ST. PETER'S CHURCH RECTOR'S REPORT

Then Nehemiah said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength."

As I reflect on this past year at St. Peter's, the words of Nehemiah today seem especially poignant. There is a core strength in which we are held and it is the joy of the Lord. Saint Peter's has always had an orientation towards joyfulness as a church. We like one another. We greatly enjoy fellowship with one another. We truly pray for one another. Most of all, as St. Paul teaches, we bear one another's burdens and rejoice together when any person among us is especially blessed. This joyfulness in the Lord speaks to the depth of connections, born of time and genuine spiritual investment. The joy itself is the gift of the Lord through the Holy Spirit; a gift from above to the Church. The reception of that gift is our life's blood.

I have found many causes for joy this past year. The weddings planned, a Choir that never ceases to amaze by its brilliance, seeing your acts of mutual care and sacrificial giving, my faithful colleague in Mtr. Waldron, our committed and prayerful vestry, two Wardens, Debbie Spath and Jim Chenot ,who give heart and soul, a first-rate new office manager in Ruth Manss, Neil Keen's great talent and gentle wisdom, Pat Shortall's successful heart operation and the love that you showed him, the gift of Wayne Hill and Ian Mike's faithful watch, your frequent acts of charity, our many volunteers, especially Janice Chenot in the office, our devoted Altar Guild, LEMs, Ushers, and Archivist Connie Powell, all our Sunday School teachers and beloved children under Laura Rulison, and yet another glorious Christmas. The list of joys could continue *ad infinitum*.

One joy that has especially moved my heart this year is Alpha. Alpha is a series of DVD talks on the Christian faith. It comes from the Church of England and has a particularly gifted speaker in the Rev. Nicky Gumbel. Alpha could be described as what CS Lewis means by "Mere Christianity." Alpha is the "Mere Christianity" of our time. I have been particularly moved by the impact of Alpha on several of your fellow parishioners. They represent a diversity of ages and spiritual perspectives. They each believe Alpha will prove highly effective in both bringing new Christians to faith and deepening the faith of those who are already regular churchgoers. These fellow parishioners are each strongly committed to anchoring Alpha in our common life at St. Peter's. It is a powerful program that we can run afresh each year. If there is one programmatic initiative in which the parish might place hope of new growth, it is Alpha.

I hope that you can tell that I am excited about it. I invite you to sample an Alpha talk at our Annual Meeting today. Ashley Spath will also be giving a testimonial. Indeed, all the participants would gladly give such a witness. And this brings me to a point that I see as essential at this time in our life as a parish. We need to focus on bringing people to Christ in new ways. It goes without saying that doing so is the mission of the Church. But the fact is that many things can get in the way. We love our traditions here and there is no need to change them. But they do have a tendency to drain clergy and support staff time in a way that is all-consuming. We are in a time now in which Christian education and evangelism programs can not be seen as an add-on for the interested. They must become the very core of our mission. This emphasis is not about changing the things we do in fellowship or worship. Rather, it is about coming to terms honestly with the cultural context in which we live as Christians.

Once upon a time, we were a culturally Christian nation. We can argue whether that was a good or bad thing and at what depth it ever went, but what matters is that we see clearly that it is no longer so. What that means for our church and church growth is that we can no longer sideline basic Christian formation. In the ancient Church, it would have been called catechesis. We need tools for today to form, convert and deepen souls. No tool is perfect. Alpha isn't perfect. Your clergy aren't perfect. But we can take our poverty and ask God to bless it forward for His Kingdom. Jesus has promised that He will do so.

Wherever two or three are gathered in His Name, He is there and the Holy Spirit comes to those who ask the blessing.

So yes, I am bringing up the "e" word Episcopalians tremble before – evangelism. It is our calling and present urgency. The days of cultural Episcopalianism are over. There is hardly anything more obvious than that truth. Moreover, we are experiencing an increased influx of brand new Christians and those coming from other denominations who do not yet know our ways. Of course, we are also attending to our own deepening of conversion. Church should be ordered to the first order of business – the conversion of souls. Do not be surprised in the coming year if the "e" word comes up more than usual, as we will need all hands on deck. I'm reminded of something an African Bishop once shared. He said that their understanding of what it means to be ready for Confirmation is that the Confirmation candidate could lead another person to Christ. I know we can do evangelism in a way that is both Episcopalian and faithful. In many cases, this will involve inviting people to church and leading them to Alpha.

