From the Rector

The Church

And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16: 17-18.)

In this month's article, I would like to reflect on the Church in three dimensions: 1.) The Church as a gift from God. 2.) The Church in history. 3.) The Church at the parish level.

On Pentecost, we are reminded that the Church is a gift of God. She is born of those tongues of fire that descended upon the Apostles. Jesus called the gift both the Holy Spirit and "power from on high." Without the power, without the coming down from above, there would be no Church. The Apostles depended on the Holy Spirit to know what to say, how to say it, and to guide them as they moved throughout the known world. It is important to note here that knowledge as such was not sufficient. They already knew Jesus' history, His teaching, and His resurrection. But it wasn't about mere information. They needed more, more to become the Church. They needed power from on high. And to this day, so do we.

This brings us to reflect on the Church in history. To the extent that the Church has offered credible witness to her Lord, it has been because her members and clergy have submitted to the Holy Spirit. It hardly needs to be said that institutions founder and become less than authentic witnesses to what they purport to be about, especially over time. This truth needs our charitable reception. We are all sinners and broken in countless ways. Institutions also inherit the sins of their past and perpetuate them often without intending or seeing. What we need here is a generous view of the Church in light of our own failings. Even as we need forgiveness, so does the Church again and again. Yet we also know that the sum is greater than the parts. As Jesus says, "the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

So what about the parish level? We certainly see there the blessings and challenges that exist in the Church in history. Each parish likewise has its own history, perfections, and failings. Every parish has its traditions and practices which delight or frustrate us. I love a verse from the beloved hymn "For All the Saints" which holds "...We feebly struggle, they in glory shine." Truer words were never sung! But we can choose to delight in our own feebleness or at least have a sense of humor about it. The Power is only from Above. We muddle along, but God acts again and again. The Holy Spirit dwells with us and Jesus is glorified in his little saints below. Indeed, it is in our feebleness that the Lord is glorified most. For it is there, as St. Paul says, that grace enters and gives glory to the Lord. (2 Corinthians 12: 9.)

As we live the wonders of God's grace, let us remember to give thanks for the Church. With all her frustrations and bumblyings, yet she is glorious. She is glorious from above, she is glorious in history, and she is glorious in her saints below. May God be ever praised above and below for the great mercy and love revealed in the Church.

I decided to venture into new territory this year and give a try at vegetable gardening! Many of you are long experts, I am certain, so please bear with this newcomer. First, I took many books out of the library to read all I could about this new “hobby”. I then set out and procured organic seeds and starter pods. I planned to plant outdoors around Memorial Day (safely beyond our last frost), and so 6 weeks earlier I planted those little seeds. And then I watered, watched, and waited...

Much happened that was unexpected, of course. Some pods were initially too wet, and then some too dry. I soon discovered that different plant seeds germinate at different speeds. This might seem obvious to some, but I was convinced that some of the seeds were “bad” when no plants sprouted in the cucumber pods only to discover that cucumber seeds need to germinate at or above 70 degrees (and my house wasn't heated to that level). As they grew, I thinned the plants (which seemed tragic at the time) and visited them daily to check for growth and progress.

Over the course of weeks, I moved my trays of pods from table to table so the newly growing plants could get plenty of sun. And I even had to hide them behind closed doors when my cats discovered the leafy “treats” left out for them while I was working! To make this long story short, the seeds eventually grew into plants which have ultimately been planted outdoors. Now I continue to water, watch and wait for the actual fruit of my efforts to come.....or vegetables to be more precise!

Reflecting on this effort to grow my own organic vegetables has caused me to connect much with faith formation in people's lives. It causes me to remember that different people develop their faith at different paces. Some bud quickly while others take longer, and even some appear dormant for a long, long time. Faith formation takes place in one's environment so that, too, has great affect. Tragedy comes along unexpectedly sometimes and may impede growth for a time. Faith formation needs regular attention and healthy input of just the right 'ingredients'. Great care must be given over a very long time while one waits to see the actual fruit produce within the life of the believer.

