# **Catching Glory**

The one thing about baseball that amazes me most is the catcher. I think of the speed of that ball and the glove intercepting such velocity. Any catcher must be open to receiving the full force of the pitch and not flinch. In the off-season, it is said that pitchers can get a bit rusty. As a result, in early pre-season training, it takes even more courage to squat behind the plate. If you can't take it coming right at you, you had better consider another career.

When I think about Easter morning, I think about the force of glory coming from the tomb as our Lord is raised to Life. There is something to be said for the Easter bulletin covers that show light bursting gloriously forth from the opening of the tomb. And the catcher? It was first the women. Even as mediated by angels, it was for them as intense as it gets.

Catching glory. Think also about the other disciples catching such glory. We could say they were all a bit like the catchers in pre-season training. They received the full and wildest glory of all. As the Church has moved through the centuries, such glory seems more under control and not in a good way. We might even feel at times that we have entered the minor leagues of glory.

But thanks be to God, each year Easter comes around like the opening of the season. We are invited again to the full force of the glory. We are asked to open ourselves up to what seems like the wildest pitch of all. We can quite rightly feel, as St. Paul wrote, "Who is sufficient for these things?" Yet ready we must be.

Ready for what? To catch glory. Our vocation as Christians is to catch glory. We will first need not to flinch at the force or expect softballs. Of course, we are "not sufficient for these things." But neither were the women or other disciples. We just need to stay put and take the pitch. It leads only to abiding joy.

This Easter, let's be at the plate open to the glory coming at us. Also, let us be humbled by those first catchers. Not only did they receive the Good News of the Risen Lord, they caught the glory head-on -- glory beyond all imagining with abiding joy.

Glove ready?

# From the Associate Rector

This April seems a confused month to me...we are bouncing from winter to spring (with the recent snow melt not yet complete) and are also bouncing from Lent through Holy Week to Easter! In fact, the two have much in common.

Winters are times of quiet, darkness, nesting, and reflection. With Spring, the outdoor beckons, light increases and we are eager to go out and do (rather than think or plan about it). The same could be said of the Lent and Easter seasons. During Lent we quiet ourselves for true reflection and repentance (acknowledging the darkness in our lives) and ready ourselves spiritually for Easter which proclaims light, life and celebrating our Lord Jesus' triumph. If Lent is the time for reflection in darkness, Easter is certainly the time for the triumphal light to burst forth.

Much of our Christian lives move between these two spheres of Lent and Easter. One day we might be mourning the death of a loved one and the next day rejoicing in the birth of a new child. Our entire life is filled with these pivotal moments of valleys to mountaintops, and unfortunately, mountaintops are rare at times.

Our Women's Lenten study focused on the stories of eight women who suffered greatly for their Christian faith. The suffering was real and was also terrible which made the reading material difficult to grapple with. Yet through it all, God worked in mighty ways increasing faith, performing miracles, savings lives and using these women even in their desperate circumstance; often because of their desperate circumstances. I was reminded, time and time again, to look for God's glory through the suffering.

In fact, recently I preached centering on one section from Paul's Letter to the Roman's in which he said: "we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." (Romans 5:2b-5)

In short, suffering is not the end of the story when it is used by God. Under suffering, when one chooses to endure through it rather than attempt to flee from it, their character changes – it is developed – and not only clings to but looks for the hope to come....hope for the good to come – hope we believe in because it has been promised to us.

So Lent in itself must never be the end of the story....Lent must always propel us forward through Holy Week, with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and also his agony in the Garden – Holy Week mountaintops and valleys – that lead us always to Easter – to the other side of the Cross and Tomb – from darkness to light and from death to life, because we are promised and are ever looking for that hope and life only found in our Savior Jesus Christ our Lord.

Remember this in your lives. Remember this when you are in a valley in your life – or on a mountaintop in your life – that God can use it all to bring His glory to us when we are fixated and looking for that hope. When in the darkness, know and expect the light to cast it out. When in the valley, know and expect to rise to the mountaintop. When suffering abounds, know and expect God's glory to triumph. It is our Easter story and thus our Easter lives for Him who died and rose victoriously again, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

# Lenten Quiet Day

We will be holding our Lenten Quiet Day on Sunday April 2<sup>nd</sup> following the 10:30am service. We will begin with lunch in the second floor Parish Hall (thank you members of the Daughters of the King for providing the luncheon items!). We will then return to the sanctuary for a series of meditations and end at 3:30. All are welcome to join us. **<u>Good Friday</u>**: Following the noon service, the choir will sing the *St. Matthew Passion* by J. S. Bach accompanied by a chamber orchestra.