Saint Paul says to us today: "Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ... Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it." (1 Cor. 12: 2, 27.) As I pondered the Epistle for today, it occurred to me that the emphasis on spiritual gifts for the common good often tends to place the accent on the individual. What I mean is that when Paul says, "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Cor. 12: 4.), there can be a tendency to focus not on the body but on the individual Christian. One of the strengths of St. Peter's is that it has a whole Body orientation. We love and serve one another as individuals, but there is an even greater love for the Body as a whole. We understand how we are in this together. We really do seek the common good.

This year that gift was put to the test. Yet we proved ourselves true to the Body by God's grace. The actions of General Convention and Bishop Love concerning same-sex marriage forced us to love across difference as a parish. We saw clearly that we needed to respect the consciences of one another as never before. As I write this Annual Report, Bishop Love has a ministry restriction from the Presiding Bishop and faces Title IV disciplinary possibilities. The restriction extends only to the area of oversight of matters concerning same-sex marriage in the diocese. None of us know what is next for Bishop Love or the Episcopal Church in this matter. But what we do know is that we responded well as the Body of Christ in this place. We decided to love one another even when we could not agree. Indeed, Christian love is more about mutual respect than mutual agreement. I am proud of how St. Peter's rose to the challenge.

One matter of interest for us this year is our Cathedral. Dean Harding has approached me about the Cathedral worshiping at St. Peter's over the summer. The Cathedral is having asbestos tiles removed from the sanctuary and must vacate. The details of their joining us are still in need of being worked out, but I know that our traditional hospitality will be generous and warm. It will also be fun to have a few more Episcopalians in our midst over the summer months. We will experience being one Body in a yet greater way.

Even as the Cathedral is about to commence their interior renovations, we are concluding phase one of our interior restorations. As we behold the beauty of the repairs and fresh paint, we give thanks that by the generosity of this parish, the work of this phase has been fully funded. Donations have been generous and widespread. I am especially proud of your willingness to undertake the responsibility of this important work while continuing to be mindful of St. Peter's routine stewardship needs. A special thanks goes to Fred Hersey for fundraising, Jim Chenot for supervision, George Scala and Janice Chenot for monitoring finances, and to Maria Holden for her diligent work to discover the original paint color and to supply us with an expert historical analysis. This work is done to the glory of God. We feel in our souls the blessing of renewal. Thank you each for your labors and gifts.

I want to end with another note of encouragement. Many years back, the Vestry became mindful that a new generation of leadership needed to be raised up for St. Peter's. The presence of Ashley Spath and Christie Gordon on Vestry has revealed the wisdom of a new generation. I am confident about St. Peter's future. Yes, it is true that these are challenging times. But this new generation has its own wisdom. We rejoice and can see how the Father's plan is always one of provision for the future.

I think of our Gospel for today. It is a young Jesus just beginning His ministry about which Luke writes:

"Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.'

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'" (Luke 4: 14-21.)

It is Jesus' Church and these young adults love their Lord. They share a special heart for the things of which Jesus speaks – Gospel imperatives each. We will be blessed to watch The Episcopal Church and Saint Peter's under the care of new leadership. It reminds me that one of the greatest strengths of Saint Peter's is the mutual affection across generations. We are in good hands going forward.

As the Gospel today reveals, grace, mercy, and love are the eternal heart of Christ. Our job is simply to make Him known now, to be bold in our faith, and to trust fully the God who loves us so. If we do so, 2019 could be the best year yet.

"And he who was seated on the throne said, 'Behold, I am making all things new.'" (Rev. 21:5.)

ST. PETER'S CHURCH ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S REPORT

2018 marked the tenth anniversary of my Ordination and also my tenth year serving the fine people at St. Peter's Church and the City of Albany. It has been quite a decade! Although we treasure our many annual traditions, I am also blessed by the unplanned and miraculous that God does among the many members and visitors he brings through our doors.

