the Risen Lord. It is beyond our imagining what that experience must have been for the disciple. Yet glory was to be their vocation. They were to proclaim the risen and glorified One to a world that had never before known such glory.

The Apostles were sent to share Christ's victory over death first and foremost. The resurrection was the ultimate vindication of Jesus' oneness with the Father. The resurrection was the confirmation of all that the Lord had taught. But before being sent, there was need of one more glory. The glory that the Risen Lord had told them to wait upon from on high: *"And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."* (Luke 24:49.) Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Ghost, would be another glory-catching beyond their imagining.

This "power from on high" will be a catch that will cause the disciples to marvel afresh and give them the voice for their apostolic work, as "tongues as of fire" land on their very heads. It is a ball they don't see coming, but it will give them all they need. And of course, we too.

It is our custom to wear something red on Pentecost Sunday. It feels a bit like a team uniform. There is a joyful buoyancy to this great Feast of the Church. We are even a bit giddy. Perhaps for that reason we tend to chuckle when we hear in our Acts reading the charge by those visitors to Jerusalem who witnessed the event that the disciples must be drunk.

"But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'In the last days it will be, God declares,

that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,  
and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions,  
and your old men shall dream dreams.

Even upon my slaves, both men and women,  
in those days I will pour out my Spirit;  
and they shall prophesy.'" (Acts 2: 14-18.)

Peter's wonderful recollection of the prophet Joel was no doubt the work of the Holy Spirit. Yet the great Pentecost gift is the truth of that prophecy to this day. The pitch is still coming to us from on High, with different kinds of curves and courses of flight. So, what have you caught from on High? We want to see the glory. Don't worry that we will think you are a bit drunk. We know what's up!

**Mark 16:9-15, 20**

9 Now after he rose early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, from whom he had cast out seven demons. 10She went out and told those who had been with him, while they were mourning and weeping. 11But when they heard that he was alive and had been seen by her, they would not believe it. 12 After this he appeared in another form to two of them, as they were walking into the country. 13And they went back and told the rest, but they did not believe them. 14 Later he appeared to the eleven themselves as they were sitting at the table; and he upbraided them for their lack of faith and stubbornness, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen.\*15And he said to them, ‘Go into all the world and proclaim the good news\* to the whole creation. 20And they went out and proclaimed the good news everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that accompanied it.

Hallelujah, the Lord is Risen! Were these the words that tumbled out of Mary’s heart as she raced towards the other disciples; words of wonder and pure joy meant to defeat their mourning and weeping? Perhaps not, yet words were not enough to strike down the grief that had pierced their hearts. They would not believe Jesus was raised from the dead based on Mary’s words alone.

I once heard N.T. Wright speak and refer to this very passage. Then, he referred to Mary as the Apostle to the Apostles - the first person to witness the Risen Lord and be commissioned by him. Even so, the other apostles have difficulty accepting the Good News of that first Easter. Today, many around us have difficulty accepting the Good News of Easter and none of us alive today have actually seen the Risen Lord nor can claim the authority of Apostleship.

We may not know what Mary’s Easter greeting was to the others, but we can raise our Easter greeting to others in terms of a call and response. If we were to shout “Hallelujah, the Lord is Risen”, would the people around us respond “The Lord is Risen indeed, Hallelujah”? If we called out to them this great Easter greeting, would those around us know the response, or even more importantly, know the Easter joy that accompanies it? If not - that is the place to begin!

There are many among us that are un-churched or not familiar with the Holy Bible or even the Easter miracle of the Resurrection. I know that we often struggle with how to teach people all that God has disclosed to us in Holy Scripture. Just how is the best way to share our faith with other people? Eventually we will want to teach them Holy Scripture and prayers, and about worship and serving others, and about healing and miracles and the importance of Christian community and support. But as a starting point, can we at the very least teach them about Easter Joy? We can teach them best by living joyfully in the world.


People may not connect with the Biblical words or teachings initially - yet how can they deny the joy? And then, starting in joy, we can bring the words and, even more importantly, their life-changing meaning to them.

