From the Rector

Solid Ground

The other day, our family took a trip to Rensselaerville and enjoyed a hike. It reminded me of just how much Upstate NY is beautiful. It is especially so in the summer. The lakes, mountains, and woods are pretty much unrivaled. Even the air has a special quality. We are quite blessed in the area. Of course, we have our challenges in terms of economic development in our more rural parts. But there is a resiliency and tenacity of spirit among folks. Whatever our summer plans might be, let's take time to count our natural blessings. They are truly all around us.

It seems that the older I become, the more nature speaks to me. I was fairly urban in my outlook as a younger adult. Many young adults are that way. Our major cities have their allure to be sure. Excitement and rapid change are more attuned to a younger nervous system. But that begins to change for most of us. I know that it has for me. The very soil seems to speak to me these days -- the rocks, the streams, the sky. I increasingly need to connect with what is stable, organic, real.

Many of my generation and older have made peace with the technological revolution and social media that permeate almost all of life these days. I am no Luddite. I enjoy the many benefits. But it always seems to leave me hungry for more genuine connection. It also leaves me feeling frazzled much of the time. The in-box can seem like a toppling wall. Text messages ping, ping, ping. A flowing stream is restorative and healing. A mountain is formidable and not mere cyberspace. There are times that I just want to plop down on the grass and roll about as I did as a kid. Give me some reality, some earth under my feet.

So what is my point here? Next Sunday will be Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is the birth not only of the Church, but of the very ground under our feet. It is solid ground. In fact, there is no other ground that is or can be solid for the Church. I am reminded of Jesus' parable about the house built on rock and the house built on sand. We know which one stands! The sand foundation of the Church is pretty much all we bring to the table. It is the plans and programs in which we place too much faith. Plans and programs are only vehicles for the presence (we pray) or absence (we pray not) of the Holy Spirit. They are infused from above or they are soon revealed to be not according to the mind of the Spirit which comes and goes as the Spirit chooses.

The truth that the Holy Spirit alone is ground for our feet is born out by Christian experience again and again. The Holy Spirit can be as powerfully encountered with two or three praying for something or someone at the kitchen table as in the most beautiful of liturgies. The little prayer chapel beyond the vending machines at my seminary had more of a sense of the Holy Spirit than the glorious church upstairs which had countless great theologians in its pulpit. God is in charge of holiness and spiritual possibility. God is in charge of what is and is not blessed forward. And perhaps most of all, God is in charge of what is and is not solid ground.

This Pentecost, I pray that we notice more and more the ways of the Holy Spirit. Put another way, that we make ourselves supplicants of the Holy Spirit more and more. God is very generous. Jesus loves His Church. The Holy Spirit is given out of love. Yet as St. Paul reminds us, "...no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit." (1 Cor. 12:3.) The Holy Spirit is that important.

We have been on a bit of a hike here. Thank you for coming with me. Hikes go better with solid ground under our feet. So does the Church's hike. Come Holy Ghost! Blessed Pentecost, Fr. Hartt+

From the Associate Rector

Graduation - the completion or a new beginning?

Every May and June, one can't help but focus on the theme of Graduation. There are many in our congregation that we celebrate each year as people complete their high school or college studies. We will even see many graduations from middle school, elementary school and even pre-school! Our society likes to celebrate graduations.

But what are we celebrating? Often at a graduation we are thinking in terms of completion – the individual has completed certain requirements and, thus, graduates from a program of study. However, the actual service of graduation is often called "Commencement". And commencement, used as a noun, means "a beginning, or start".

So, is graduation a completion or a beginning?

We are also, at this time of year, thinking about Confirmation. In fact, we just hosted the Regional Confirmations for the Diocese of Albany here at St. Peter's with four of our own being confirmed by Bishop Love. Like graduation, confirmation has a sense of completion to it; the confirmands have completed a program of study learning about their faith and church and thus desiring to make a mature, adult commitment to it and asking for God's strength and power to do so. But, also like graduation, Confirmation is really a beginning.

During the Confirmation service, the Bishop lays hands on the confirmand and prays:

"Strengthen, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit; empower *him* for your service; and sustain *him* all the days of *his* life. *Amen.*"

This prayer, and anointing of the Holy Spirit, certainly highlights Confirmation as a new beginning of strengthening, service and life itself within the Christian faith. It is not the end of study – a "graduation" from church so to speak. But, it is also not the start of a new faith, but rather the start of a new way to express and live out that faith. This is often because one has been baptized as an infant, thus, the tenants of the Christian faith need to be learned and embraced for oneself as s/he grows in maturity. Likewise, confirmation is confirming that one's time of study has prepared them for a new beginning of service and life within the Christian faith.