# The Passion in Bach's time

The oratorio Passion, in which a Biblical Passion narrative is embellished with freely composed verse and hymns, was familiar in north German cities since the mid 17th century. In Leipzig, where Bach worked, the use of this type of music for Good Friday services was adopted in 1721, two years before Bach's arrival.

Bach's St. Matthew Passion was first performed at the Good Friday Vespers service in 1727. This service took the following form, varying little from year to year:

Hymn: "When Jesus hung upon the cross"

Part I of the Passion

Hymn: "Lord Jesus Christ, be present now"

Sermon, lasting one hour or longer

Part II of the Passion

Motet: A setting of Isaiah 57:1-12 by Jacob Handl

Prayer

Biblical verse (Isaiah 53:5)

Hymn: "Now thank we all our God"

The preacher traditionally combined commentary on the Passion with a meditation on each event, often in vivid and pictorial poetry in the first person - the same sort of verse that was set to music in Bach's Passion arias.

The impact was heightened by the fact that no music using voices and instruments had been heard in the Leipzig churches since before Ash Wednesday.





# Composer of the Month - Will C. Macfarlane (1870-1945)

The composer of the Canticle "Christ, our Passover," which our choir sings traditionally on Easter Sunday. It was written in 1906 in a stirring Victorian style. Macfarlane was born in London in 1870, and his family moved to New York City when he was 4 years old. One of the founders of the American Guild or Organists, he served as Organist and Choirmaster at St Thomas Church in New York around 1912, before the founding of the now-famous choir school. A few of his choral compositions gained popularity, with "Christ, our Passover" earning particular fame. It is still sung at St. Thomas at Easter time.

Macfarlane went on to become Municipal Organist of Portland, Maine and continued to compose for voices and for organ.

# Saint of the Month Club

# William Law


Priest, 1761

**Prayer:** O God, by whose grace thy servant William Law, enkindled with the fire of thy love, became a burning and shining light in thy Church: Grant that we also may be aflame with the spirit of love and discipline, and may ever walk before thee as children of light; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, liveth and reigneth, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.* 

"If we are to follow Christ, it must be in our common way of spending every day. If we are to live unto God at any time or in any place, we are to live unto him in all times and in all places. If we are to use anything as the gift of God, we are to use everything as his gift." So wrote William Law in *1728* in *A Serious Call to a Devout and Holy Life*.

This quiet schoolmaster of Putney, England, could hardly be considered a revolutionary, yet his book had nearrevolutionary repercussions. His challenge to take Christian living very seriously received more enthusiastic response than he could ever have imagined, especially in the lives of Henry Venn, George Whitefield, and John Wesley, all of whom he strongly influenced. More than any other man, William Law laid the foundation for the religious revival of the eighteenth century, the Evangelical Movement in England, and the Great Awakening in America.

Law came to typify the devout parson in the eyes of many. His life was characterized by simplicity, devotion, and works of charity. Because he was a Non-Juror, who refused to swear allegiance to the House of Hanover, he was deprived of the usual means of making a living as a clergyman in the Church of England. He therefore worked as a tutor to the father of Edward Gibbon, the historian, from 1727 to 1737. He organized schools and homes for the poor. He stoutly defended the Sacraments and Scriptures against attacks of the Deists. He spoke out eloquently against the warfare of his day. His richly inspired sermons and writings have gained him a permanent place in Christian literature.

# From the Archives

# St. Peter's Communion Silver



The communion silver gift from Queen Anne of Britain to the Onondaga Indians which was subsequently given to St. Peter's Church by Governor Hunter is now housed in a safe to protect it from wear. A replica of the gift is housed in the church in the memorial cabinet in the narthex of the church. It is now only used for special services such as Christmas Eve and Easter.

However, many of the pieces of silver used on a weekly basis for communion also have an interesting history. For example there is the silver water cruet and chalice presented by Grace L. Wiles in 1912 in honor of Reverend Battershall at his 25th anniversary as rector of St. Peter's Church. The engraving on the chalice reads: "In loving memory of the rectorship of Walton W. Battershall, D. D. GLW. Both pieces are decorated with purple amethyst like stones and are very beautiful. The chalice was used for the communion service at Christie (Chenot) Gordon's wedding.