Mary, the other women and all of the disciples must have had joy-filled hearts when the truth of that first Easter settled upon them; Jesus was raised from the dead! Later resurrection appearances would disclose even more hope and joy to them. Obviously, Christians are called to be joy-filled people! This may be our greatest witness to our world today.

The Easter Season and the Resurrection of Jesus Christ are joy-filled events that give us the greatest hope ever: a renewed life here and the hope of everlasting life with the Father. May our lives and presence in the world exude that great Easter joy and may it be contagious to others around us that they, too, might seek the Risen Lord.

Hallelujah, the Lord is Risen! The Lord is Risen indeed, Hallelujah!

### **Bible Study**





### Flower Memorials

### Composer of the month –

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)



Bach is such a monumental figure that it is impossible to overstate the extent of his influence. Bach's abilities as an organist were highly respected during his lifetime, although he was not widely recognized as a great composer until a revival of interest in and performances of his music in the first half of the 19th century. He is now generally regarded as one of the greatest composers of all time. His music is revered for its technical command, artistic beauty, and intellectual depth. In spite of almost 200 years of scholarly work into the life and music of Bach, there is no fading, even now, of the intensity of study on these subjects. As an illustration of that fact, here are the titles of a few of the scholarly offerings at a recent Bach Symposium in Amherst, Massachusetts:

- Bach against Modernity
- Bach and the Dance in 20th century France
- Certifying Bach's Interplanetary Funksmanship
- Bernstein, Rock, and Bach: constructing a tonal heritage for Modern Music.

That's pretty wide-ranging list, demonstrating the breadth and depth of Bach's impact on the world of music, and beyond. (Interplanetary Funksmanship??!!)

Monnica's life story is enshrined in the spiritual autobiography of her eldest son, in *The Confessions* of Saint Augustine. Born in North Africa about 331, of Berber parents, Monnica was married to a Latinized provincial of Tagaste named Patricius, whom she won to the Christian faith before his death. In her earlier years she was not without worldly ambitions and tastes. She grew in Christian maturity and spiritual insight through an ever-deepening life of prayer. Her ambition for her gifted son was transformed into a passionate desire for his conversion to Christ. After his baptism in Milan in 387, by Bishop Ambrose, Augustine and his mother, together with a younger brother, planned to return home to Africa. While awaiting ship at Ostia, the port of Rome, Monnica fell ill. Augustine writes, "One day during her illness she had a fainting spell and lost consciousness for a short time. We hurried to her bedside, but she soon regained consciousness and looked up at my brother and me as we stood beside her. With a puzzled look, she asked, 'Where was I?' Then, watching us closely as we stood there speechless with grief, she said, 'You will bury your mother here.' " Augustine's brother expressed sorrow, for her sake, that she would die so far from her own country. She said to the two brothers, "It does not matter where you bury my body. Do not let that worry you. All I ask of you is that, wherever you may be, you should remember me at the altar of the Lord." To the question, whether she was not afraid at the thought of leaving her body in an alien land, she replied, "Nothing is far from God, and I need have no fear that he will not know where to find me, when he comes to raise me to life at the end of the world." Recent excavations at Ostia have uncovered her original tomb. Her mortal remains, however, were transferred in 1430 to the Church of St. Augustine in Rome.

## St. Peter's Communion Silver



This article is being republished to correct the usage of the terms *EWER* which is a large generally wide-mouthed water pitcher and *CRUET* which denotes the small pitcher used regularly at the communion service. It is hoped this clarification will make this article more informative and more interesting. ECP, (Church Archivist)

The communion silver gift from Queen Anne of Britain to the Onondaga Indians which was subsequently given to St. Peter's Church by Governor Hunter, is now housed in a safe to protect it from wear. A replica of the gift is housed in the church in the memorial cabinet in the narthex of the church. It is now only used for special services such as Christmas Eve and Easter.

However, many of the pieces of silver used on a weekly basis for communion also have an interesting history. For example there is the silver water ewer and chalice presented by Grace L. Wiles in 1912 in honor of Reverend Battershall at his 25th anniversary as rector of St. Peter's Church. The engraving on the chalice reads: "In loving memory of the rectorship of Walton W. Battershall, D. D. GLW. Both pieces are decorated with purple amethyst like stones and are very beautiful. The chalice was used for the communion service at Christie (Chenot) Gordon's wedding.

