### From the Rector

### The Nest

It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is larger than all the garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches. (Matthew 13:32.)

The smoketree outside of our kitchen window is a favorite with the birds. In fact, we can always count on getting a nest. From my novice eye, the reason for the tree's popularity is the great multitude of branches. These branches are intricately woven and abundantly leafed. Clearly, the combination provides a good measure of protection for nesting. A bonus for us is that we get a good view of the process of nest building. This task falls on the male. The reward for a good product is a good mate.

The life of a church is a bit like building a nest. We do our best to make an attractive home and hope to attract a mate. Our recent interior restoration project has a bit of that quality. Already, we are being rewarded. Our work is truly being noticed by visitors. They are quite taken by what has been accomplished. We tell them of the blessing of a paint expert who sampled down to the original color. They can see that great care has been taken with every step. It is stunning how the original paint color has tied the other colors in the church together. They really notice. Even after many months, I am still taken by it all. Our faithful restoration project is important work to the glory of God.

There is no question that the project was desperately needed. One parishioner remarked a few years back that we were "beyond shabby chic." No more. I am grateful for the generosity of so many. We are certainly very far from shabby now! We still have some work to do, but the beauty has already arrived. We look forward to the finishing touches this year. But now back to nest building.

I found myself pondering the role that this work plays in the bigger project of building a church nest. We hope our visitors will choose to make our nest their home. But what truly causes them to choose us as a mate? I think that is an important question.

One thing that I have noticed through the years with our smoketree is how some of the best nests are built by seemingly unimpressive birds. Often they are smaller than usual and a bit rough around the edges. But these birds work extra hard and get impressive mates. They are judged not by their appearance, but by their workmanship. A pretty nest catches the eye to be sure, but the nest itself must be trustworthy and structurally sound. Offspring are precious. Souls are precious. Nests have important work to accomplish. Our project now is how to take the transcendent experience of our sanctuary as the promise that yet more will be revealed to those who pass through our doors.

Choosing to nest in a church is a big decision. The quality of our liturgy, our music program, and our church's beauty are a powerful combination. They do welcome visitors with great power each Sunday. We are not careless with the gifts of God. We appreciate what we have been given by those who have gone before and give right now. But as Jesus says, the purpose of the nest is new growth for the Kingdom of God. It is to hatch and to raise. It is to draw souls to the Living Lord who beckons all to find rest for their souls and to grow as Christians. What makes a nest is the love that goes into it, the devotion, the prayers, and the insistence on doing our best. We then trust God to bring us a good mate. No matter what kind of bird you imagine yourself to be, fancy or seemingly ordinary, God is calling you to build our nest. It is the heart given for others that matters. I give thanks for you all and look forward to building together this coming year. Twig by twig, act by act!

### From the Associate Rector

### Ch...ch...ch...changes

This summer felt like the summer of change as we ventured into combined worship with our dear Cathedralites while their sanctuary was closed due to a floor replacement project. Each week, subtle nuances of our liturgy and customs were re-discovered and re-examined. As Cathedralites, lay and clergy alike, arrived to take part in our service, intentional thought and conversation took place about our practices and habits. I even heard from some St. Peter's parishioners as they experienced church a "wee bit different" these past summer weeks. And although I didn't hear from many of them, I'm sure the Cathedralite worshippers experienced the most profound changes of all.

Regardless of our close adherence to the Book of Common Prayer and its rubrics, each worshipping community has their own set of "rubrics" and practices that govern their liturgy. We move through these seamlessly and effortlessly as a congregation accepting it's "how it's always done" without much question or discomfort. Yet, an experience such as this summer points out to us that others who walk through our doors aren't familiar with "how it's always done" and may have experiences here at St. Peter's that differ greatly from what they are used to and even what they are comfortable with. Perhaps you traveled this summer and worshipped elsewhere, experiencing similar changes in the liturgy or customs of worship? Can you remember how that felt? Can you use that experience to be empathetic to our visitors?

All of this brings to my mind the Practice of Hospitality. How can we, as a worshipping community, practice gracious hospitality to those who visit us either once, or for the summer, or as potential members of St. Peter's? How can we remember that those who visit us may have a different worship experience than we have and that ours may be one full of changes, discomfort and unknown practices for them rather than our experiencing "how it's always done"?

We've grown so much in the area of hospitality already. Decades ago, we used to be known as a more closed-off community – even an unwelcoming church. Today that is not the case. I see you warmly greet others welcoming them to our gracious space. I see you shake hands with visitors at the Peace and invite them into Coffee Hour after worship. I see you gain names and phone numbers for the clergy so that we can follow-up with visitors. All these practices are pertinent. And yet, is there more we could or should be doing to show gracious hospitality?

What if we look at our own practices and customs through the eyes of a visitor? What about our service is easy to follow? What about it may be difficult for others? Should we offer more helps to newcomers? What would those look like? Perhaps we should even have volunteers who would be willing to sit with visitors and help guide them through our worship service? How can we help visitors navigate our liturgy and our buildings and grounds not to mention feel ready to become full members of our church family?

These are just a few questions we might ask ourselves as we expand our thoughts on hospitality. Changes might even be necessary for us to grow our church and attract and retain visitors. What are your thoughts? Your clergy and Vestry are eager to hear them. In the meantime, I'm eager for September to begin and the return of folks from summer vacation so that we can get back to worshipping together "how it's always done"!



### Saint of the Month Club



THE NATIVITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, SEPTEMBER 8th.

The gospels tell us little about the family and home of our Lord's mother. She is thought to have been of Davidic descent and to have been brought up in a devout Jewish family that cherished the hope of Israel for the coming kingdom of God, in remembrance of the promise to Abraham and the forefathers. In the second century, a devout Christian sought to supply a fuller account of Mary's birth and family, to satisfy the interest and curiosity of believers. An apocryphal gospel, known as the Protevangelium of James or The Nativity of Mary, appeared. It included legendary stories of Mary's parents Joachim and Anne. These stories were built out of Old Testament narratives of the births of Isaac and of Samuel (whose mother's name, Hannah, is the original form of Anne), and from traditions of the birth of John the Baptist. In these stories, Joachim and Anne—the childless, elderly couple who grieved that they would have no posterity—were rewarded with the birth of a girl, whom they dedicated in infancy to the service of God under the tutelage of the temple priests. Many provinces of the Anglican Communion celebrate September 8th rather than August 15th as their primary Marian feast. Although we do not know the truth of Mary's parentage or birth, we nevertheless rejoice for those who brought her into this world, and who raised her in such a way that even as a young woman she was able to give a courageous "yes" in response to her call from God.

Amen.






### FRIDAY NOONTIME ORGAN CONCERTS

### St. Peter's Receives Challenge Grant

St. Peter's Church has received a \$10,000 grant from the Bender Family Foundation. The application for the grant, which was submitted by the Restoration Committee, stated that the money would be used as a Challenge Grant to raise additional funds toward the completion of Phase 2 of the restoration (cleaning the stone columns). Due to the generous response of the congregation to this type of grant in the past, the Restoration Committee is hopeful that we might also raise funds which would be sufficient to complete the first part of Phase 3 of the restoration. The first part of Phase 3 would be the painting of the plaster arches between the columns. Completion of that painting would be the last element in visually restoring the sanctuary to its appearance as it was when it first opened in 1859. A campaign will be launched in the early fall to solicit contributions to meet the challenge.