So, how do we live out our Confirmation vows? There are so many among us that volunteer and minister here at St. Peter's in a variety of ways. These people have surely found their way of service within the Christian faith. Yet, not everyone has or perhaps some of us might re-evaluate this from time to time? The summer months may be the perfect time to seek the Lord and ask how we should or could be serving at our church.

Like the first disciples, we too are to learn about the Christianity so that we are equipped to teach and lead others. Our own ministry and service is meant to be a natural expression of our faith, a use of our unique talents and gifts, and be joyful and life giving not only personally but to the Body of Christ. Do you feel this way about your own service and ministry? If you do, then celebrate that and continue. If not, it may indicate that God has other ministry or service for you to do and you might consider praying about that. Please know that your clergy stand ready to pray with you and help you discern your place of ministry and service within our community.

My hope is that with each of us doing this over the summer months, we might come together in September for the "new year" emboldened for Christian service and ministry that will be joyful and life giving to us and to others.



Composer of the Month Club

Orlando Gibbons

Composer of the month - Orlando Gibbons (1583-1625) English organist and composer, was a leading composer of early 17th century England. He sang in the choir of Kings College Cambridge and was later appointed to the Chapel Royal, where he served as organist.

His compositions has maintained a place in the repertoire over the centuries.

For keyboard - various pieces equally appropriate for harpsichord or for the rather modest pipe organs of his day.

<u>Hymn melodies</u> - from his "Hymns and Songs of the Church," which are identified by their tune designations, Song 1, Song 13, and Song 67.

<u>Anthems and canticles</u> - ranging from simple four part motets to more elaborate contrapuntal anthems.

<u>Madrigals</u> - many well-loved secular chorals works, a few of which have been re-fit with sacred texts to allow this wonderful music to be heard in church.

Along with William Byrd and Thomas Tallis, Gibbons has earned the position as a founder of the English Church music tradition that continues today.





The Right Reverend William Croswell Doane





Of The Cathedral Of All Saints In The City And Diocese Of Albany 1874

For the greater glory of God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; in promoting the dignity and honor of His worship; in extending and up-building His Kingdom, in the city of Albany and in adjoining places; in establishing and maintaining schools for the Christian training of His children; in discharging all the works of mercy, corporal as well as spiritual; and in strengthening a Diocesan centre of unity, influence and work, we, William Croswell Doane, S.T.D., by the grace of God first Bishop of the Diocese of Albany, and our well-beloved Priests, John Henry Hobart Brown, S.T.D., Archdeacon of Albany, John Ireland Tucker, S.T.D., Archdeacon of Troy, Hiram W. Beers, S.T.D., Theodore Babcock, D.D., John Townsend, together with our faithful laymen, Erastus Corning, Orlando Meads, James Forsyth, Amos P. Palmer and Walter A. Wood, being the Trustees and corporators of the Body known in law as the Cathedral of All Saints in the city and Diocese of Albany, do hereby, in accordance with the powers assigned to us by the Act of our Incorporation, set forth the following Constitution of the Cathedral of All Saints.

ARTICLE I OF THE CHAPTER SEC. 1. The Right Reverend William Croswell Doane, S.T.D., ex officio, and his successors in office together with four Priests, canonically resident in the Diocese, in good standing, to be known, collectively, as the Four Principal Persons, and , severally, as the Dean, the Precentor, the Chancellor and the Treasurer; and four other clergymen, canonically resident in the diocese, to be known as the Canons of the Cathedral, and six laymen, one of whom shall be known as the Vice-Chancellor and one as the Assistant Treasurer, all well esteemed communicants of the Church in the Diocese, shall constitute, when appointed, the Body corporate known as the Cathedral of All Saints in the city and Diocese of Albany, and shall be the first Chapter thereof.

SEC. 2. The Chapter is charged, under the direction of the Bishop, to advance the missionary work of the Church in and about the city of Albany, to maintain a constant and well ordered worship of Almighty God, to found and uphold Christian schools, and to begin and sustain every practicable work of Christian charity.

From the Archives

This book traces the history of the Episcopal Cathedral of All Saints in Albany New York. It began in 1869 when the current Rector of St. Peter's Church, William Croswell Doane was chosen and consecrated as the first Bishop of the newly formed Diocese of Albany. The selection of Bishop Doane was significant because from the beginning of the new Diocese of Albany, Doane envisioned a new concept. He would found a Cathedral Complex with Schools and Houses of Mercy of every kind. He also advocated the traditional Cathedral governance using the Chapter organization of Deans and Canons.