It is interesting to note that when the St. Mark's altar was contributed to St. Peter's Church it was accompanied by several silver pieces. For example there was a silver water cruet with a scroll handle. It was engraved with the winged angel and with the words: "Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts." On the bottom of the piece were the words: "Christmas gift to St. Mark's Church Green Island, NY, 1866." Another piece from St. Mark's Church was a silver paten. It included a depiction of the Angus Dei or Lamb of God and was engraved "Glory to God in the Highest, Alleluia." Still another piece was a silver plated copper chalice mounted on a splayed foot containing winged angel. On the round ball of the stem were six diamonds in relief. The chalice was stamped "I drink this in remembrance of Thee." The bottom engraving read "An Easter gift to St. Mark's Green Island, New York from M.E.G. and F. A. G. in loving memory of their parents 1893."

Returning to gifts given to St. Peter's Church there were a certain number of pieces donated in honor of military service men. A highly decorated ciborium resting on clawed feet made in 1911 was engraved: "For the altar of St. Peter's Church in the City of Albany, in loving memory of General Frederick Phisterer, the gift of his children, Easter 1911. Another piece was a silver chalice with a silver clip in the cup engraved with the church Coat of Arms and inscribed: "In loving memory of Arthur Henry Stein, Jr. July 23, 1943." It is from Gebelen Stirling, Boston. A silver water cruet was "donated by the friends of Sgt. William Brooker Campbell, October 31, 1919 – Sept 6, 1945. St. Peter's Church" On the piece after the St. Peter's Coat of Arms were the words: "Presented by associates of his father, William Henry Campbell."

Silver gifts were also presented honoring members of the altar guild. These include a large flagon and small silver cruet, both engraved: "In memory of Margaret Grey Trudeau Gallup." These vessels were given by her children. Margaret was former president of the altar guild. And our own Diana Martin donated a processional ciborium which is silver on the exterior and gold in the interior. She presented this gift to St. Peter's Church: "In thanksgiving for her grandson Henry Martin Angst Tucker."

We can see there is much to note in the silver which we use weekly in our communion services. This silver is just another example of the proud history of our church.

#### 1. Approval of the Minutes of Vestry Meeting, January 10, 2017

The January 10, 2016 minutes were approved on a motion by T. Murphy and seconded by M. Holden. The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

#### 2. Senior Warden Report -J. Chenot

Jim started his report by congratulating Christie Gordon (1<sup>st</sup> term), George Scala (1<sup>st</sup> term) and Earl Stafford (2<sup>nd</sup> term) on their three year term to the vestry, all who were elected at our Annual Meeting in January. He also congratulated Debra Spath who was nominated for her 4<sup>th</sup> two year term as Junior Warden. Also announced at the meeting was that our associate rector Mother Sue returned from a part time position to her full a full time position she previously held. We are happy and welcome her back full time helping Father Hartt minister to our congregation at large. Jim is looking forward to working with our very committed vestry and clergy moving ahead this year.

We are very grateful for those in the congregation who stayed after the 10:30 Sunday service for the annual meeting which was well attended and received. Jim also wanted to thank all those who were involved making the day a very successful and informative meeting, thanking Maria Holden, Jim Adams and George Scala for all their help with the PowerPoint presentation. Also thanks were given to those who prepared their reports from each guild sharing their ministry missions that took place during the past year. Lastly, many thanks to Janice and Kristen who compiled and printed all the reports and information for the guilds as well as the annual meeting report. A copy of the annual report was sent out in the beginning of February as part of our newsletter for those unable to attend and will be to review the reports.

We will start our Lenten season off the end of this month on Tuesday, February 28th with our annual Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner from 5 to 7 pm, followed by Ash Wednesday services and Evensong at 5:45pm each Friday during Lent.

#### 3. <u>Finance</u> – G. Scala

George S. reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the month of January. Total offerings for January were \$18,028. This compares to a budgeted number of \$22,804.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for the month. For January Merrill Lynch was up +1.74% and Key was up +1.95%. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area for the month of \$64,342. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses for January are \$14,149 over budget primarily related to annual insurance premiums, quarterly pension bills and other non-routine expenses. This should correct itself in February.

Pledges are currently at 52 pledging units for a total amount of \$141,546.

#### 8. <u>Associate Rector's Report</u> – Mother Sue

My deepest thanks go to the Vestry and Fr. Hartt for your support of my return to full-time ministry here at St. Peter's Church. I am blessed to serve among you. I also want to thank Janice Chenot for all of the work she does for our church year-round but especially for her extra work in January covering Kristin's absence. Janice is a vital part of our church staff and deserves our recognition and thanks for her extraordinary commitment and dedication. We are also happy to have Kristin back among us and to continue our thanksgiving for her successful surgery and continued prayers for her full healing.

**Bible Study:** I am leading an online Bible study group who is reading through the entire Bible in 90 Days! We have 12 participants (some from St. Peter's and others) and I am greatly encouraged by this interest. The reading plan is quite doable when done daily (about 45 minutes daily – or 12 pages of Holy Scripture). We began in January and will finish before Easter. Today marks our halfway point and we are in the Book of Proverbs.

