From the Rector

Advent and the Pharisee & Tax Collector

Our minds are naturally moving towards Thanksgiving. With the kids safely back to school or college, we can finally focus our attention on sorting out travel plans or how Thanksgiving will happen at our place this year. There are many details and expectations are high. It is a joyful but also anxious time of year. We want to get it right. Then Christmas appears on the horizon. Black Friday shopping and the preparations for Christmas lay claim before we can even catch our breath.

Into this odd combination of joy and frenzy comes Advent. I know that it is likely the last thing on anyone's mind right now, but Advent is coming. December 1st is the First Sunday of Advent. Your clergy will soon be encouraging you "to keep a holy Advent." Faithful souls quite rightly wonder, "What does that really mean anyway? How on earth with all the demands and details can we get to that elusive holy state?" Believe me, I struggle as well.

One Advent admonition that we typically hear at church is to slow down and truly prepare our hearts to receive the Christ Child. It is good counsel, but can also feel a little unrealistic. We are distracted. We are being pushed and pulled in a thousand directions. Yet Jesus appears then and now to a distracted world. In fact, many of Jesus' parables concern that very thing. The Kingdom of God has come, but will the invited guests show up? There is treasure buried in a field, but will we sell everything to get that field? Countless parables concern claiming the Kingdom moment. Like Martha and Mary, we are called to choose the better part.

I recall that a seminary friend would talk of John the Baptist crashing all our Christmas parties. "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness" is in fact about our wilderness. The wilderness of distraction and lesser things. The wilderness that we must walk through to get to Bethlehem "and see this thing that has taken place," as the shepherds say (Luke 2:15). It is precisely "this thing" that is to claim our attention!

I acknowledge that there is not an easy answer or quick fix to our wilderness. It is about seeing things differently. It is about not allowing the "holiday season" to take charge of our souls. Home devotions around the Advent wreath help a great deal. It is a joy and profoundly meaningful to light those candles, say the prayers, and read the brief passage of Scripture appointed with the family. The Advent daily devotionals by C.S. Lewis or Henri Nouwen in the back of the church help many. Lessons and Carols and Handel's Messiah can be counted on to lift us towards heaven. Being at the Advent Services is the most urgent. In a word, we keep a holy Advent by being around the holy. The holy time of church. The holy of a believing family around the Advent Wreath. We will soon find ourselves in holy wonder at "this thing that has taken place." We saturate ourselves with the things of God.

And this also means to have mercy on ourselves. We were given a great pre-Advent gift this year in the form of Jesus' Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. It is a parable in which Jesus tells us of two men in the Temple. The Pharisee is giving thanks to God that he is not like other men. He is good and righteous. He goes on to list his many virtues to the Lord. Far behind him stands the tax collector. He is despised by the people and considered a traitor to the Romans. It is a shady business. The tax collector knows it. He knows that he has no virtues to recount to the Lord. He stands far off beating his breast. "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" Jesus says that it is the tax collector, not the Pharisee who stood right with God. No point in doing the Advent devotions with the heart of a Pharisee. We get to Bethlehem the tax collector way.

When we think about the shepherds on bended knee before the manger, we sense a combination of holy wonder and humility. There is no presumption of any kind. The Child is pure gift. Even to be in His presence is to be healed. We can't even imagine being the Pharisee before Him, going on and on about our supposed virtues. We are humbled and right-sized. We feel "let all mortal flesh keep silence."

Might it be that keeping a holy Advent is the intersection of the tax collector and the shepherds? It would be the truth of our unworthiness and the holy wonder that God is about to give us a whole new standing. Could that tax collector even imagine God's verdict of acquittal or the Pharisee that all his supposed virtues are a dirty rag? Well, a holy Advent seems to be about the wonder of the free gift of salvation with the acknowledgment that we sure understand we need it!

The wondrous vision before the manger gathers it all together.

Spiritual Planning versus Experiencing...

I'm thinking a lot about planning this time of the year. Yes, at church, we are already busy planning Advent and Christmas celebrations! As one who works for the church, as well as one who worships in the church, I always have one foot in the present and the other in the future. In fact, one of the most challenging things to learn, after ordination, was how to be fully present in two spiritual places at once! How does one write a Christmas sermon during penitential Advent, or finish an Easter sermon during Holy Week?

I believe that many of you can relate as well as there are probably many areas of your lives that you experience similar things. And I know that most all of you will also be planning for the Christmas season, be it through shopping, decorating, baking or other endless tasks and activities, all while trying to fully experience Advent spiritual thoughts in Church.

And so, I think it's prudent for us to reflect on spiritual planning versus spiritual experiencing. Recently, I spent time meeting with a young lady who is preparing to receive Holy Communion for the first time. During preparation, we naturally spent time speaking about the Lord's Prayer. One thing I asked of her and her family, was to pray the Lord's Prayer once daily, so that memorization of it would come more easily for her. I was amazed that just after one week she had 90% of it committed to memory already! This is spiritual planning for certain...