In ministry I am often comforted to hear how faith is helping people move through events in their life. Recently, someone shared with me how comforting it was that her long-said church prayers rolled off her tongue easily one night as she tossed and turned in pain unable to sleep. She was so grateful for her many years of church attendance where she learned those prayers that brought her great comfort when she most needed it.

Perhaps you question how faith is forming within yourself or someone you love? I hope these gardening analogies give you some comfort. In the end, I can only encourage you to trust God. He has planted us in a rich garden here at St. Peter's and will provide everything needed for us to flourish beautifully. Continue to seek those good things that will bring growth, have patience, and trust that God is forming the faith in just the right way. The good fruit is coming, He promises...



Saint of the Month Club

Saint Mary Magdalene

Prayer:

Almighty God, whose blessed Son restored Mary Magdalene to health of body and mind, and called her to be a witness of his resurrection: Mercifully grant that by thy grace we may be healed of all our infirmities and know thee in the power of his endless life; who with thee and the Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*



Mary of Magdala near Capernaum was one of several women who followed Jesus and ministered to him in Galilee. The Gospel according to Luke records that Jesus "went on through cities and villages, preaching and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God. And the Twelve were with him, and also some women who had been healed of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out ... " (Luke 8:1-2). The Gospels tell us that Mary was healed by Jesus, followed him, and was one of those who stood near his cross at Calvary.

It is clear that Mary Magdalene's life was radically changed by Jesus' healing. Her ministry of service and steadfast companionship, even as a witness to the crucifixion, has, through the centuries, been an example of the faithful ministry of women to Christ. All four Gospels name Mary as one of the women who went to the tomb to mourn and to care for Jesus' body. Her weeping for the loss of her Lord strikes a common chord with the grief of all others over the death of loved ones. Jesus' tender response to her grief—meeting her in the garden, revealing himself to her by calling her name -- makes her the first witness to the risen Lord. She is given the command, "Go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God" (John 20:17). As the first messenger of the resurrection, she tells the disciples, "I have seen the Lord" (John 20:18).

In the tradition of the Eastern Church, Mary is regarded as the equal of an apostle; and she is held in veneration as the patron saint of the great cluster of monasteries on Mount Athos.

Mosaic Floors of St. Peter's Church



The mosaic floors now located in our church Nave were built in the summer of 1901 and dedicated to the memory of Senior Warden Joseph Tillinghast and his son Wilbur Tillinghast. They were designed and built by Mr. J. A. Holzer of New York City in the spirit of Italian mosaic of the 14th Century. These floors greatly enhance the beauty of the church.

In the front of the Nave the motif of the design represents the words of Christ "I am the vine, ye are the branches." The central quatrefoil is made up of the first and last letters of the Greek Alphabet: A, O. These letters allude to the text of the first chapter of the Apocalypse "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is and was and which is to come, the Almighty."

From this quatrefoil are arranged four large medallions. The two on either side of the central symbol going from left to right facing the altar are the Pelican (the symbol of redemption) and the Phoenix (the symbol of the resurrection). On the extreme left are Fishes (standing for baptism) and on the right is a Ship (a symbol of the church).

Between these are smaller symbols of each of the twelve apostles. There are also symbols of Moses (Tables of the Law) and David (The Harp) as well as St. Stephen (Palms) and St. Paul (Sword and Book).

On the center aisle floor are four large symbols. The first, going from the front to back of the Church is the Corporate Arms of St. Peter's Church – see illustration above. This is followed by a Crown which stands for good works, then an Anchor depicting hope, a Lamp representing good works, and last is the elaborate Memorial to Joseph Tillinghast and his son Wilbur.

The side aisles contain animals around a Tree of Life. These animals include: Doves, which represent purity, Lions, representing strength and fortitude, a Peacock which represents immortality, Stags representing faithful Christians, and finally Lambs representing Christians.

During Reverend Bruner's era, Paris Northrup, Dr. Bruner's Secretary conceived the idea of making the mosaic symbols into banners. When this project was complete there were banners depicting various mosaic floor symbols including: rampant Lions, an Anchor, a Ship, a Pelican, a Phoenix, a pair of Doves, a Peacock, a circle of Fish, and a pair of Stags. There were also two banners at the back depicting the American Eagle. All these banners were hung above the east aisle of the church.