The most amazing part of ministry at St. Peter's are all the people I serve with. As you all know, Fr. Hartt is an amazing priest and has been a gracious mentor and colleague to me. I wouldn't be the priest I am today without his support and guidance. We are all blessed with the strongest administrative support possible through the efforts of Janice for many, many years along with Ruth who joined our staff this year, as well as Ian and Pat who keep all our practical needs met at

the highest level. Laura and her team of teachers are amazing with our youngest members, and the lay leadership offering their talents in our choir, guilds, ushers, lectors, LEM's and Vestry are what makes our church so unique and special. I'd like to especially thank our wardens Deb Spath and Jim Chenot for their dedication to us all and the countless hours they give to care for our church's needs and all of us.

As you may know, teaching is always one of my favorite ministries here at St. Peter's. In 2018, I was able to offer a variety of courses. We studied two books by Evelyn Underhill. The first began the year with Lent with Evelyn Underhill followed in the Fall with Abba: Meditations on the Lord's Prayer. I also was blessed to join Fr. Hartt as he introduced the Alpha program to the parish. Watch in 2019 for more announcements about this exciting opportunity. We also were blessed to teach Confirmation classes to the teens which continues into the New Year. Supplementing these were retreats with the Diocese, including two clergy retreats and one women's retreat. These, along with Youth Sundays and children's sermons give me great encouragement as I witness the spiritual growth of both the young and old in our congregation.

I continue as Chaplain to our Julia Chapter of the Daughters of the King. This group of women are a mighty prayer presence among us. They are faithful as intercessors of our daily prayer needs, along with support to the parish through Outreach ministries and retreats. This year we are studying *Continuing the Journey: The Spiritual Formation* Guide. Other activities from the year included monthly gatherings, discernment classes, forming 81 Blessing bags (personal care items for homeless women) a Neighborhood Prayer Walk in the Fall and hosting the Lenten and Advent Quiet Days for the parish. Many thanks to our President, Julie Hotmer Drao for her faithful leadership. The Daughters welcome your prayer requests and also inquiries from women of the parish that may wish to join us in this ministry of prayer, evangelism and service.

Pastoral care continues at St. Peter's at the highest level. The clergy visit many in the hospitals, nursing homes or individual homes while convalescing. There also remains a large traffic flow from the street into our offices during the week from individuals seeking assistance as well as many daily visitors to our church. These local outreach opportunities allow us to bring Christ into the midst of many members and non-members alike. With our sanctuary open daily, we have become a haven of prayer, rest and reflection for many downtown workers and visitors. We are truly a beacon of light shining on State Street hill. I refer you to the Outreach Report submitted by Judy Burns for review of our other many Outreach activities.

We were also blessed this year by sharing many life events through baptisms, confirmations, weddings and yes, even funerals. There are so many faithful members who draw strength from one another within our church from the beginning of life to its very end and I am blessed to be invited into these many celebrations. I am always honored to be part of your joy and your hope and claim with you the promise of the Gospel of Jesus Christ at life's end.

In the wider Diocese, I continue representing St. Peter's Church at the Parish Leadership Conference, Regional Bible Symposiums, Deanery events, Diocesan Convention and other clergy gatherings. In June we celebrated our Diocese's 150th Convention with special guest Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. His enthusiasm and encouragement in the Lord are contagious! A highlight from the Fall was attending *Transformed: An Inner Healing Conference* with Judith McNutt. There I learned much about addiction, recovery and inner healing that will all be invaluable to my ministry. Additionally, I continue

to act as Chair of the Commission on Ministry helping Bishop Love guide our Diocese's Ordination process.

St. Peter's remains a wonderful place to serve, an extraordinary place to worship, and a loving place to grow within the body of Christ. As the place I have served and worshipped every year since my Ordination, I look forward to my eleventh year serving among you. I'd like to end with special thanks for the love, prayer, visits, notes and support given me during my hospitalization and recovery at home in December. I was at the receiving end of your prayers and pastoral care and this helped me realize just how special our church family is. Christmas Eve service was the best "welcome home" celebration I have experienced in church life. Thank you for making my Christmas so special.

