From the Rector

(Ash Wednesday homily)



Perhaps the best Ash Wednesday sermon in my memory was one that talked about "drifting". "We drift" said the preacher. We lose our tether and our bearings in the things of God. To be too much of the world is "to drift." It is also very much the story of our times.

If we were to try to put our finger on it, we might first say that we are drifting as never before. We have a cultural problem with truth, especially religious truth. We are told in myriad ways not to be certain about much of anything. This isn't really about humility, but license. We don't want to be tethered down. We want to drift. If Lent is about one thing, it is to catch ourselves in the act -- the act of drifting from God. It is the act of drifting into the temporal over the eternal. It is the drifting into what is passing away and cannot give us life. It is the drifting that simply doesn't care.

We may also notice how we are never really "ready" for Lent. It seems to come out of nowhere. I wonder if that was always the case. Perhaps when life seemed more precarious, we were more receptive to Lent's call and Lent's truth. There was a time when life had harder edges. Softness and drift go together. Soft it is these days, or seems to be, for most of us. Still we complain. We have complaint down to a science. We drift into grumbling.

I can't remember when it was that I started to notice that the world I lived in and that of my Grandparents were not the same world. I don't mean the so-called "generation gap." I mean the tethered-ness of their spirit versus my own. They were largely unafflicted with "driftiness." Things were what they were. They did not wonder about what ought not to be wondered about. They knew what sin was and wasn't. Perhaps they were not always right, but they weren't constitutionally struggling with drift itself, life as it is, God as He is.

But there is Good News. Jesus came for the drifters. Drifters of all kinds. Those who were drifting away from religion and equally those who were drifting within religion, and mostly those who were drifting from the Kingdom of His Father. Jesus said, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:15.) And it is Good News. Good News for drifters of all kinds. If we've been drifting, the Good Shepherd is looking for us -- right now. He is looking for the lost and knows all the kinds of places sheep get into. Speaking of His sheep, Jesus says: "I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand." (John 10:28.) We must believe this. Jesus as our Good Shepherd is not only Biblical, it is the truth of what we need. Indeed, in the deepest part of us, what we want.

We often conceptualize Lent as a kind of battlefield. A battlefield of temptation. But it seems to me that Lent is more about confessing being adrift and reaching out to the One who can tether us again. Much like Peter going down in the sea, the hand of Jesus is outstretched, saying, "O ye of little faith, why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14:31.) Why indeed!

Lent. The thing about the Christian religion is that it knows what's up. Really knows, because it knows Jesus who alone knows what's up. With you, with me. So I join you as a fellow drifter. The mark of the drifter upon my and your forehead. "Remember that thou art dust and unto dust shalt thou return." Remember that your and my drifting has an expiration date and the time is now. "Repent and believe the Good News." Yes! "For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost." (Matthew 18: 11.)

Life is better in the flock. We know it. Lent seeks rest for our souls. I pray for us all a most holy Lent. Amen.

From the Associate Rector

The Minister invites the people to the observance of a holy Lent, saying...

"... I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

This "invitation" by the church is a profound one. In the quote above, several acts of piety are mentioned. Many people take this invitation as an individual one. Yes, each individual needs to choose their response. And yet, there is also a corporate quality to both the invitation and a holy response.

Coming together collectively in acts of public devotion and piety anchor us to the Christian call of community. We acknowledge the need of one another and the connectedness to one another. For example, we know that all sin, and therefore, all forgiveness, is truly a corporate act. I say this because sin has a ripple effect, going farther than the immediate parties involved. Forgiveness does as well - blessing farther than the immediate parties.

Just as we partake of the sacramental life together, we enter a Holy Lent together promising to uphold and support one another in this Holy walk. We also remember these words included in the Invitation to Lent: "the whole congregation is put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith."

In our Litany of Penitence on Ash Wednesday, each line begins with We, not I. Likewise, each response includes "have mercy on us, Lord". We have this invitation and opportunity to journey together, supporting and upholding one another. We lend strength to others as needed, and we lean on them when we are weak and in need of support. The corporate Christian walk is a beautiful blessing indeed.

Likewise, public acts of piety, done with godly intent and with true humility, are valuable and honorable to the wider community as they remind the world around us of God and point to His call and His promise. For example, ashes on our foreheads announces that Ash Wednesday is no ordinary Wednesday, but a Holy Day of fasting and repentance anchored in God's promise of Salvation. Church bells ringing remind people of the call to prayer. Yes, many of our corporate actions share our faith with the wider community.

And so, should we share, also, the Call to a Holy Lent? Yes! Like everything else in our faith, it is not ours alone, but is for us to answer and share with the world. How might you do this? Well, perhaps forgiveness begins close to home. Is there someone who has hurt you? You might initiate reconciliation with them, assuring them you have forgiven them. Or perhaps it is you who seeks forgiveness? Approach the person and tell them it is your heart's desire to mend things. Explain to them why and what Lent means to you.

Another way would be to invite someone to church during Lent. Especially for a lapsed Christian, Lent can be a very meaningful time to reconnect with one's faith. You can offer to drive them and perhaps have coffee or eat a meal afterwards so they can tell you about their experience.