The installation of the mosaic floor of the Chancel took place earlier than that of the Nave, occurring at the time of the remodeling of the Chancel of the third edifice of the Church (1885). This floor consists of wavy lines depicting the laver of baptism, after the designs of Robert Gibson. It was a gift of Robert C. Pruyn and is dated April 12, 1886.

Going above the Chancel to the Sanctuary floor are symbols for the four gospels of the New Testament: the gospel of Matthew, symbolized by a Human or Angel, the gospel of Mark, symbolized by a Lion, the gospel of Luke, symbolized by an Ox, and the gospel of John, symbolized by an Eagle. Between the second and third symbols is a depiction of the Greek letters I H S which stands for Jesus Saviour of Men.

The Sanctuary floor contains a plaque with the following inscription:

"The pavement of this Sanctuary was given in loving and sacred memory of Orlando Meads. Twenty seven years Vestryman and eight years Warden of this Parish. Died February 11 A.D. 1884."

The same animal symbolism of the Sanctuary was later depicted in the set of stained glass windows of the Old Choir Room. They were designed by the Chapman Stained Glass Studio of Albany, NY.

1. Approval of the Minutes of Vestry Meeting, April 11, 2017

The April 11, 2017 minutes were approved on a motion by M. Holden and seconded by E. Stafford. The motion was unanimously approved by the vestry.

2. Senior Warden Report - J. Chenot

Jim started off with his report by thanking the clergy, choir and parishioner's collectively as we all celebrated two wonderful well attended Easter services last month. He also wanted to mention that we must all be reminded the Easter season does not end on Easter Sunday but continues as the church calendars appoints each year up to Ascension Thursday. He mentioned this as to the importance of attendance which seems to begin to fall off after Easter Sunday. It is heartwarming to see so many who celebrate Easter Sunday and would like to encourage those that we only see a few times a year to make an effort invite them to come more often to worship with us and get acquainted with some of the newer members at St. Peter's.

This past Sunday, May 7th we had our Choir awards and Sunday school recognition day celebration. Normally we would hold this celebration in June, but Father Hartt will be taking some time off during June and wanted to be sure he was present to celebrate with all of us the accomplishments and milestones that have been made during the year with both the choir and Sunday school. Many thanks to Neil Keen and the choir for all the incredible music they have performed during this past year. We also wish them well as they rehearse regularly preparing to perform abroad this summer in England. As a funding event for the choir trip, Maria Holden has organized an Art and Vintage sale on Friday and Saturday, May 19-20th and we would like to thank her for all her time putting this great event together. The choir will also perform a choral evening song on Ascension Day, Thursday May 25th at 7:30 PM.

This coming Sunday, Mother's Day the Sunday school children with Laura Saffares and Sunday school teachers will be arranging small potted flowers to hand out after the 10:30 service. Again, many thanks to all who work in the Sunday school as well as those in the nursery during the church calendar year.

Looking ahead, the Albany Diocese Convention is coming up in the beginning of June. We would like to thank Carly Crewell, Alice Sanigular and Kevin Cehowski for representing St. Peter's as our delegates this year.

3. Finance - G. Scala

George S. reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the month of April. Total offerings for April were \$35,798. This compares to a budgeted number of \$22,804. YTD offerings are at \$89,352. YTD through the same period in 2016 were \$74,846.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for the month. For April Merrill Lynch was up +1.04% and Key was up +1.21%. YTD the Merrill Lynch shows a positive return of 5.57% and the Key accounts show a 6.46% return. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area YTD of \$207,877. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through April are \$22,568 over budget. YTD we show a gain of \$121,861, primarily as a result of performance of the investment accounts.

Pledges are currently at 53 pledging units for a total amount of \$142,746.

The Hats Off to England Tea on April 23, 2017 was a huge success, raising \$387 for the Choir trip to Chichester England this summer. Thank you Judy Burns, Christy Fish (and team) for coordinating the tea.