The Women's Bible study has begun (2/14 was our first meeting). We are reading and reflecting on *Hearts of Fire*, which includes the stories of 8 women who were persecuted for their Christian faith but survived to not only tell their story but how their experiences increased their faith and

ministry for our Lord. It is difficult material to grapple with and yet relevant to the crises occurring throughout the world as Christians continue to suffer under persecution.

Next week on 2/21, Fr. Hartt and I will begin leading another Bible study group using the elements of Discovery Bible Studies. The group will meet each Tuesday at 6:00pm for approximately one hour. We welcome men and women of the parish to join us.

**DOK:** The Daughters chapter has gained new energy and interest. We have (4) women completing the Discernment class who will be instituted in the Spring. The Daughters are eager to get involved more in parish life (i.e. hosting coffee hour, etc). We have moved our meetings to follow the 10:30 am service to allow more time for discussion and have added a lunch and fellowship to our monthly gatherings. The Daughters have been partnering with Women of St. Peter's to bring about service and hospitality at St. Peter's Church. We are also planning to host a Lenten Program on April 2, 2017 for the parish. Please let us know of your prayer and service needs.

**Parish Leadership Conference:** I attended this Albany Diocese Conference on Saturday February 4<sup>th</sup> at the Spiritual Life Center in Greenwich NY. The Conference focused on the elements of family systems with parish life, and how to build healthy communications and teamwork among church members. There was a large amount of information delivered and two priests of our Diocese remain available as resources for additional training and/or assistance that might be needed in the future.

The Annual Meeting was a great opportunity to reflect on the year 2016. I appreciated all of the ministry reports that were given and thank the countless leaders and volunteers that commit their time, energy and talents to St. Peter's and the spread of God's Kingdom in Albany (and beyond!)

#### 10. Rectors Report - Father Hartt

Father Hartt welcomed Christie Gordon to her newly elected place on the Vestry. Father Hart also congratulated Earl Stafford and Maria Holden on their re-election to the Vestry. A discussion about the essential nature of lay leadership in the Episcopal Church ensued.

Father Hartt spoke of the plans for Lent. Ash Wednesday Services will be held at 7:30AM, Noon, and 5:30PM. The morning and evening Services will include Holy Communion. Our traditional Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper will take place from 5PM until 6:30PM. Volunteers should arrive at 4PM. Father Hartt thanked in advance those who faithfully volunteer for this parish meal.

With Mother Waldron's return to full-time ministry, Father Hartt would like to begin healing prayer at the Memorial Chapel during Holy Communion on the first Sunday of the month. The Memorial Chapel is private and those parishioners who so desire can easily head there for laying on of hands following receiving Communion.

Father Hartt mentioned the growing number of requests from non-parishioners for the use of the Parish Hall. Often the Parish Hall is requested for meetings and receptions. We need to have a policy and fee structure in place.

Father Hartt spoke about the Annual Meeting. It was much better attended this year. The decision not to combine Services seems to have paid off. We should continue having normal service times on Annual Meeting Sunday.

Father Hartt spoke with Mother Waldron about newcomer incorporation. It would make sense to have one clergy person assigned each Sunday to meet with newcomers who so desire at the Saint Mark's Chapel. It is important to answer questions and engage willing visitors on their first Sunday with us. Inquirer classes would follow.

Five teens have now finished their Confirmation classes. Regional Confirmation will be held at the Cathedral of All Saints, May 20th. Adult Confirmands will resume classes in Lent.

Mother Sue and Father Hartt will offer a Quiet Day on April 2nd.

Discovery Bible Study will begin February 22nd, 6 PM and continue through Lent.

Father Hartt reviewed with the Vestry parish baptisms, funerals, and weddings since November 2004. Present attendance figures clearly reflect the substantial number of deaths in the parish since 2004, with 119 in total. However, new member retention from baptism and marriage needs attention.

Personnel matters were discussed.

Father Hartt said there are some maintenance items at the Rectory. Father Hartt thanked Jimmy Chenot for arranging for excellent snow removal at the rectory.

With respect to outreach, three scholarships for West Buganda orphans were arranged. The Women's Shelter continues to go well.

Father Hartt said that the Cathedral has called a new Dean. Fr. Leander Harding will begin on Palm Sunday. Father Hartt spoke of Fr. Harding glowingly. Our prayers for God's blessing on his new ministry.

Alleluia Box for Lent was discussed.

Sunday Attendance during 2016 totaled 6674.