Spiritual experiencing is another thing but one that often intersects with spiritual planning. I share the following story with many of our confirmands to teach this very thing: Often I visit individuals in the nursing home during the end season of their lives. Sometimes, their memory has started to fail them. Sometimes, the deterioration is so great that it is hard or near impossible for them to connect with the present at all. These pastoral visits are challenging as I try to make a pastoral connection with the individual. What I have found works the best is connecting with them on a "planned" aspect of their spiritual life. I often use the Lord's Prayer. During our confused conversation, I often tell them I'm going to start praying and welcome them to join me as they are able. Then, I begin praying The Lord's Prayer slowly and deliberately. Every time, without fail, the confusion has stopped and the individual joins me in praying that holy prayer together. Every time this happens without fail! What a profound spiritual experience this is for both of us.

I believe this demonstrates how good spiritual planning can support a good spiritual experience. Time spent as a youth memorizing The Lord's Prayer means that even in old age, when one's reason may not connect with the present, one's soul can through joining in Holy Prayer with another person.

And so good spiritual planning often leads us to good spiritual experiences when we are at our weakest. In similar fashion, it is during a crisis when all else fails us, that we need a strong spiritual foundation to lean on. For example, I've been at the bedside of a dying person and witnessed how reciting Psalm 23 brought the greatest comfort to them and their loved ones.

And so, this is why we nurture our youth, and ourselves, with worship week after week; memorizing the order of service from the Book of Common Prayer; learning and repeating The Lord's Prayer over and over again; praying and claiming the promises found in Psalm 23; softly singing Amazing Grace; quietly basking in our practice of Confession and Absolution. Spiritual planning leads to a strong spiritual experience throughout one's lifetime.

Please remember this as so many other areas of your life beckon to you. I know many of us are torn with fractured schedules and over-committed lives. But many things that call to us are earthly things... things that are passing away; while spiritual and everlasting things wait in the background. Invest in those everlasting blessings by nurturing them and prioritizing them. Spiritual planning leads to strong spiritual experiences. It's often one's choice and commitment that makes the difference.

Blessings to you for a Blessed season of Advent – our great planning and preparation for the coming of Jesus Christ into the world!

Blessing Bag Donations



Composer of the Month Club

Although known by many merely as "the wife of Robert Schumann," Clara Schumann, nee Wieck, had an extensive and successful musical career of her own.

- She was one of the most famous Romantic composers and concert pianists.
- Born to musical family in Liepzig, Germany; taught by her father.
- First performance at age 8. Began writing music at age 12.
- Married Robert Schumann, a piano student of her father, against her father's wishes. Had to sue her father to get permission to marry.
- First to play concerts from memory.
- Revolutionized the piano concert, showcasing contemporary composers.
- Suffered great tragedies. Pre-deceased by four of her children.
- Her husband attempted suicide, after only 14 years of marriage, and was committed to a mental institution for the last years of his life.
- Supported the family and her eight children through teaching and an international concert career of 61 years.
- Composed works for piano, voice, orchestra, string quartet, and a few organ works.

In her own words: "Why hurry over beautiful things. Why not linger and enjoy them."

Saint of the Month Club

ALL SOULS/ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED, NOVEMBER 2nd

In the New Testament, the word "saints" is used to describe the entire membership of the Christian community, and in the Collect for All Saints' Day the word "elect" is used in a similar sense. From very early times, however, the word "saint" came to be applied primarily to persons of heroic sanctity, whose deeds were recalled with gratitude by later generations. Beginning in the tenth century, it became customary to set aside another day on which the church remembered that vast body of the faithful who, though no less members of the company of the redeemed, are unknown in the wider fellowship of the church. It was also a day for particular remembrance of family members and friends. Though the observance of the day was abolished at the Reformation because of abuses connected with masses for the dead, a renewed understanding of its meaning has led to a widespread acceptance of this commemoration among Anglicans, and to its inclusion as an optional observance in the calendar of the Episcopal Church.

Collect:

O God, the Maker and Redeemer of all believers: Grant to the faithful departed the unsearchable benefits of the passion of thy Son; that on the day of his appearing they may be manifested as thy children; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, now and for ever. Amen

Our financial portfolios at Merrill Lynch and Key again have held up very well during the summer months as the stock market continues to move in a positive direction. Thank you, George Scala for all your time and work with the investments and reports you generate each month for the vestry and congregation. The information compiled is so important to all of us as well as useful as we

look ahead at stewardship and begin planning for next year's budget.