Bishop Doane did not hesitate to put his ambitions into action. He had founded a school, the St. Agnes School for Girls by September 7th of 1870. He accepted a gift from Erastus Corning of the entire block on Elk Street between Hawk and Swan to extend all the way to Spruce Street. On this land he founded a new chapel in the old Townsend Brother's Foundry in 1872. This would be a chapel for St. Agnes School for Girls as well as the forerunner of his cathedral.

Pioneer Cathedral

By 1874 the first Constitution and Statues of the Cathedral of All Saints had been written and by 1875 a General Chapter consisting of clergy and lay members had first met. On November 23rd of 1881 the Chapter had appointed a committee to select the site for the Cathedral. On June 10th of 1882 Erastus Corning had bought all the required lots for the Cathedral construction and presented them to the Chapter. By 1883 Robert William Gibson was selected as Architect and by June 3rd 1884 the Cornerstone was laid.

When the General Chapter met in 1888 they made Canon Wilbur Lash Robbins the Cathedral Dean. This was an important appointment. He would serve in that capacity for 15 years. On April 2nd of 1901 the Austin Organ company was selected to build an organ suitable for the Cathedral. In 1902 an anonymous donor gave the funds for the completion of the Choir. This donor was probably J.P. Morgan. This was the last building on the Cathedral, a building which has never been finished.

In 1911 while Bishop Doane was in Europe, Andrew Sloan Draper, the Commissioner of Education bought up the options on the buildings in the Cathedral Block and began building the present State Education Building. By 1913 the massive building was complete. The State Education Building blocked the view of the Cathedral on the south and east sides and took up the grounds that were supposed to surround the Cathedral. The building of the State Education in this way may have been the result of animosity between Commissioner Draper and Bishop Doane.

There were eight Bishops after Bishop Doane. Two that continued his ambitious spirit were Bishop Barry and Bishop Brown. Bishop Barry founded the Good Samaritan Center located on Hackett Avenue. It contained the new Child's Hospital, the addition to St. Margaret's Center and the Nelson House for the Aged. St. Paul's Church is also located at the Center.

Under Bishop Brown the Cathedral and the Morning Star Baptist Church together formed a membership corporation to own and sponsor a house development in Arbor Hill. Bishop Brown hailed it as one of the best projects that had come about in a long time. The current Bishop is William H. Love who became the Bishop of Albany in 2007.

The Venerable Dr. Leander Harding was selected and installed as the Cathedral Dean in 2017.

Handel's "The Brockes Passion" with full orchestra immediately following the noon time service at 1:15. We would like to thank Neil and the entire choir for all their time and dedication they put forth during this meaningful and spiritual time, in our church life.

This coming Sunday, April 14th, we will be celebrating Palm Sunday at both the 8:30 and 10:30 services. The choir will again continue the traditional Ride On procession at the end of the 10:30 service. The Sunday school will also be busy during the Palm Sunday service decorating Easter eggs for the Easter egg hunt, which will be held the following Saturday at the Rectory. We would like to thank our Sunday school director Laura Rulison and all the Sunday school staff in advance for all their hard work and guidance working with the children each Sunday, in addition to those who help in the nursery.

The week of April 15th, each day during Holy week, a noon time service is performed. As mentioned, there will be a Maundy Thursday evening service, Good Friday noon time service followed with a musical concert, leading up to two wonderful Sunday Morning Easter services at 8:30 and 10:30. Thank you to Neil and the choir for their entire dedication performing wonderful music at all these services. Also, I would like to thank our choir Mom, Diana Martin who coordinates the brunch in between the Easter Services for the choir as well ensuring the Choir looks their best at all the services.

The vestry would also like to thank the altar guild, the flower guild and ushers for all their time and talents volunteering during the Lenten and Easter season. Thanks to Pat and Ian for keeping the Church and physical plant clean and in order for all the parishioners and newcomers. We also want to recognize and thank both Janice and Ruth for working tirelessly these next few weeks in the church office. The amount of work that is processed in the office this time is an incredible task – printed items for the extra services as well as all the record keeping for Easter Lilies memorials. We are sincerely thankful for both of them, for all their tireless work during this busy season.