"I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:3-6)

ST. PETER'S CHURCH PROPERTY AND RESTORATION REPORT

In the past few years the property committee has not had much to report at the annual meeting, many items that are normally addressed regarding the properties pertain to normal maintenance and repair. 2018 was an exception with plans that had been in the works toward possibly beginning an interior restoration project at St. Peter's. Egan's Restorations based out of Rhode Island, noted to have done many historical churches primarily in Boston as well as throughout the northeast, made numerous trips meeting with us during 2017. With many of their recommendations they were able to quote the restoration project in phases allowing us to raise the funds to meet each phase. When the project was mentioned early on in 2018 in one of the newsletters, an anonymous donor donated \$100,000.00 as a matching grant to get the project underway. When this was noted in the minutes in the following newsletter, we began to receive donations before we had actually announced a fundraising appeal which was very encouraging.

In June, our interior restoration project took its first step by sending a letter with the intent to raise funds for the first phase of the project. A sample of the wall repaired and painted with the intended color was accomplished near the columbarium in back of the church. We received many positive comments in regards to the color choice which was the fruit of a great deal of time testing core samples of the wall to ensure that we were using the correct color that was used in the past. Another formal letter with a brochure was prepared to go out in September explaining all of the planned phases as well as where we were in regards to the \$100,000.00 matching grant which needed to be reached to move forward with the first phase of the project. Phase one entailed cleaning and repairing the walls in the church as well as cleaning the stonework around the stained-glass windows.

Much to our surprise with energy behind the project and donations ahead of time towards the matching grant, we were able to inform Egan that they would be able to start some of phase one in August. The formal kickoff letter and brochure went out in September which enabled us to meet the matching grant and we were able to instruct Egan to continue the work needed to be done on phase one. By Christmas Eve services, approximately 80 percent of the work was done which enabled many that had not seen the ongoing work to get a first look at the breathtaking progress that had been made. The color that was chosen has enhanced so many of the other colors throughout the church and we received so many compliments during the Christmas season.

We are now close to completing phase one this January and have already received donations from some family members who have decided to donate funds to clean the pulpit. The restoration committee would like to thank all those who have already given to this worthy endeavor as well as for all of the compliments. In February we will begin to assess when we will be able to move forward on additional phases. The next phase moving forward will be the cleaning of the pillars. However, we are still in need of additional financial support to take this step. Please consider giving to this worthwhile project if you have not already done so. As parishioners of St. Peter's, we have been able to worship in one of the most beautiful churches in Albany which we should be proud of calling our home. We all have a shared responsibly in maintaining its beauty and integrity.

Another important visitor was George Bryant, a photographer and stained glass expert who took pictures of the stained glass windows of Henry Holiday. He sent a CD of his pictures which we now have in the Archives collection. One other interesting visitor was Aaron Mair who was interested in maps of the church property to 1899. He copied our large laminated map of our early church property.
- 3. Newsletter Articles: I have continued to write and illustrate articles under the title From the Archives for the monthly Church Newsletter.
- 4. *Chronology*: I am keeping a chronology of important events as they occur in the Church. This continues the chronology back to the early days of the founding of St. Peter's Church.

Outreach continues to grow and thrive at St. Peter's Church. We have had a wonderful year with many projects and programs. Thank you to all who have contributed in so many different ways and made this such a special year.

Here are some of our many 2018 activities-

St. Peter's Overflow Shelter- This ministry in conjunction with the Capitol City Rescue Mission is in its 10th year. During the colder months, St. Peter's serves as an overflow shelter and host for up to ten homeless women from the mission. The support for this project has been truly amazing. We have received numerous monetary and food donations.

St. Francis Mission Soup Kitchen- Laura Saffares and her "Angels in Training" together with other church members volunteer in the preparation and serving of a hot lunch to over 100 people on one Saturday a month.

West Bugunda- Outreach provided scholarships for four girls from West Bugunda to attend school...

Thanksgiving- For the sixth year, a large collection of food donations adorns our altar at Thanksgiving. Thanks to Jeffrey Hartt, the youth and flower guild members for arranging this beautiful display. Some of the food is kept at the church and much of it is donated to the food pantry at St. Mary's Church.