You may also choose to fast during Lent. Remember that fasting often includes both doing without but also offering the surplus from your fast to others. So, we self-deny and then provide for others. What can you fast from that can benefit others? Who will you choose to bless? What can you tell them about why you are doing this?

Finally, enriching one's daily life with Holy Scripture is always a blessing but certainly a special part of the call to Lent. Perhaps you can read the Bible at dinner time with your family? Or, maybe you can read it in the lunchroom at work and be open to including a co-worker or even read the Bible on the bus during your morning commute? Public reading of Holy Scripture can open doors to sharing the hope of the Gospel with others.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent. It is not only the church ministers that can extend that invitation. I hope each of you will spread the invitation as well. I'm excited about journeying with you as we learn and share about God's promise and hope for all.


Lay Eucharistic Ministers

Our Heritage

From the Archives

Part III - Growth of the Episcopal Church in Albany

The period of the Revolutionary War (1775-1783) saw a serious decline in the Anglican church throughout America. During the war parishes lost their financial support (i.e. from the Society for the Propagation of the Bible), buildings and property were destroyed or lost and clergy and parishioners fled. It wasn't until after the revolution on December 25th 1787 that Saint Peter's Church in Albany led by Reverend Thomas Ellison celebrated its first service of Holy Communion.

Before the American Revolution there were no Anglican bishops in the colonies. They were not allowed by the British nor wanted by the colonists. But it was after the Revolutionary War that the establishment of an American episcopate took place. The first American to be consecrated as bishop in America was Samuel Seabury



Connecticut. Since there were no bishops in America to consecrate him he had to be consecrated in Europe. He was consecrated in Aberdeen, Scotland on November 14th 1784. In 1787 William White of Pennsylvania and Samuel Provoost of New York were elected to bishoprics in Pennsylvania and New York respectively. Both of the latter were consecrated in England. William White was largely responsible for the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

After the revolution the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) had to be revised, especially to remove the words "God save the King" referring to the King of England to whom the American people no longer paid homage. The new BCP was revised at the General Convention of 1789 and issued August of 1790 by Hall & Sellers of Philadelphia. General use was to begin on the first of October 1790. Thus, it was on October 3rd of 1790 at Saint Peter's Church, that a service was held officiated by Reverend Thomas Ellison in which Holy Communion was administered to 36 parishioners and the new liturgy of the American Church was first used.

On September 11th, 1791 Samuel Provoost, the newly consecrated bishop of the Diocese of New York sailed up the Hudson River to make his primary visit to St. Peter's Church. He preached and then confirmed 147 persons. His visit excited much interest among the parishioners in Albany.

Because of the growth of St. Peter's parish, on January 26th 1802 a contract was signed between the Rector of St. Peter's Church and inhabitants of the City of Albany for the building of the Second Edifice of St. Peter's Church. This building would serve the parishioners until 1869 when a Third Edifice of the church would be completed. The Third Edifice was a handsome structure built by the famous architect Richard Upjohn.

It was also in 1869 that the rector of St. Peter's Church was selected and consecrated as the first bishop of the newly formed Diocese of Albany. This rector's name was William Croswell Doane. Doane's concept of the newly formed diocese was as a Cathedral Complex with schools and houses of mercy of every kind. St. Agnes School for Girls was founded by Bishop Doane on September 1870. The Cathedral General Chapter consisting of clergy and lay governance was instituted in 1875. The architect selected from a competition for the Cathedral of All Saints was Robert William Gibson. The cornerstone for the Cathedral was laid on June 3rd 1884. The building though unfinished was consecrated on November 20, 1888. (See picture above). The Cathedral was to be the seat of governance of the Albany Diocese, and the home of its bishop.

In the late 1800s St. Peter's Church under its rector Reverend Walton W. Battershall grew with many additions including beautiful stained glass windows mostly designed in Europe by such designers as Henry Holiday and Burne-Jones. Even into the 1900s St. Peter's was the church of the statesmen and governors at the State Capitol.

Other Episcopal parishes were also founded in Albany during this period including: St. Stephens which was founded in 1909 in Delmar and which began in an unused blacksmith shop and St. Andrews which was founded in 1832 at the home of Jacob Ludwig. It was moved to North Main and Madison Streets in Albany. St. Andrews is the home of many stained glass windows including a remarkable one depicting Bishop Doane, the Cathedral founder, in his British style shovel hat and gaiters with his faithful dog Cluny. (See a picture below of Bishop Doane and Cluny).

Thus, from the early Indian forts and simple church buildings and a few clergy, the Protestant Episcopal Church grew in Albany into the church organization we know today.



Many thanks to those who have committed to this second phase to this ongoing interior restoration campaign with additional contributions. The commitment and enthusiasm to the campaign has been incredible, and hope others that may not have contributed yet, know they still have the opportunity to contribute to this beatification of St. Peter's church and will help us to plan moving forward with the third and last phase later in the year.