<u>Rector's Report</u> - Fr. Hartt began with the unfortunate news that the email scam has resurfaced. This morning Fr. Hartt received word from Moses Kamya that he had an email requesting funds from a fraudulent g-mail account bearing Fr. Hartt's name. Anyone can set up a g-mail account in this way. It is difficult to address. Please do not respond to these email solicitations, but rather call the office. Fr. Hartt regrets the need to share such news in this most holy Season.

Fr. Hartt reviewed the schedule for Holy Week. The Choir and Mr. Keen have been hard at work preparing for The Brockes Passion by G. F. Handel. It will be performed following the Good Friday Liturgy. We are also mindful of the blessing we routinely have at St. Peter's of liturgies with such fine music to the glory of God. Fr. Hartt thanked Neil Keen and the Choir for their labors.

On Saturday, April 13th at 4:30 PM we will be fortunate to have the Choir of Lincoln College, Oxford preforming at St. Peter's. The choir will offer music for Lent and Passion-tide. This is a rare opportunity to hear one of the finest choirs in our Anglican tradition. It is not to be missed. Fr. Hartt thanked Mr. Keen for finalizing the arrangements.

Fr. Hartt spoke of the Passover meal celebrated with the Sunday School. The pictures on Facebook are glorious. Fr. Hartt thanked Laura Rulison for establishing this tradition. One parent told Fr. Hartt of the care their family has been taking with their children in reading Bible stories at home. The family is making use of the numerous fine children's Bibles appropriate for every age. Fr. Hartt spoke of the immeasurable value of this practice.

On April 15th, the clergy will be attending the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral. This is a time when ordination vows are renewed and holy oils for Baptism and healing are blessed by the Bishop for the use of parishes.

Laura Rulison and Sunday School staff are preparing for the Easter Egg Hunt at the rectory. Fr. Hartt thanked Laura Rulison, Ashley Spath and Victoria Pautler for their hand in preparing the fun event.

Fr. Hartt shared that the Women's Shelter has closed for the season. It was another successful year and incident free. Mary Maloney of the City Mission is our local Mother Teresa. We are blessed to play our part as host. Jim Chenot has been particularly faithful to the City Mission through the years. We are thankful for the witness to the broader community.

Fr. Hartt shared that the time of healing prayers and anointing offered on the first Sunday of the month has grown in participation. He rejoices that the parish has availed themselves of this sacrament with devotion.

ALPHA continues on Wednesday nights. We are fortunate to have five new members of our group. It is a powerful program and one that we can confidently invite our family and friends to explore. Fr. Hartt plans to run an Alpha next fall on Sunday following the 10:30AM Service.

Fr. Hartt met with Dean Harding about the Cathedral congregation being with us during the summer. Further meetings will be taking place to cover the logistics. We look forward to having their presence from June until the start of September. Asbestos tiles are being removed at the Cathedral and the congregation is asked to vacate during the removal.

Fr. Hartt thanked the Vestry for their faithfulness and wished us all a blessed Holy Week.

Finance -

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for March. Offerings for March were \$18,876. Year to date offerings are at \$56,126. This compares to a budgeted number of \$56,913. Offerings through the same period in 2018 were \$51,170. George reported that these were encouraging through three months.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for March. Merrill Lynch had a return of +0.99% for the month. Year to date return is +11.39%. The Key accounts showed a monthly return of +0.08% and a year to date return of +8.83%. This leaves us with a positive variance in this area YTD of \$345,793. George again noted that we ended 2018 with a loss in this area so there is quite a bit of ground to gain back and the market still can be volatile. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses through March were \$5,156 over budget.

Pledges for 2019 are at 41 pledging units for a total amount of \$117,724. The website is not yet able to accept pledges but hopefully will be soon. Contributions and pledges for the Restoration Project remain very favorable.

Property -

The mosaic floors in the church will be stripped and cleaned right after Easter. The carpet on the Altar has also been taken to be cleaned.

<u>**Outreach**</u> – March 31st completed the 10th season of our Overflow Homeless Shelter support Capital City Rescue Mission's support to homeless individuals of the Capital District. This year we housed women nightly from December through March. Thank you for your prayers, financial support and volunteering to aid the women who stayed with us. Special thanks to Mary Maloney for her leadership.

April 28th is the Spring Tea. This year the proceeds will benefit Beaver Cross Scholarships for the youth. Judy Burns is seeking donations for Raffle basket items. Please see her if you can donate or help with this year's Tea.

St. Peter's will once again participate in the Albany CROP Walk. We thank Tim Murphy and Marian Holden for volunteering as St. Peter's Recruiters. Please see Tim or Maria for a walker packet or to make a donation to the CROP walk.