Adopt A Family for Christmas- St. Peters adopted two Burmese refuge families and provided 45 gifts for these families. Thank you to all who participated and contributed many gifts.

Equinox- Many members and church families helped prepare meals for the annual Thanksgiving Meal Program.

Overflow Shelter at the First Lutheran Church- This major outreach program provides a complete hot dinner for 20 men each Thursday evening from November 1st through April 30th. Volunteers from St. Peter's sign up for a week. They may either deliver the meals to the first Lutheran Church or to St. Peter's on the Sunday before for Pat Shortall (our sexton) to deliver the meals during the week. Many thanks to Pat Shortall and Deb Spath for seeing that this program runs smoothly.

Tea- a tea was held in April to raise money for the HAC (Homeless Action Committee) Van. The HAC Van touches the lives of homeless people living on the streets in Albany by providing food, clothing, blankets and an ear to listen.

CROP Walk- Thanks to Tim Murphy for organizing the CROP Walk and the parishioners who walked to raise money for hunger.

Daughters of the King- The members of the DOK with donations from the parish members assembled 81 Blessing Bags for the women who stay in our shelter.

Siena College- The Siena College Franciscan center donated 10 large bags filled with Christmas gifts for the women staying upstairs in our shelter.

Homeless Action Committee – The Outreach Committee donated funds in support of their work for the homeless in Albany.

Beaver Cross- St. Peter's also provided four Beaver Cross Scholarships.

Church Office Staff and Clergy Outreach- Father Hartt, Mother Sue and Pat, Ian, Ruth and Janice continue to provide outreach and welcome to the many daily "walk-ins" in need during office hours on a daily basis. A special thanks to our clergy and the staff for going the extra mile to help those in need.

Free Organ Concerts- Our very talented organist and Choirmaster, Neil Keen, continues to graciously reach out and generously provide free recitals on Fridays at 12:30 pm for the enjoyment of the public.

St. Peter's Softball Team- St. Peter's Angels Softball Team led by Peter Benson provides a wonderful athletic and fellowship program for church members.

Bereavement Program- A yearly Service of Remembrance is offered for those who would like to remember their loved ones.

Backpacks- Laura Saffares and the youth with donations from members filled back packs with school supplies for needy children.

Top of the Hill Group- This group of gentlemen gather together each Wednesday morning for fellowship and discussion.

Friends of St. Peter's- This is a new social group that meets weekly on Tuesdays from 1 to 3 PM.





Lunch will also be served for all those helping decorating and preparing the church for Christmas. We always look forward to this Sunday event each year beautifying the church for our Christmas services.

The vestry would like to thank the Flower Guild, Altar Guild and the Usher's who volunteer so much of their time during this busy time of year. Rector's Report - Father Hartt

Father Hartt began by expressing his thankfulness to the parish for its response thus far to the Stewardship Drive. Many pledge cards have come in and many have increased their level of giving. George Scala's letter to the parish helped us all to understand our financial realities. Simply put, the endowment is not sufficient to meet our expenses at our present level of giving. The parish has responded with increased commitment as they have grasped afresh our need and circumstances.

The Interior Restoration has been moving along nicely. With each new brush of paint, we see the beauty to come. The project is well advanced at this point. Christmas Eve Services will showcase the substantial work thus far. Parish giving has once more been generous. Phase One has been fully funded and Phase Two funding has begun to build. Phase One addresses cleaning, repairs, and painting. Phase Two will be the stonework in the church.

The Choir's performance of the Messiah was stellar. It was one of the best performances in memory. Attendance was good. The choir party following at the Rectory was a wonderful time of celebration. Fr. Hartt thanked Janice and Jimmy Chenot for all of their work in making the party come together nicely.

Last Sunday was our Christmas Pageant. Attendance was very good and the children were a delight. We thank Laura Rulison for her capable directing. Father Hartt has requested email addresses of parents from Laura. He would like to send out notices from time to time.

The Women's Shelter has begun. Mother Sue has done much to organize volunteers and arrange for the assembly of the Blessing Bags. Several parish members helped put the bags together last Sunday. Siena College students will be providing Christmas gifts as in the past.