It is interesting to note that when the St. Mark's altar was contributed to St. Peter's Church it was accompanied by several silver pieces. For example there was a silver water ewer with a scroll handle. It was engraved with the winged figure and with the words: "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts." On the bottom of the piece were the words: "Christmas gift to St. Mark's Church Green Island, NY, 1866." Another piece from St. Mark's Church was a silver paten. It included a depiction of the *Angus Dei* (Lamb of God) and was engraved "Glory to God in the Highest, Alleluia." Still another piece was a silver plated copper chalice with a rounded cup containing a stamped winged creature and mounted on a splayed foot. On a ball of the stem were stamped six diamonds in relief. The wording on the chalice read "I drink this in remembrance of Thee." The bottom engraving read "An Easter gift to St. Mark's Green Island, New York from M.E.G. and F. A. G. in loving memory of their parents 1893."

Returning to gifts directly given to St. Peter's Church there were a certain number of pieces donated in honor of military service men. A highly decorated ciborium resting on clawed feet made in 1911 was engraved: "For the altar of St. Peter's Church in the City of Albany, in loving memory of General Frederick Phisterer, the gift of his children, Easter 1911. Another piece was a silver chalice with a silver clip in the cup engraved with the church Coat of Arms and inscribed: "In loving memory of Arthur Henry Stein, Jr. July 23, 1943." It is from Gebelen Stirling, Boston. A silver water ewer was "donated by the friends of Sgt. William Brooker Campbell, (October 31, 1919 – Sept 6, 1945). St. Peter's Church" On the piece after the St. Peter's Coat of Arms were the words: "Presented by associates of his father, William Henry Campbell."

Silver gifts were also presented honoring members of the altar guild. These include a large silver ewer and a smaller silver cruet, both engraved : "In memory of Margaret Grey Trudeau Gallup." Margaret was former president of the altar guild. And our own Diana Martin donated a processional ciborium which is silver on the exterior and gold in the interior. She presented this gift to St. Peter's Church: "in thanksgiving for her grandson Henry Martin Angst Tucker."

We can see there is much to note in our silver communion services. It is just another example of the proud history of our church.

J. Chenot wanted to thank everyone involved with the homeless overflow shelter which ended March 15th for the winter season. This year was truly a success hosting women in need at our shelter and will plan to again host these women who are truly in need for shelter during the winter months. This now completes our 8<sup>th</sup> year working with the Albany City Mission to help with those in needs and Jim thanked the congregation for all their support with food and monetary donations during this past season.

Jim wanted to thank Father Hartt and Mother Sue in advance for all the preparation needed during lent that leads us to Palm Sunday, Holy week and Easter Sunday Service. Also a thank you in advance to the altar guild, flower guild, ushers, Pat and Shawn for all the work and preparations performed each week is done to ensure each Sunday as well as the extra work for these services run smoothly. The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for the month. For February Merrill Lynch was up +2.36% and Key was up +2.15%. YTD both the Merrill Lynch and Key accounts show a 4.10% return. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area YTD of \$148,308. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through February are \$2,224 over budget recouping most of the overages in January.

Pledges are currently at 52 pledging units for a total amount of \$141,546.

3/26/17 will be our Annual Soup Sampler following the 10:30 service. The proceeds will benefit the Homeless Action Committee (serving the homeless community in Albany NY). Thank you Judy Burns for coordinating this years' Soup Sampler and for all the cooks!

Hats Off to England! Our annual Tea will be a fund raiser for this summer's choir trip to Chichester, England. The tea will be on April 23, 2017. Thank you Judy Burns for coordinating the tea. We are running a 50/50 Raffle at the Tea.

Albany CROP Walk will be Sunday May 7, 2017. We are seeking a volunteer to coordinate this for our team from St. Peter's.

Blessing Bags: We thank DOK Chapter of St. Stephen's Church, Delmar for their assembling Blessing Bags for the homeless people served by CCRM.