Our annual meeting will be on the last Sunday of this month, January 26th after the 10:30 service. Vestry nominations have been posted – James Chenot will be running for his 1st two year term as Sr. Warden. Christie Gordon and George Scala will be running for their 2nd three year term and Fred Hershey will be running for this first three year term on the vestry. Rector's Report - Father Hartt

Father Hartt began by thanking Deb Spath for her excellent service to the parish as Sr. warden. Debbie has offered much wisdom and administrative ability to the position. Deb has decided to step down at this time and the Vestry has nominated Jim Chenot to his former seat as Sr. Warden. Jimmy has served us faithfully in both roles through the years. Deb has agreed to fill out Jimmy's term, should he be elected as Sr. Warden, and run for Jr. Warden at the next Annual Meeting. We thank Deb Spath for her good work and am delighted that she will continue to serve.

Things have been busy indeed since our last Vestry Meeting. We had a glorious Christmas and beginning of Epiphany. There were two weddings following Christmas on the 27th and 29th. Both reflected the best of St. Peter's, as many parish hands went into the services out of profound love for the couples involved. Mtr. Sue and Jimmy Troiano and Dan Closson and Ashley Spath made good use of the wonderful greens and Christmas decorations in the church. A glorious parish reception followed Mtr. Sue and Jimmy's wedding. Fr. Hartt thanked all for putting it together, especially Fred Hersey, Deb Spath, Jeffrey Hart, Nancy Cregan, and Donna Ohlman. Donna made a wonderful cake. Bishop love was present and provided the nuptial blessing for Sue+ and Jimmy. Fr. Hartt also thanked Janice Chenot for all of her work on the booklets for Ashley and Dan's wedding.

Fr. Hartt wished to thank the Choir and Mr. Keen as well for the spectacular music in the Advent and Christmas seasons. It appears that the choir is miraculously getting ever better and better. We gratefully receive and are blessed.

Sadly, things have been busy in other ways. Since last Tuesday and through this coming Saturday, there will be five funerals/ committals in the parish. Dr. James Castleman, Jack Avakian, Margaret Chaloner, Roberta Cripps, and Rena Edwards. Our hearts and prayers go out to the grieving families.

Father Hartt expressed concern about church this Sunday. It is reported that a major snow storm will take place on Saturday through Sunday. Fr. Hartt has been in touch with the speaker from Food for the Poor. It is unclear what decision will be made about his presence as of tonight. We will need to reach out in our various ways should we need to cancel Services.

The Strategic Growth Committee has been hard at work on a parish survey. We will discuss tonight the plans for its dissemination. The work of the Committee will be highlighted at the Annual Meeting.

With the completion of Alpha for 2019, Fr. Hartt will be offering a follow-up course on St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians. It is clear that Sunday morning is the preferred time. We may be looking at Sunday morning offerings as a basic pattern for Fr. Hartt's study groups.

Fr. Hartt has been asked to be a presenter at the upcoming Parish Leadership Conference. Fr. Hartt will be co-presenting with others who have made use of the newer Alpha materials. The PLC's will be taking place at three locations, Oneonta,, Greenwich and Malone in the North Country.

Fr. Hartt reported that all relevant staff have now received the trainings required for Godly boundaries/Safe Church and NYS Anti-Harassment. Fr. Gorchov came to complete the Sunday School staff trainings.

Fr. Hartt spoke of our need to get a better sense of our actual membership. We know who are presently active, but there is a large number of historic connections that we should have a better handle on at this point. This improved information will also help the Strategic Growth Committee. As always, our chief concern is regular Sunday attendance. The parish's vitality requires the strongest possible attendance patterns by all who consider themselves members. Our ASA for 2019 was 116.5.

Fr. Hartt thanked George, Deb, Fred, Maria, and Jim, for their work on Stewardship and restoration fund-raising. The present approach to each appears to be working well.

Fr. Hartt wished the parish a blessed 2020.

Finance – G. Scala - Treasurer's Report

George reviewed the Treasurer's Report for December. Offerings YTD for 2019 were \$213,323. While this fell short of the budgeted number of \$227,650, it did exceed the total offerings of 2018 which were \$205,705.

The investment/endowment accounts both showed gains for December and ended the year very strong. Merrill Lynch showed a return of +2.29% for the month and a YTD return of +21.61%. The Key accounts showed a return of +1.86% for the month and a YTD return of +19.32%. This leaves us with a positive budget variance in this area YTD of \$585,290. Both accounts performed favorably versus market indexes. Expenses YTD were \$30,793 over budget.

Pledges for 2020 continue to come in. We have received 38 pledges to date for a total amount of \$120,672.

Discussion occurred concerning the annual meeting and the presentation of the Treasurer's Report.

The Overflow Homeless Shelter opened December 1st for the 11th year. The ministry is going very well this year. We had volunteers (7) nights during December. A representative from Food for the Poor will visit the church and preach at both services on Sunday January 19, 2020. We hope you will consider donating to the worldwide work this organization does in support of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. (NOTE: Re-scheduled to 3/22/20 because of snow storm)

The annual Soup Sampler needs to be re-scheduled for Sunday 2/23 following the 10:30am service (not 2/9). Also, it will benefit the Capital City Rescue Mission overflow homeless shelter.