Father Hartt commended the parish for its outreach to the Burmese refugee families at Christmas. The giving tree has only two items left! Outreach at Christmas time has always been a strength of the parish. Likewise, our gift to the food bank at Thanksgiving was abundant again this year,

Father Hartt said that the ALPHA Program will be having its concluding session tomorrow. He looks forward to running the program again with the Downtown community in mind. Bishop Love has asked that Fr. Hartt present his experience with Alpha at the Parish Leadership Conference in January.

Father Hartt reviewed the Advent and Christmas schedule. He looks forward to Lessons and Carols this Sunday.

At this time, there is no new development in the response of the Presiding Bishop to Bishop Love's letter.

Sacred Spaces will be touring St. Peter's on the 18th of December. Connie Powell will be leading the tour.

Fr. Hartt thanked Jimmy Chenot for arranging for the furnace to be fixed at the rectory.

Father Hartt wished us all a blessed Christmas.

Finance – G. Scala - Treasurer's Report

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for November. Offerings for November were \$11,964. YTD offerings through November were \$175,617. This compares to a budgeted number of \$254,192. YTD Offerings through the same period in 2017 were \$207,043.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for November. Merrill Lynch had a return of +1.02% for the month and is at a +0.58% return YTD. The Key accounts showed a monthly return of +1.12% and is at -0.89% YTD. This leaves us with a negative variance in this area YTD of (\$163,443). Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through November were \$7,899 under budget.

Pledges for 2018 remain at 42 pledging units for a total amount of \$119,720. Contributions and pledges for the Restoration Project are very favorable. Total contributions received are \$211,564 with many pledges to be received. 2019 pledges are starting to come in and George reported optimism in what has been received to date versus previous years.

Property –

The leak in the church roof was repaired and there is a plan in place for the future to prevent more leaks in the roof. The archives are going to be getting new gutters that will prevent future leaking here as well. The greens are ordered and on the way for Hanging of the Greens.

Outreach – Mother Sue

Many thanks to those who donated items for the Blessing Bags for the women who stay in the Overflow Homeless Shelter this year. The Daughters assembled **85 Blessing Bags** on Sunday, December 9th.

Christmas giving for the Burmese refugee families is currently underway. We thank everyone for their generosity. For those who took gift tags, please return the wrapped item by December 16th.

On December 3rd our Overflow Homeless Shelter opened for its 10th year, housing up to eight women nightly through March. Mary Malone (from Capital City Rescue Mission) is the Director again this year.

There is a new schedule process for volunteers through the Capital City Rescue Mission website. We thank Siena College for providing Christmas gifts for the women this year.

Old Business-

The Parish Choice Elections for 2019 were discussed and agreed upon. Of the 15% of revenue that needs to be allocated, 10% will go to The Episcopal Church and 5% to Diocesan Initiatives. This was approved on a motion by G. Scala and seconded by J. Chenot then unanimously approved by the vestry.

New Business-

The annual meeting and elections were discussed. N. Creagan will be running for her 2nd 3-year term. She is running to fill her present seat.

J. Russom will be running for his 1st 3-year term. He is running to fill the spot formerly held by K. Cehowski who has stepped down and will not be running for a 2nd term.

M. Lundberg will be running for his 1st 3-year term. He is running to fill the spot formerly held by M. Holden who has completed her 2nd

J. Chenot will be running for his 1st 2-year term as Jr. Warden. This past year he was elected by the vestry to finish out the Jr. Warden term vacated by D. Spath when she was elected to Sr. Warden, so this leaves the Jr. Warden spot open for election this year.

Associate Rector's Report – Mother Sue

The Book and Bible Study on Matthew 6:9-13 The Lord's Prayer and Abba by Evelyn Underhill went very well, completing on December

Daughters of the King continue to gather monthly on the 2nd Sunday of each month. We have been working through the DOK Spiritual Formation Bible study together, recently finishing chapter 5. We welcome new women to our order to attend the Discernment classes in the New Year.

We thank the Daughters for assembling the Blessing Bags for the women of our Overflow Homeless Shelter.

The Diocese has asked me to supply at Church of the Redeemer, Rensselaer on Sunday December 23rd.