The interior restoration project was a large success based on the amount we were able to raise for the first phase. The positive feedback from many in the parish and others visiting since the restoration has been incredible. Now that the first phase has been completed we are hopefully moving ahead with the second phase early after the Christmas season, so we may have that phase completed by Easter. A letter to the parishioner's will be going out in the next week or so with our intentions to where we are financially to be able move forward with this phase. Again, we would like to thank all those who have already contributed to the restoration project; the positive complements on the work already completed has been endless.

Each year we continue to look for those interested in volunteering on committees such as the Flower, Altar, and Usher guilds. We look forward in seeing new members as well as those who may think they might be interested to inquire about these important ministries that are vital to our church life. St. Peters' is very fortunate to have many dedicated members who volunteer a considerable amount of time to these committees and we would like to thank them for their continued support and commitment to all these important missions within the church life. Rector's Report - Father Hartt

Fr. Hartt began by thanking the Wardens, Treasurers, Fred Hersey, and Maria Holden, for meeting last week to plan Phase Two of the Interior Restoration Project. Fred's hard work was rewarded with a Bender Grant and the Restoration Committee has written a fine letter to the parish for our review this evening. The \$10,000 Bender Grant is a matching funds grant. The bulk of Phase Two involves stonework and a little additional painting in the archways. We continue to get approving remarks from visitors. There has been a pronounced uptick in these comments since the painting.

Father Hartt rejoiced to hear news of the mountain of backpacks which were donated with school supplies for our parish outreach. The blessing of the backpacks has become not only an important outreach, but a wonderful start of the Sunday School year. Our children come wearing their own backpacks and to have them blessed as they begin their school year. Mrs. Donna Ohlman received an award from the Sunday School for her gift of a hand-made Altar linen for Children's Chapel. Sunday was festive indeed.

As previously reported, Fr. Hartt has been appointed as Chair of the Diocesan Deacon School. It is a three-year course of study. There is a good bit to do with the start of the Deacon's School each year. Fr. Hartt was away this past Sunday for an ordination retreat. He was asked so give a talk on ministry to those now in the ordination process. On Saturday of this week, Fr. Hartt has been asked to be the guest preacher at the Bi-centennial celebration of the founding of St. John's, Delhi. Four past rectors and the Bishop

will be in attendance.

November 16th will be our Pre-Thanksgiving Dinner. December 8th will be the Messiah and choir party at the Rectory.

With their new floor laid, the Cathedralites have returned to the Cathedral. Our last Sunday together was over Labor Day Weekend. Father Hartt wished to commend the parish for its faithful hospitality. There was a heavier load carried over the summer for our Guilds, but they were of good cheer about it all. A special thanks to the Altar Guild and Cathy Schunk for extra duty. The entire experience of having the Cathedral with us was profoundly life-giving. This summer could not have done more to make us see that we are one. We truly blessed one another spiritually by our separate traditions and ways. Dean Harding and Fr. Hartt plan to work on a shared Evensong in the coming year. Fr. Hartt also reminded us that we are invited to the Cathedral's celebratory "return" picnic this Sunday.

It has been a busy summer in many ways, especially pastorally. Mtr. Sue had an especially busy July while Fr. Hartt was on vacation in Florida. Fr. Hartt encouraged the Vestry to keep the clergy informed of pastoral needs as they come to know of such concerns in the parish.

St. Peter's will be having its Parish Picnic on September 22nd. Fr. Hartt thanked Jim Chenot for putting a team together. The following Sunday, we will begin our fall Alpha. Last year, there were several requests for Alpha to be held Sunday morning following church. This will provide a convenient opportunity to experience the Alpha program. Fr. Hartt hopes that participants will consider inviting others outside of the parish.

Fr. Hartt had a wedding last Saturday. Laura Hickey and Michael Barton were married. Two more weddings are planned this year. Ashley Spath and Dan Closson, Jimmy Troiano and Mtr. Sue Waldron. We look forward to the festivities and rejoice for these

<u>Finance</u> – G. Scala - Treasurer's Report

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for June, July and August. Offerings YTD through August were \$138,049. This compares to a budgeted number of \$151,767. YTD Offerings through the same period in 2018 were \$131,441.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains over the summer. Merrill Lynch shows a YTD return of 15.13%. The Key accounts show a YTD positive YTD return of 13.77%. This leaves us with a positive variance in this area YTD of \$378,313. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD through August were \$3,172 over budget.

Pledges for 2019 remain at 49 pledging units for a total amount of \$126,154.

There was much discussion concerning stewardship and budget which will be discussed at the October meeting. Electronic on-line pledging is in place as well as giving and we are going to strive to be able to better communicate electronically with the congregation by soliciting email addresses, cell phone numbers for texting as well as communication preferences.

Property -

The leak in the rectory roof was fixed. We will be looking to now repair the interior spots where the leak was. The vestry room has received a facelift which includes painting, repair of the windows, and the addition of some window dressings. Thank you to Ruth, Deb Spath and Ian for your help in making the room look great. Another project we will begin is cleaning up and doing some repairs in the garden.