Albany CROP Walk was Sunday May 7, 2017. Thank you Tim Murphy for coordinating our participation and all the walkers and those who donated! We will report total donations next month.

I attended the Hearts of Hope program with the Capital City Rescue Mission, also providing the Invocation, and celebrating the 15 years of women's ministry, of which our Overflow Homeless Shelter supported this past winter. They are very grateful to St. Peter's provision of space and hospitality for the winter women's shelter and they continue to do amazing ministry helping transform women and children's lives.

Outreach voted to donate (3) scholarships for Beaver Cross summer camp this year, totaling \$1,470.00.

Food for the Poor will visit St. Peter's Church on Sunday July 2nd and will preach and present on their ministry.

Mission Trip opportunities were also discussed as many local churches plan them and perhaps one or two of us could join one in the future.

8. Associate Rector's Report - Mother Sue

We have an excellent Lenten Program on Sunday April 2, 2017 after service, co-led by Fr. Hartt and I, with a dozen participating. Thank you, Daughters of the King, for providing our luncheon items.

Holy Week and Easter were moving and meaningful services at St. Peter's and I want to thank all those who came to the liturgy and also those who served in various capacities. We had a full church on Easter Sunday which is always wonderful. Perhaps we saw a person there who hasn't been back? If so, we could reach out to tell them how nice it was to worship with them, and encourage them to come back again soon.

Completed Bible Studies: Read the Bible in 90 Days was my first online Bible Study offered and had 12 participants who read the entire Holy Bible from January 1st through March 31st. It was a ambitious yet fruitful exercise. I welcome thoughts on future online Bible studies from Vestry and members of our church. During Lent, the women's Bible study read and reflected on Hearts of Fire, stories of 8 women who were persecuted for their Christian faith. It was difficult material to grapple with and yet relevant to the crises occurring throughout the world as Christians continue to suffer under persecution.

In May and June, the Women's Bible study focused on 1st and 2nd Thessalonians and is complimented by a video series by Beth Moore. We have 4 women participating thus far.

On Wednesdays during May, a group is studying the Acts of the Apostles, co-led by Fr. Hartt and myself. The participants greatly enjoyed our first session last week which gave an overview of the Book of Acts. We are reading one chapter daily and reflecting on them once weekly. Please join us!

Christian Education Survey: The survey was included in two week's leaflets and also the April newsletter. Unfortunately, we only received (3) surveys back so we did not get ample feedback from them to help guide our Christian Education offerings. Suggestions are welcomed!

Healing Prayers: We have been offering Healing Prayers on the 1st Sunday of the month during Holy Communion. Each time, we have had multiple people come for prayers and we are blessed by the movement of the Holy Spirit among us!

Diocesan Convention: I will be offering a workshop/teaching on "The Call to Forgive" during Convention weekend. Additionally, I am running for election as Provisional Deputy to General Convention. I bid your prayers for both. Tonight is the pre-convention meeting at 7:00pm at The Cathedral of All Saints.

Confirmation instruction was separate for the teens and adults. Both worked hard on their instruction, including memorizing the 10 Commandments, Apostles' Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. The Confirmands also each wrote letters to Bishop Love about their recent growth in Christ.

Our beloved Pat Shortall has announced his retirement as of July 1, 2017. Words fail to describe the blessing Pat Shortall has been to this parish over 35 years. Pat is a man of great faith, calm strength, and genuine love for us. The good news is that Pat will remain on the property for certain tasks and work a light schedule, including most Sunday mornings. We wish Pat the joyful retirement that he richly deserves and give thanks to God for him.

Our Easter Services were well attended. The Choir's performance of the St. Matthew's Passion on Good Friday was powerful and well attended. Easter Season thus far has had good attendance and a reverent joy. Choir and Sunday School Awards went well this past Sunday.

Bishop Ball's funeral was held on May 13th. The Diocese came out in huge numbers to give thanks for his faithful ministry and to commend Bishop Ball to the Lord.
